Expanding Horizons

Educación Plus, (Registered charity, No 1048617), was started in 1994 by then members of Highworth Community Church. Its purpose is to demonstrate the love of God to underprivileged children and their families in the shanty towns of Costa Rica, Central America.

Expanding Horizons is the expedition we organised to celebrate our 25th anniversary. Rather than take people to see the conditions in which the families live, we decided to bring the youngsters to the UK to share the privileges we know here.

Six boys, chosen from our football academies, came from communities where many live in small tin shacks with dirt floors and no windows, sewers or legal electricity supply. The environment is often frightening, with daily drug trafficking, assaults and murders literally on their doorsteps. They are considered to be of the 'lowest class' simply because of where they live.

Yet these lads would have been a credit to any community. It would be difficult to imagine a more cooperative, polite and friendly group of thirteen-year-olds! After a week of sight-seeing in London they spent a week in Highworth and greatly appreciated all the generous hospitality they received. How they enjoyed every aspect of their visit!

There were three football matches against local teams: Wichelstowe Academy, Stratton Tigers and Warneford School. We're grateful to everybody











who worked hard to make these so successful. The boys also enjoyed a tour of the County Ground and watched Swindon Town's match against Newport (shame about the result!).

But it wasn't all football. They also enjoyed other 'typically English' things like a full English breakfast in the Saracen's Head and a Sunday Roast lunch at the Freke Arms as well as canoeing at the Cotswold Water Park and ice skating (something they had never even seen in the tropics!) at the Link Centre.

At Gorse Hill Baptist Church on the Saturday and Sunday we celebrated God's provision, guidance and protection over the last 25 years. During the trip we continued to experience these: it was funded by additional donations totally apart from regular Educación Plus funds, the itinerary took on a shape of its own and we enjoyed two unforgettable weeks without accident or mishap of any kind. Thank you to everyone who was involved in any way.

The group have all settled back well in their schools since their return to Costa Rica and will surely echo the words of Psalm 9:1 as they recount their experiences to their families and friends:

I will give thanks to you, Lord, with all my heart; I will tell of all your wonderful deeds.

Remembrance Sunday 2019

Despite the heavy rain that had flooded parts of the country the day before, Remembrance Sunday was bright and dry.

The parade had a new start point this year at Priory Green Car Park. From there it made its way up to St Michael's Church which was, once again, packed to bursting.

1st Highworth Vorda Cubs gave a moving presentation on the tragic story of the Brown Family, this year marking the centenary of the deaths of James and Primrose Brown of Eastrop Grange who died of broken hearts following the death of their four sons during World War II; a poignant reminder that just because the War had ended, the pain and suffering it caused did not.

The congregation then joined a waiting crowd of hundreds more outside at the cenotaph for the two-minute silence and laying of the wreaths before the parade marched back down the High Street.

The Remembrance window competition returned this year and congratulations must go to Highworth Flowers who were awarded the trophy by Highworth & District Royal British Legion members. Their stunning design featured a greenery decorated aeroplane flying between barbed wire on a poppy field and a cross of giant poppies.

The Tragic Brown Brothers

Captain Eric Brown, 5th Wiltshire Regiment, died of wounds in Mesopotamia aged 27 on 1st April 1917.

Lieutenant Douglas Brown, 3rd Royal Scots, died of wounds aged 25 on 13th September 1917 in France

Captain Kenneth Brown, 4th Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, died aged 22 of wounds in a prisoner of war camp on 12th April 1918.

Major Gerald Brown, 1st Wiltshire Regiment, was killed in action in Belgium aged 31 on 14th April 1918.

With World Space Week falling in October, Eastrop Infant School celebrated the 50th anniversary of humankind's first steps on the moon, inspiring future generations of Space Explorers, engineers and astronomers.

From Monday 7th October, the entire week was dedicated to scientific discovery. It got off to an exciting start when Swindon Astronomers Mr and Mrs Wilkie from Swindon Star gazers wowed the children during assembly with their facts and photographs of the night sky above Swindon. The assembly included being shown how telescopes work, facts about the first moon landing and even showed real-life samples of moon rock! The children shared excitedly what they already knew about the moon and had their own questions answered by our experts.

Whilst the children were filled with curiosity and wonder, each class had a fun-packed day with their teachers engaging in moon activities. From Nursery to Year 2 everyone took part and had a wonderful week of lessons, which included taking a trip to the moon in a cardboard box during story time, printing aliens using the Numicon pieces and paint, making moon models from papier-mâché and creating textured moon paintings by adding flour to paint, designing and making space rovers using junk modelling techniques and writing posters using facts they had remembered about the moon.

Possibly the most exciting part of Space Week for the children (and teachers) was the visit from a real Space Rocket Nova 2, due to be launched into outer space in 2020. All were in awe of this incredible sight with "oohs" and "ahhs" echoing around the playground.

Year 1 teacher at Eastrop Infant School Becky Vardy said, "What an amazing opportunity for the children to see beyond our world and look for the stars".

Highworth Pre-School selected to run Early Words Together National Literacy Project



Highworth Pre-School was one of 10 pre-school/nurseries in Swindon to join the Early Words Together at Three - National Literacy Trust, Swindon.

The aim of the project is to help improve communication, language and literacy practice in early years and work with families through simple, playful activities. This is all to help young children get the best possible start in life and be ready for school.

The workshops will be run by our Supervisor Rachel Uzzell and Session Co-ordinator Alison Pritchard- Boxall, as they have completed the training with the National Literacy Trust. It's an exciting opportunity to work with parents and children at Highworth Pre-School.

A pilot of this programme was run in five schools in Swindon in 2018-19 and was shown to have a positive impact on parents' home learning behaviours and children's interest and engagement in books and songs.

- 92% of parents say they understand more than before how important it is for them to talk to their child
- 92% of parents say they are more confident than before in sharing books and stories with their child, and
- 83% of parents say they sing more rhymes with their child

We look forward to our workshops starting in January 2020 and working in partnership our families at Highworth Pre-School.

I run a Scout Group needing annual accounts. How can we save on the fees?

If the income of your Scout Group is below £25,000, the accounts need only to be checked by an *independent* person with the relevant experience and knowledge. This could be an unqualified accountant/bookkeeper used to preparing accounts for their own business.

If income is over £25,000 but under £100,000, you will need to arrange for an "independent examination" by someone with the right ability and experience, typically a bank/building society or accountant. They must carry out a competent examination of the accounts. I would imagine that your Scout Group falls into one of the above categories — which should mean you are charged a low fee - if any.



On 23rd October the town of Highworth was accredited as 'Working to become Dementia

Friendly 2019-2020', an accolade which was first granted to Swindon in 2017 by the Alzheimer's Society. Now the Highworth Community is being formally acknowledged following huge efforts within the town to make it a better place for people with dementia to live.

The town's activities have included regular local Dementia Friends Information Sessions, fundraising events and a campaign to make businesses throughout the town more Dementia Friendly, backed by Mayor Julia Bishop. Much of this work has been led by two

active Dementia Champions within the town, Elaine Graham and Kevin O'Donoghue in partnership with Susan Lambert, Dementia Friendly Coordinator. We now have over 500 Dementia Friends in Highworth and the surrounding areas.

To celebrate this achievement, over 20 supporters and members of the community all came together to enjoy a tea party in the community

rooms, with refreshments and a delicious cake generously donated by our local Highworth Cooperative and T T Linnet.

The event started off with a formal presentation of the Dementia Friendly certificate, which was made to Mayor Julia Bishop and involved members of the community, by Councillor Holland, Deputy Cabinet Leader of Swindon Borough Council. Mayor Bishop has been an ongoing supporter

and raised funds of over £7,600 for Alzheimer's Society in her 2018/19 term of office.

Air Cadets Remembrance Camp - 'Lest we forget'

During the Centenary of Remembrance Day last year, ten air cadets and three staff members were privileged to lay wreaths and pay their respects to the Fallen at the great Thiepval Memorial on the Somme, which commemorates the 74,000 dead of WWI who have no known grave.

The wreath-laying at Thiepval marked the most solemn moment in a week of discovering the sites and events of the Battle of the Somme. This is the 12th year in which the air cadets have been involved.

During the week, the cadets were able to visit many of the battlefield sites of the Somme, such as Wellington Quarries, Auchonvillers, Lochnagar mine crater, Beaumont-Hamel and Vimy Ridge. Our final day was spent visiting the great Tyne Cot cemetery where 11,000 of the fallen lie. We also visited the Essex Farm Cemetery at Boezinge where Col John McCrae wrote the beautifully

tragic poem 'In Flanders Fields'. Finally, we visited Ypres where we took part in the 8pm Last Post Ceremony and the cadets were again privileged to lay a wreath.

This week made a great impression on the minds of all who attended by accentuating the futility and cruelty of WWI; the great acts of bravery carried out by men, women and children, of all ranks; the beauty and reverence in which their memory is held and finally, as a lesson to all of us that, as Churchill said "Jaw Jaw is better than War War!".

"The highlight of the trip was laying a wreath on the 100th Anniversary of Armistice Day at Thiepval," said Cpl Nile Austin. "I've never had such an amazing experience and it was only made possible by the Air Cadets who give us amazing opportunities like this."

David Attenborough says: "It's time we humans came to our senses". Clearly, governments, businesses and individuals need to act, but I

sense many, like me, are puzzled about what they can do.





Rowing the Thames for the NSPCC

Many thanks for all the donations to our fundraising efforts from the Row of the Thames which we completed over the **August Bank** Holiday weekend. In total we raised over £10,000 for the **NSPCC** and were very grateful for a cheque of £400 from the Lions. Here is an account of our three-day challenge from Lechlade to Teddington.

As planned we set off at 7.30am on Saturday from Lechlade Marina to row the 124 miles to Teddington. We were

aiming to arrive around 5pm on the Monday but by 10.30am we were already more than an hour behind schedule simply due to the complete lack of maintenance by the Environment Agency. The river Thames at this point is barely wide enough for a narrow boat and certainly not conducive to our boat, a four row 1 cox with riggers and 9ft long oars. We were repeatedly stuck in the reeds and fortunate the river was far quieter here than anywhere else. We were due to overnight at Abingdon Rowing Club, the boat that is not us, at 6pm but eventually arrived at 9pm in the gathering dusk. Our pre-ordered meal at the Beefeater getting colder and colder. Day 1, as you can tell, was going slower (and hotter and hotter) than expected so we started at 7.30am on Day 2.

Day 2 dawned a beautiful day and we were ever hopeful of sticking to the schedule as the river got wider. Sadly it was not to be, as the river got busier and even hotter. Our plan allowed for 10 mins for each lock, achievable when the river is quiet but not on a warm sunny BH Sunday in August when the whole world seems to own a boat of some description. We got hotter and hotter and further and further behind as a result

and by 9pm we were sitting in the middle of the river outside Hurley Lock in the pitch black. Fortunately, our back up team with the aid of torches found us. Peter and Michael back-tracked to the village to seek assistance and came across a wonderful chap called Paddy Burrowes, who was enjoying a dinner party with friends in his wonderful garden not far from us. They all instantly left the table and assisted us by providing a safe haven for the boat overnight. However, this was just over two miles short of Marlow Rowing Club where we should have been and our booking for 8.30pm at Zizzi's was now out the window and they closed on us. We did find the Marlow Bar and Grill most welcoming in serving us excellent meals and just a few pints.

Day 3 saw us swapping our teams around lock by lock, to overcome the extreme heat exhaustion and relieve the pain in parts of one's anatomy that you sit on. The heat was tremendous. It was at least 35°C on the water and there were huge queues of up to 20 boats at the locks. Our back up team were amazing. They travelled each day to most locks with refreshments and food, ringing other members of their families to

replenish their stocks.

By 2.30pm we were on the point of giving in. The sheer heat and river traffic was making our challenge impossible. We started to look for a lock with road access so the Land Rover and trailer could get to the water but at that point the bananas and Mars bars kicked in and the boys, seeing only a few more miles to go, picked themselves up and with me in the cox's seat completed the final five miles from Molesey Lock in just 40 mins with the final half mile at 12mph. We arrived at 8.20pm after a 13-hour day with our entire crew completely exhausted but with an Adrenalin rush so strong that on landing the four boys dived into the river. Thankfully they forgot to throw the cox in. Boys being boys they decided then to give everyone a wet hug. What an emotional time we have had.

All in all it has been a fantastic achievement with so many obstacles on the way to overcome. Every member of the crew has said how much they have gained from the extraordinary experience and are in awe of each other.

This challenge was completed to raise funds for a Child Protection Centre in Swindon which provides services to local children and their families helping them to recover from the impact of abuse. It helped over 800 children and adults last year and has a long waiting list. It is self-funded via fundraising. If only for a day: The 1914 Christmas Truce

Relatively early on in the First World War (month 5 of what would turn out to be 51) hostilities had entered a bit of a lull as leaders on both sides reconsidered their respective strategies.

On Christmas Eve 1914 German soldiers decorated their trenches with Christmas Trees, lit candles and

were heard singing 'Stille Nacht' (Silent Night); the British responded with carols of their own. Reports suggest there were German shouts of "You no shoot we no shoot" and tentatively heads on both sides came above the parapet. Bravely soldiers and officers ventured into 'No-Man's Land' to shake hands, mingle and exchange food and souvenirs.

One British Captain wrote that he smoked a cigar with the best shot in the German army whilst his machine gunner, a barber back in Britain trimmed the hair of a German soldier kneeling on the frozen ground. A 19 year-old Private in the 6th Battalion Cheshire Regiment spoke about a ball appearing from somewhere, he couldn't rightfully say from where but it wasn't from 'our' side. Coats were used as goal posts, one fellow went in goal and a general kick-about followed. The boots they wore were a menace and the leather ball sodden but for a moment in time

humanity had prevailed. Soldiers had fought under the belief their respective enemies were monsters and of course found out they weren't.

News of this very unofficial cease-fire was not well received by senior officers and orders came through that it should be stopped. A Lieutenant from the Saxon 133rd Regiment wrote that "A little later we drifted back to our trenches and the fraternization ended. The game finished with a score of three goals to Fritz and only two for Tommy". Whilst some cease-fires happened in following years, it was not to the same extent and never had the resonance of 1914. What though remains from one of the most violent events in our history is the enduring image of humanity encapsulated in a friendly football match.

Maybe that's why they call it the beautiful game.

CHECK INGREDIENTS FOR ANY HIDDEN FATS

AND SUGARS: Make an informed choice. Christmas is a food producer's dream, so take a second to think about the ingredients in the products you are buying and if you are in any doubt look at the labelling. Remember, the ingredients are listed in order of predominance, with the ingredient used in the greatest amount

EAT MINDFULLY: Listen to your physical hunger cues and eat slowly, engage your senses by noticing colours, smells, sounds, textures, and

> flavours and eat only until vou are full. Distinguish between true hunger and non-hunger triggers for eating.

DRINK MORE WATER:

Understand the number of units and the number of calories that your preferred tipple contains: the numbers might shock you. Try alternating a glass of water with an alcoholic beverage and don't feel

pressurised into having another drink. A couple of consecutive days alcohol-free will give your liver a chance to recover.

REIN IN THE STRESS: Planning ahead and slowing down will help to control stress levels. Stress can lead us to grab for the refined sugars and processed foods because stress stimulates the production of dopamine (see above).



Book Review: Nanook the Bipolarbear by James Osborn

Nanook the Bipolarbear is a book about a polar bear with Bipolar Affective Disorder. Each page in a snapshot into real life experiences of living with Bipolar based on my life and the lives of others I know who are also dealing with mental unwellness. The main message of the book is to bring comfort to those who are going through struggles with their mental health and to make those who aren't going through it more aware of the struggles that are going on around them.

Where did the inspiration for the book come from?

The main inspiration is from my personal experience of being diagnosed with

Bipolar. I struggled to find ways to understand it. I drew the first one about 5 years ago in my last year of university but I had to take a break because I was taking on the emotions of the bear which made my own difficulties worse. I redirected the bear because a friend of mine from Shrivenham Methodist Church called Phil gave me a card with a joke about a Bipolarbear on it and I took it as a sign that it was time to bring Nanook out of hibernation. I also realised that most books about mental health were either textbooks, long

biographies or full of sugar-coated sentiments that, at the end of the day, don't help. Nanook The Bipolarbear is none of those things.

How long did it take to write?

I actually only took a couple of months to create the book. I had already drawn the bulk of the illustrations for my Instagram account before I spoke to my publisher in the pub one evening. I go to a lot of poetry events and so I know a lot of the poetry community in Swindon and the South West. I was at an event and spoke to my friend who is a publisher about how they run their publishing company and the suggestion

that I should make a book about Nanook came up. After that it took me a couple of months to collate everything together. During that time I was also exhibiting my work in Baristocats on Commercial Road in Swindon as part of their Frames of Mind series which showcases local art, poetry and music.

How did you get it published?

I walked into the pub and had a conversation. There are many myths in the creative world that you can't do one thing without doing 50 others but I've found that the only way for great

opportunities to present
themselves to you is to talk to
people. Me and my friend The
Rusty Goat have a running
joke where we say "just two
mentally ill guys walking into
rooms making things
happen" and that is our
philosophy. We just turn up
and have conversations with
interesting people and so
interesting ideas come and
we end up doing things
we never dreamed would
be possible.

Did you illustrate it yourself?

The book is all my work. My publishers understood the way to get the best

out of me was to give me the framework and let me flow with it. The publisher had some great ideas about how the book should be laid out and I just created in the space they provided.

How does it feel to be a published author?

It's mind-blowing really. I was bullied mainly by teachers at school because I'm dyslexic and my brain doesn't seem to work academically; whatever that means. When Black Eyes Publishing sent me the proof it was really emotional. It's a massive privilege to have a book published because not everyone gets to do this. It's even more of an honour that people are buying it!





From our MP

A General Election has been called for Thursday December 12th. This will be my 5th General Election campaign as a candidate and, as this will be my last article before the General Election, I thought I would set out what happens behind the scenes.

Firstly, I stop being the MP. During an election campaign, I am no longer the MP, so the constituency office has to close, we can't use Parliamentary stationery and envelopes and my Parliamentary email is turned off. I presume these rules exist to not give MPs an undue advantage during the election campaign. If I am re-elected, everything is instantly turned back on, if I lose, my team of staff and I step aside (with a few weeks to wrap up any outstanding casework) and the new MP and their team take over instantly.

On to the election campaign. All candidates will be pounding the streets (I'd expect to pass one million steps!), writing and delivering leaflets and knocking on doors. With 45,000 houses and 80,000+ electors per constituency it is no easy task! I often get told "no-one has knocked on my door" but please don't take it personally. All the candidates will do their best to get around as many doors as possible, but we are all limited by the numbers of volunteers and supporters who are able to give up time to help us. Does it make a difference? No-one really knows. Most people will probably vote along party lines, based on the national campaigns, but I do enjoy getting out to meet and talk to people.



There are always ups and downs during election campaigns, but the nerves don't really kick in until the polls have closed. Candidates then have the agonising wait as the ballot boxes are raced to the Oasis for the count to begin. Normally, candidates don't head to the count until there are some early signs of how it might be going, with our respective teams of helpers closely monitoring the votes being sorted and counted. Swindon's election team are fantastic, working into the early hours and in recent elections they have been one of the first to declare a result, something I know they are very proud of.


Whilst politics and politicians frustrate, disappoint and anger many, please do engage. Much is achieved in Parliament cross-party, things do change and we as elected representatives can make a difference. It is incredibly rewarding when you can help people with their own casework, often at a time of real urgency.

Extracts from the minutes of a meeting of Highworth Town Council on 15th October 2019

47. PUBLIC QUESTION TIME a. P Webster - Councillors agreed that this Council is to lobby SBC to object to Planning Applications which have appeared on the Planning Portal and are contrary to the Highworth Neighbourhood Plan(HNP), which was adopted by SBC as part of its Local Plan. b. A Livall - brought to the attention of the Council her concerns that the Bio-diversity surveys undertaken by Developers are not being conducted at the correct time of the year with regard to seasonal bat activity. c. C Turbinskyj - offered to lead a Tree planting initiative 'Trees Please' and asked the Council how best to proceed. Councillors agreed to put tree planting on the next E&L Agenda. d. M Collett - asked Councillors about the progress of the new lease for the Lower Rec. This Council is awaiting the final draft from SBC, before a 'mirror' lease can be negotiated for the HTJFC.

- 53. REPORTS BY BOROUGH COUNCILLORS a. Cllr M Penny:-has received lots of feedback from residents concerned about the number of trees due to be felled on the proposed Redlands development site. •Shrivenham Road residents are concerned about the traffic and HGV's using Shrivenham Road and the speed at which they travel. She is to request another speedcheck.
- Stonefield Drive residents are complaining that the gutters are not being swept. It was discovered that all the aspirations for the cleaning machine at the beginning of taking on pavement sweeping in 2015 are not achievable. We do the very best we can with the resources at our disposal and have to prioritise. We have a statutory duty to clear certain areas on a daily basis and this is achieved, other areas are done on a reactive basis e.g. reports of broken glass.
- 55. QUESTIONS FROM COUNCILLORS: a. Cllr Gardiner suggested that HTC might wish to consider taking on the lease of the golf course land should it become available. Councillors were informed that following Cllr M Penny's suggestion, the land is listed as an Asset of Community Value, and that a letter has been written to SBC expressing an interest. b. Cllr Penny has been contacted by a Redlands resident requesting that the speed limit be reduced to 30mph once the proposed new roundabout is installed.




