Highworth Churches Together, (who are the publishers of Link) and the Link management team have reluctantly taken the decision that the magazine will not be published again until May.

In the light of the recently issued Government restrictions, direct delivery of Link to homes has once again been judged to be unsafe. Last year, in the previous periods of lockdown Link was, wherever possible, published online or printed and placed in central locations in the community. However, while this was well received, advertising revenue could not be collected as the magazine was not distributed directly to homes and businesses. So the decision not to publish during the national lockdown has been taken to protect the long-term viability of Link.

The publishing team deserve huge thanks for all their efforts last year to continue with production of the magazine in its various forms. Please be assured that Link will return as soon as it is judged safe and prudent to do so.

Hope for Highworth Carol Service

The hour-long service was led by Highworth Community Church Leader Matt Ford and St Michael's Church's Assistant Curate Revd Emily Swinerd. Matt used a quote from the Shawshank Redemption 'Fear can hold you prisoner. Hope can set you free' to introduce Hope as the main theme for the night and spoke about our great need for hope at this dark time. Children from Southfields and Westrop then shared their 'Hopes for Christmas'.

The pre-recorded videos took the action out into Highworth itself, with the Market Square, Warneford and Highworth Cemetery all recoognisable in the background. Thanks was given to the Mutual Aid Community Group and the Swindon Food Hub for all they have done and are still doing and Kathryn Ford gave an update on CAP's work this year.

Nine year old Austin Hillcoat from Westrop sang a very moving solo of 'Silent Night' in St Michael's Church, a reminder of Christmas Eve 1914 when the German and British troops put aside the devastation to come together and exchange gifts and play football with the enermy they had been trying to kill mere hours before

Each of the three hymns were accompanied by a range of musicians: violin, guitar and keyboard and for the last song, 'Joy to the World', a montage of over 50 members from all four Churches were pictured singing along in their homes.

Finally, Matt and Emily reminded us that Advent is the season to talk about all the things that have gone wrong this year and to light candles to help us see and find our way forward.

Scouts Defibrillator Challenge

Back in 2018 I challenged the Beavers, Cubs and Scouts of 1st Highworth to raise funds for us to purchase and install a Community Defibrillator to be placed at our Scout HQ in Eastrop.

The challenge was set and the Scout Group's sections responded brilliantly.

Our Beavers held coffee mornings with raffles. Some of them helped to make cakes or biscuits and some had pen and paper poised to take customer orders. The Beavers waited on each table to fulfil their customer's needs whilst the leaders looked after the hot water and made the drinks.

One of our Cub Packs ran a sponsored walk whilst the other decided to treat(?) residents of Eastrop by Carol Singing just before Christmas 2019. They found the residents very generous and managed to boost our funds by quite a bit. Thank you!

Our Scouts spent time doing odd jobs for family and friends whilst the 2nd Troop baked biscuits and cakes and sold them on the podium.

Along with some smaller donations we secured a larger donation from WrdeUp Music Festival for which we were really grateful.

Our largest donation came from the Round Table who had asked us if we would like to be involved in helping Santa meet people at the Orbital Retail Park. Our task was to hand out sweets to youngsters passing, normally in return for some small monetary donation to the Round Table's collecting box, though sometimes the donation





came after the sweets were handed out. The youngsters (and some leaders) who helped enjoyed a few sweets too.

We were just preparing to purchase our equipment as lockdown happened so this has all been delayed a bit. However, we have managed to purchase an external defib and a locked cabinet which were installed outside the Scout Hut in January. Thanks to the generosity of Highworth people and organisations, we were also able to buy a training defib and a manikin so that we can train our members in using a defib wherever they are, should they need to.

As is appropriate for a defib located at the Scout Hut, the machine we have purchased can be used on both adults and children at the flip of a switch.

Let's hope that no-one will ever use it but at least the residents of Eastrop can rest-assured that there is a defib nearby.

I am proud of what the Beavers Cubs and Scouts have achieved and really grateful for the support of the people and organisations of Highworth.

Our thanks for the installation go to Crannis Technology Services Ltd from Wroughton. They were very helpful and their work all looked very clean and tidy!

Post-Lockdown 2 Scouting

We were back face-to-face briefly before Lockdown Two struck and then we were into December. We had two or three meetings for each section to fill with face-to-face Scouting outside on cold, damp December evenings.

Firstly though, for some sections Zoom meetings continued. perhaps interspersed with the face-to-face option. It is difficult trying to keep youngsters involved and enthused in online meetings and then trying to keep them socially distanced when faceto-face. All I can sav is we try our best (as per our Scout Promise).

As well as looking after ourselves, we try to look after our Scouting family across the UK too. For many young people, Scouting can

be a lifeline but this year Scouting provision has been threatened. 'Race Round the World' was a Scout Association initiative to help support over 500 Scout Groups in the UK who are struggling due to COVID-19. The idea is we raise money for The Scout Association to distribute where it's needed. Highworth Cubs took part in an adventurous night hike or had a Zoom meeting called Round the World in 80 days ending with a family tea party with sandwiches, fairy cakes and tea. Scouts had a long night hike; we started at Idstone at 6.30pm on a cool Friday evening and walked back to Highworth arriving at 11.29pm. This was important as we had told parents to pick up at 11.30pm and some of the leaders had grins from ear-to-ear with the timing 'perfection'. The hike included thick muddy fields, puddles and navigating along footpaths that had been blocked by barbed wire fencing. As a Scout Group we managed to raise in excess

of £1000. Thank you everyone for your support.

Other face-to-face meetings included hikes, walking some of the Highworth advent trail, wild wooding, making fires and S'mores, campfire

and cooking more pancakes outside on gas.

Zoom meetings included Remembrance Day, cooking pizza's in a mua. Cub Home Safety badge, Salt dough Christmas crafts and decorations and a Christmas Ouiz. One of our Beaver Colonies sent each Beaver a pack with their December programme which could be completed at home in their own time.

Northview's last meeting before Christmas was a day

Hedgehog-friendly Highworth

We have formed a group to encourage hedgehog-friendly actions to help our little spiky friends. Unfortunately, hedgehog numbers have plummeted by around 500,000 since 2000. It's so easy to help to save these amazing creatures:

- Create a CD sized hole (13 x 13cm) in your fence. Hedgehogs roam up to 2km in a night and one reason they have declined in numbers is that we have fenced off our gardens, stopping them moving around easily.
- Have a hog house which you can buy or build! Advice on hedgehogstreet.org.
- Leave out water in a saucer or bowl (please change daily to stop bacteria growing and no milk as they are lactose intolerant).
- Leave out food such as tinned or dry cat or dog food (please avoid fish flavours and no mealworms as these cause hogs metabolic disease).
- Let a patch of your garden grow wild or have a leaf pile giving them a potential place to



shelter or hibernate.

More information can be found at Hedgehogstreet.org (there's also an app under the same name). If you see a hedgehog or create a highway, please log it with them.

And please join us on Facebook Groups (Hedgehog Friendly Highworth) as together we can really make a difference.

As the Appeal has been delayed because of COVID-19, some shoe boxes will be delayed in being sent abroad to the children. At the time of writing (18th Dec), about 100,000 boxes have been sent.

Highworth Twinning Association: 2020 The year of the Coronavirus

Hello everyone,

It doesn't need me to tell you that 2020 has literally been a non-event in Twinning terms, our only meeting being the AGM in February. I'm sorry not to have written before now but I have had little to report. A Christmas letter seems an appropriate time to catch up.

Briefly, in 2020 we cancelled visits to Wassenberg in May, Pontorson in September and also a visit from Wassenberg in October. After twice postponing the proposed Dinner Dance at Warneford School we have now cancelled this event altogether. The concert from the Eclectic String Band is now scheduled for November 2021.

The EU has agreed the funding for the Ascension gathering in Wassenberg in 2020 can be transferred to 2021. At this point in time I

believe nobody really knows whether this will go ahead or not. Optimistically we might be vaccinated by then but will we have the confidence to travel abroad by coach and will our hosts have the confidence to accommodate us? In other words, will May 2021 come around too soon for a visit? In the normal way, we would be starting the coach planning process in January but with the COVID-19 situation worsening at the moment I consider it's far too early to ask people to put their names forward.

I'm very sorry to tell you that two of our committee members, Chris Latimer and Richard Rogers, have suffered from serious health issues in 2020 (not COVID-19 related). Two operations and repeated visits to the hospital by ambulance were required respectively. I'm sure you would want to join me in wishing them well as they continue their recoveries.

Sadly, Wendy Eason Gibson died recently, I'm unaware of the circumstances but remember her well as being a regular attendee at our safari lunches.

Highworth is expanding; the Red Down development appears to be next. With this in mind, over the last couple of years, the HTA committee has discussed proposals for new street names in Highworth. We have put forward several suggestions to the Town Council and agreement was given in principle. However, the council changes annually so it is not yet a 'done deal'. Please look out for Pontorson Place and Wassenberg Way in the future!

News from Wassenberg

Extract of an email from Karin (Wassenberg President) earlier in December

The situation (re COVID-19) in Wassenberg is about the same as everywhere in North Rhine-Westfalia and basically in Germany. Numbers are far too high and hospitals are reaching their limits so the government decided vesterday (!) 13th December, that we need more serious restrictions over Christmas and the New Year. As of Wednesday, we will now go into a stricter lockdown and only shops that care for everyday needs will be allowed to open. The rules for family meetings over Christmas (24th to 26th) are: members of one household plus four people can celebrate together. That, of course, gives families a bit to think about and organize. On all other days, a maximum of five people coming from two households at most are allowed to meet but of course we are encouraged to meet as few people as we possibly can.

They have half-heartedly shut down schools as from today: our years 5-7 (10-13-year-olds) are allowed to come in or stay away, as their parents decide. The older ones are to be taught at home. Luckily, our Moodle platform and our Big Blue Button conference tool work well for us so we should be able to cope.

Holidays start early so this is the last week before we break up completely and, as they last longer, we are coming back on January 11th at least that is the plan that we know of today. Nobody really knows what will happen after Christmas.

Kreis Heinsberg, like all areas, is preparing a vaccination centre, I am not sure when

vaccinations will start here and who will be the first ones.

People in town hall have organized a 'stayhome festival' and uploaded short musical events. It might be interesting for twinning people and maybe others:

Philipp Schneider is the deputy chairman of our twinning committee. Marcel Maurer is the newly elected Town Mayor and is in his early forties (quite young for a mayor) and is also a member of the CDU and a friend of Philipp. In twinning matters, he would like to follow in Manfred's tracks and support twinning as best he can. Sounds good to me... (Karin)

In addition, I will forward an email I have recently received from the Wassenberg Association's Secretary, Heinz-Josef Peters. I wholeheartedly agree with him when he says: "Let us be grateful for the good memories and look forward to life (and twinning) picking up again in the course of next year."

In a further email from Karin received two days ago, she tells me they are again in 'hardlockdown' and the Christmas proposals, like ours, have been overtaken. My purpose in relaying this is to show you the situation is basically the same there as here. Yes there are some variations, groups of 5 being mentioned rather than 6, but overall the same.

Pontorson

I have exchanged a couple of emails with Jacqueline during 2020 but I have not received a reply recently. When I last heard, all was well and they were being philosophical about the situation and doing what they have to. Jacqueline remarked how quiet it was in Pontorson when very few people, if any, were visiting Mont St Michel. Of course, this may have changed during the summer. You may not know that in France, since the first lockdown, every French resident has to carry a form with them when going out. You access a government website and print off the form which you complete to explain the reason for being out of doors; as far as I know, this has continued.all year.

Thank goodness we don't have to do that!

Looking forward...

What do we plan for 2021?

Well, I don't think a normal 'face-to-face' AGM is likely, or indeed necessary in view of the lack of activity. My suggestion for the AGM is that we submit brief reports (importantly the Treasurer's statement confirming the bank balance) by email and respond to any points which arise in the same way. Apart from the concert from the Eclectic String Band playing in November 2021 nothing else is planned. For the moment I feel

we just have to wait to see how things pan out. Our association is about meeting people, hosting and visiting until the pandemic is over I regret we simply can't safely resume our normal programme of events.

If anyone has any news from either 'twin' that they would like to share, especially from Pontorson, then please let me know.

Have a peaceful Christmas and let's hope for a better New Year!

Dear friends of the town twinning with Pontorson and Highworth

As Secretary of the twinning committee, I am writing to you in Advent to review the past year.

To do this, I have taken another look at the last communications, starting with the circular letter in Advent 2019, the invitation to the general meeting in the spring of this year with subsequent cancellation and the letter cancelling this year's Europe Days, hoping that you have the chance to keep in touch with your friends in our twin towns by telephone, Whatsapp, e-mail or letter. In September we were able to inform you that the already approved grants could be carried over to 2021. We could postpone our plans for Europe Days to 2021 without any major problems.

A lot has happened in the meantime. In the summer, life had almost returned to normal, but in the autumn, infection rates rose again all over Europe, varying in amount but unfortunately the same in trend. What followed were stricter lockdowns, although we seemed to have got off lightly compared to what our friends in France and England have to endure in terms of restrictions on daily life. Some sectors such as the hotels and restaurants as well as arts and culture were certainly hit very hard. The 2500 Christmas markets that took place in Germany in 2019, with some 150 million visitors, have also been cancelled this year and not to forget the countless associations, which, like our twinning committee, have had to scale down their activities.

But we should not forget that our twinning has

been active for over 50 years and that we have had lots of good times. Let us recall all the moments, let us think back to the numerous celebrations and encounters, to the good conversations, the laughter and celebrations and to many a friendship that was made during this time and that goes beyond the limited times of the twinning events as such. Let us not be too sad that all this could not take place this year. Let us be grateful for the good memories and look forward to life (and twinning) picking up again in the course of next year after this year's interruption.

While the current limitations cannot be talked away and are unfortunately absolutely necessary to get out of this pandemic, life does go on, and with hope and confidence I quote in part from our letter last year: "Candlelight shines against the darkness. (...) Homes are festively decorated. (...), one comes to rest and looks forward to celebrating the festival with the family (...)." All this is also possible under COVID-19 conditions, albeit restricted. Let us not only look at all the difficulties, but look forward to a time of rest and reflection, so that we can look to the future with strength and hope. The important thing is that we all get through this difficult time as unscathed as possible.

At least there seems light at the end of the tunnel. It seems that two vaccines are close to final approval. In England, one vaccine has already received provisional approval, which gives hope that it will soon be approved in the

EU as well. A vaccination centre for the Heinsberg district has already been designated in the industrial area of Erkelenz. Even though this is really very hopeful news, one must remain realistic and still be patient. Research into when larger parts of the population can be vaccinated has not yet yielded any clear results. Sometimes there is talk that these vaccinations can take place from March or April 2021, sometimes one hears from government circles that one has to wait until summer 2021.

What does this mean for us as members of the twinning committee? Unfortunately, we are not in a position to make any serious predictions at this stage as to when joint

meetings with our friends from Pontorson and Highworth will be able to take place again. Rest assured, however, that we are eager to revive our twinning arrangements as soon as possible without risk to life and limb.

A very special thank you goes to our mayor of many years, Manfred Winkens, who has always been very supportive of twinning and has now gone into well-deserved retirement. Far beyond his ex officio membership, he accompanied our town twinning with great commitment of heart and soul. Among other things, he travelled to Pontorson and Highworth several times for twinning events, which is a special sign of solidarity. We wish him well in his retirement and look forward to seeing him continue in our ranks. We very warmly welcome his successor in office, Marcel Maurer. Certainly, he will continue



the commitment of Manfred Winkens and also accompany our town twinning activities with his youthful verve.

There have also been personnel changes in the City Halls of our two twin towns in the meantime. In Pontorson. André-Jean Belloir was elected mayor in March 2020, whom we hereby warmly welcome and look forward hopefully to meeting him in person next vear. He replaced André Denot who, as mayor from 2014, was a reliable and committed partner in our town twinning and was present at all meetings. Thank you to André.

There was also a change of mayor in Highworth in July 2020. Richard Williams, who was previously responsible for organising the Saturday

weekly market and who is well known as 'Town Crier', replaced his predecessor Julia Bishop. We wish him all the best and and thank Julia Bishop for her support of our twinning during her term of office. In Highworth, mayors are elected for only one year at a time.

I am confident that a meeting of the Wassenberg committee members will be possible in 2021. When the next meeting with our friends from Pontorson and Highworth can take place depends on many factors. Let us remain confident and look forward to seeing our friends again, whenever that may be.

We wish everyone a happy Christmas season; may we remember what is really important, friendship with each other and among peoples, to which we can all contribute within the framework of the twinning committee, however good or bad times may be. Stay healthy and have a happy and healthy New Year!

sessions before adopting the Vorda Building as its more patronised home.

It's wonderful to think that the club has gone from strength to strength over those 37 years and will look to hold its annual spring time race (for the 35th time) this year on Sunday 18th April. Fandangoes Update

2020 has been a particularly tough year for performers so we asked Highworth's Tom Falding to give us an update on what this year has been like for the Fandangos (who are well known for providing the entertainment at the May Day celebrations).

Performers on Lockdown

Performers (similar to the whole event industry) have been hit doubly hard by the COVID-19 crisis, not that I'm saying they're any worse or better off than any others. There was an initial wave of cancellations and the Industry seems to be hit with 'first to go, last to return'. This being said, the more performers can adapt and think of innovative ways to produce performances and get work out there the better. We're thinking about producing outside perambulating-audience shows so watch this space!

I've been incredibly lucky over lockdown as I was living on a farm with lots of my performer friends and it didn't really feel like lock down! There were 11 of us all together; it was good fun! Since lockdown lifted then work did start to come in for live performances but it's been very slow. Support has been available if you're lucky. There has been a huge pot of money made available to help creative individuals and organisations survive through this crisis or even produce new material.

The Swindon Summer Bowl

We set up the Swindon Summer Bowl in response to COVID-19 and a cancellation of community and cultural events. In a nutshell, we worked closely with the event safety advisor group (ESAG) from SBC as well as the parish who manage the Town Gardens, South Swindon Parish Council (SSPC), who I must also say a special thanks to for supporting us from the get go and without their support the project would

not have happened. At first, when the idea was floated we were naturally met with a range of questions and some doubt; after all, we were striving to put on events when the rest of the country were cancelling.

The plans we produced and work provided quickly changed the route of thinking and we continued full steam ahead to produce the program of

events on the basis of "If this is allowed at the time, this is how we will run and manage it". It was a bit of a gamble but it was so exciting at the same time and I didn't want to stop; we were the first producing these 'Covid-safe' events. To

cut a very (very) long story short, we had a fully signed-off and approved event management plan and 7-week schedule of events ready to go. We then got approval for live entertainment ahead of the pack, so launched our venue on 17th July.

We successfully ran a full, varied and flavoursome schedule of events which saw comedy nights, workshops, family shows, fitness classes, circus lessons, bands, DJ's, an art auction and a school prom fill our colourful space at

the Bowl in the Town Gardens in Old Town. The programme ended on the August Bank Holiday. I feel it was the perfect time to end it.



We were blessed with a busy last weekend. surrounded by friends and family and I couldn't have been prouder of our incredible Fandangos team which pulled off something which evervone said was unachievable at the time. We provided a safe, comfortable, fun and exciting experience for people.

The whole project was completely overwhelming. I ran it with my ever-supporting girlfriend, Jess, to whom I owe endless thanks. We have rewritten the rule book!

2021

It's difficult to know what next year will look

like. We expect to see a rise in the amount of specifically designed events, such as the Swindon Summer Bowl. Looking forward for Fandangos, we're looking at working with more local and parish councils to produce engaging community and cultural events and would encourage any interested councils / organisers to reach out to us if they have a vision for community and cultural events for the area they oversee.

Outside the Box:

Everyday stories of death, bereavement and life by Liz Rothschild

'Outside the Box' is an eclectic collection of experiences, featuring personal stories of death, dying, bereavement, funerals, grief and life. The narratives are a mixture of heart-wrenchingly sad, angry, inspiring, contradictory and humorous but they all add to and challenge our preconceptions about death. We asked author Liz Rothschild, owner of the Westmill Woodland Burial Ground, to tell us more about her work.

The book grew out of my one woman show 'Outside the Box – a live show about death' which premiered at the Swindon Festival of Literature in 2016 and has toured throughout the UK and even as far as the USA ever since.

The show is a storytelling piece involving my own experiences and those of people I know and have worked with. The performance includes a post-show conversation with the audience and an invitation to share stories. People get a card in their programmes and over the past four years, many have

filled them in or sent them to me afterwards by email. This means that I have ended up with an amazing range of stories and the sense that this was a subject that people wanted and needed to talk about but didn't quite feel able to in everyday society. With COVID-19 forcing shows to be cancelled or to move online, I recognised that a book had the ability to travel much further, reach a larger number of people and could draw on a wider range of expertise than a one-woman show, so this year felt like the right time to organise the stories I had into a book.

The book organised itself into 'themed chapters', although I did also actively collect stories from groups that I felt were under-represented in the book, such as men and those with learning disabilities. Each chapter also contains a commentary from an expert, such as a doctor, dementia nurse, etc. I felt that this was important to add context to the personal stories.

Getting published was easy. I approached a small independent mental health publisher called PCCS

Books based in Monmouth. They found the proposal interesting and agreed to take it on. The cover, which I love, came as a result of their team developing a variety of ideas and I had the chance to comment at the design stage.

The book launch happened on the evening of 26th November and was attended by over 400 people. Due to COVID-19, the publishers suggested a virtual

launch. I proposed the final shape it took with its combination of storytelling and interviews with experts. It was a lot of fun. I particularly enjoyed finding the actors to read the individual stories. But, thank goodness, the technical side was all handled by Online Events very professionally. I could not have done without them.

I sold 255 copies after the launch evening, which I see as a very positive start. I have just recorded a series of short programmes about the book for BBC Radio Wiltshire and I shall be doing a conference with the publishers and other


promotional events in the near future. I am also busy making a podcast. Hopefully, word will also spread and a few people who have already bought the book have been back in touch to ask for more copies for presents. Writing so far has been a very positive experience and, once I have recovered from this first book, I would really like to write something else. I have always wanted to have my poetry published. I would also like to write an account of my father one day, so watch this space.

In the meantime, I hope that people will find this book a useful resource to inspire and inform, to help make us feel less lonely with our mortality and to prepare us better to help ourselves and those close to us through this difficult territory.

Dave has lived in Highworth for 40 years. He joined Highworth Camera Club about 15 years ago as a complete newcomer to photography. He finds "its members to be very friendly, and willing to pass on their knowledge". His work is mostly land and seascapes, as well as some composite images.

Dave believes that his "best images often have a degree of luck associated with them". For this photo he says it was the "right day, right weather, right light and right time".

For post-production, Dave used Coral PaintShop Pro 2020 Ultimate taking 3 exposures at 1 stop intervals combining them to give an HDR image (High Dynamic Range).

In addition, he used some selective individual colour saturation and some local tone mapping, as well as a slight increase in sharpness.



Community Tree Planting Challenge

The Challenge: can the community plant a tree for every Highworth resident?

The Friends of Pentylands Country Park, working with The Great Western Community Forest, intend to plant in the Park, a tree for every resident in Highworth by the end of March 2021.

That means we need to plant at least 8,000 trees.

- 1. We have a guarantee of 4,500 trees donated by the Trust for Conservation Volunteers.
- For the remainder, The Great Western Community Forest will obtain from a variety of suppliers.
- Funding is in place to cover costs including ongoing management of all the trees we plant.
- 4. We are yet to be notified of the delivery date for trees but it is likely to be mid-March.

Planting Areas:

Tree planting will take place in two areas of the Park in early 2021. These areas are:

- Little Forty. Better known by many as The Barra Close Field.
- Grove Furlong (Field 5): Planting will take place in the Southern quadrant of this Field.

Traditionally, Community Tree Planting involves a lot of fanfare and the Community turning up at a specific date and time and planting as many trees as possible in a day.

COVID-19 means that approach will not be possible and has forced us to re-appraise how we can carry

out a community tree planting in these difficult circumstances.

COVID-19 restrictions mean we will need to spread the tree planting over a period of time to accommodate safely groups and volunteers.

Doing things this way means:

- We can allocate specific areas to schools, groups, organisations and businesses, etc.
- It will allow ownership of that space.
- It will help us better to manage timings to ensure social distancing.
- Ensure the safety of all involved.

History of an Eastrop home

I like history. I have always liked history, from Ladybird books, school plays to GCSE's and an honours degree. History has a beginning a middle and an end, it is then reviewed, rewritten and 'refreshed'

When we moved to Highworth in 2015 we were given the opportunity to be part of history, part of The Puzzle. In the purchase of our house, along with bricks and mortar, a garden well and a beautiful home, we were given the deeds to our house, the deeds from 1833 along with much of the original paperwork henceforth.

I know that that in 1833 John Hedges passed and left to his first son William 'seven freehold cottages... in Eastrop, his son Ephraim received the freehold tenement and premises along with the stable at the back' (The Elms) and there was still two cottages in Westrop to leave his wife! His family continued to prosper

but moved to London. 15 years later the stables, three cottages, garden, six poles of ground, a barn and outbuildings were sold at auction at the King and Queen, Marketplace, Highworth. I know this because I have a copy of the auction pamphlet and receipt of sale.

In 1852 Richard Lay took a mortgage for a 1000 year lease at £90 for three cottages or tenements including parcels of ground, wall mounds, fences, ditches, etc. In 1883 a house was built on the

land behind 'ours'; there were three thatched cottages and all the properties were rented not owned. Diamond Villa is first mentioned by name in 1897. Lot 1 changed hands almost every decade during the 1900s and a value was put on

the villa in 1973 of £11.991: it didn't make the guide price! Houses, gardens and outbuildings were lost or converted and it is all recorded on waxed parchment and written in ink, so much movement and development may explain why the house numbers don't flow, why access is restricted and why there is such goodwill among neighbours.

We are grateful to all those historians who lived in our house before us; record keepers and memory makers who kept a record of time spent living in Puzzle Court (now The Elms).

Brighter Futures launch Dementia Appeal

Brighter Futures, have launched a new appeal to raise vital funds needed to improve care for patients living with dementia, who have to stay in hospital.

It is common knowledge that we have a rapidly ageing population, but the risk of dementia increases with age with one in six over the age of 80 having a diagnosis of dementia. At Great Western Hospital, approximately 3-5 per cent of all patients discharged each month have a diagnosis of dementia; this equates to about 150-200 patients per month. Some of them will also be discharged to a care home setting, despite living in their own home before they were admitted.

The Brighter Futures' Dementia Appeal will be split into three phases, with the first phase setting a target of raising £33,000 by 31st March 2021. With this money, the charity will replace clocks around the hospital with dementia-friendly clocks that display not only the time, but the day, date and weather and they will also purchase a Reminiscence Interactive Therapy Activities (RITA) machine which is a valuable resource for patients living with dementia. The pre-loaded system can be used by patients themselves or with a nurse, therapist or carer to engage them in a range of activities. These

include listening to music, showing them photos, interactive games and even replaying famous speeches the patient may connect with.

Dr Sarah White, Consultant Geriatrician, said: "It is really important that we make a stay in hospital for individuals with dementia as comfortable and support as possible and phase 2 will involve making our older persons' wards 'dementia-friendly', with soft furnishings, bright colours and adapted flooring. We also want to create areas around the hospital for our dementia patients to sit, such as a 1950s style tea room and a dementia-friendly garden. This is particularly important, as we know people with dementia are at a higher risk of falling in unfamiliar environments or developing worsening of their confusion, known as delirium.

"It can be even more distressing for people with dementia who are in hospital at this current time, due to visiting restrictions in place because of COVID-19, which prevent their familiar carers or family from being with them. Creating spaces that are comforting, welcoming and similar to a home environment will support individuals with cognitive impairment by putting them at ease and enabling them to understand and engage with their surroundings more easily."

FUNDRAISING

Update on blocked footpath, opposite Wrag Barn Golf Club, January 2021

Hello Highworth Residents. All the relevant forms that have been collected have now been passed to the Ramblers www.ramblers.org.uk Swindon representative who is dealing with this matter. He will progress the additional work to complete the application and intends to submit it to Swindon Council by the end of January. From that point, it is out of his control but it is not a quick process. The Council has to examine the user evidence and investigate the history of the path.

If they determine that a public right of way "subsists or is reasonably alleged to subsist" they will make an order to add the path to the definitive map. If they decide not to make an order and it is thought that they do not have valid grounds for this then the decision can be appealed to the Secretary of State.

Alternatively, if the Council makes the order, the landowner or any other interested party can object to it, in which case it also goes to the Secretary of State who will appoint an Inspector to hold a public inquiry. Because of COVID-19 the Inspectorate has a large backlog of cases, so we could be looking at an extended timescale. The timescale is usually measured in months.

Many thanks to those who were able to respond. We will keep you informed of progress.



We have an abundance of new and exciting titles for every age and taste, in a variety of formats (ebook, hardback, paperback and audiobook). Here are some of the books we have been reviewing recently. We do hope you enjoy them and do let us have your feedback (good and bad).

A life on our Planet – My Witness Statement and a Vision for the Future by David Attenborough



(Published by Witness Books, 2020)

"We humans, alone on Earth, are powerful enough to create worlds, and then to destroy them."

This book makes for a compelling read. This is part memoir, part warning about the decline of our planet, if we continue to live and consume in the way we currently do. But it is also a book that offers 'hope' as Attenborough explores constructive ways in which the planet can survive, if society collectively changes its behaviours. The more society continues to fracture the wild with deforestation, the expansion of farmland and the activities of the illegal wildlife trade the more likely it is that another pandemic will occur; a stark warning indeed! He convincingly explores the processes and technologies that societies need to harness to save the wilderness and human civilization. namely renewable energy, intensive farming methods, diet transformation, rewilding and reduced population growth. Attenborough claims that we should, once more, become part of nature: "We need to rediscover how to be sustainable, to move from being apart from nature to becoming a part of nature." This book is a must for everybody who cares and is interested in the environment we live in.


The Beekeeper of Aleppo by Christy Lefteri

(Published by Manilla Press 2020)

This is a novel of international significance.


Courageous, provocative and haunting. Nuri is a beekeeper; his wife, Afra, an artist. They live a

simple life, rich in family and friends. in the beautiful Syrian city of Aleppo: until the unthinkable happens. When all they care for is destroyed by war, they are forced to escape. But what Afra has seen is so terrible she has gone blind, and so they must embark on a perilous journey through Turkey and Greece



towards an uncertain future in Britain. On the way, Nuri is sustained by the knowledge that waiting for them is Mustafa, his cousin and business partner, who has started an apiary and is teaching fellow refugees in Yorkshire to keep bees. As Nuri and Afra travel through a broken world, they must confront not only the pain of their own unspeakable loss, but dangers that would overwhelm the bravest of souls. Moving, powerful, compassionate and beautifully written, The Beekeeper of Aleppo is a testament to the triumph of the human spirit. Told with deceptive simplicity, it is the kind of book that reminds us of the power of storytelling.

Sweet Sorrow by David Nicholls



(Published by Hodder & Stoughton, 2019)

David Nicholls has again been in the public eye thanks to the recent BBC production of his novel US, which is what initially prompted me to pick up Sweet Sorrow, published in 2019. I absolutely loved this book and am

hard pushed to think of anything I didn't like about it except maybe that it had to end. A charming and poignant coming-of-age story, centred around Charlie and Fran, who navigate first love and the highs and lows of the teenage years in ways that readers of any age will recognise and identify with. The observations are at times hilarious, at times sad, but always spot on. Whilst I would classify this as an 'easy' read, that is in no way to detract from the quality of the writing. Their story is cleverly interwoven with references to Romeo and Juliet and the bittersweet ending is well judged.

Becoming by Michelle Obama

(Published by Viking, 2018)

I so wanted to eniov this and ended up loving it. Honest, witty and deeply personal you can hear her voice in every sentence. You get everything from her firm foundation in church and family and the importance of her vears in education, to her





Mel Starr. Do not be put off by the fact he is American: his studies include Medieval surgery and Medieval English and he puts them both to good use in his series of books following the adventures of Hugh de Singleton, Bailiff and Surgeon in the Oxfordshire village of

Bampton. This novel, the latest in the series, is not set in Bampton but at Kennington Palace where Hugh is charged with investigating the murder of one of Prince Edward's (the Black Prince) favoured knights. The body count rises and danger lurks for Hugh as he solves the crime. The story moves at a good pace and one aspect I particularly like is the language used which manages to give the feelfeel of the period without sounding put on. A handy glossary of terms is at the front of the book to help you with some of the medieval terms used. All in all an enjoyable and well-researched murder mystery.


The Children's Corner






Highworth Methodist Church says "Goodbye" to Jon Lewis

From our MP

Firstly, by those brave healthcare workers who time and time again continue to put themselves on the front line in our hospitals. By other key workers who continue to go to work because society needs them more than ever – teachers,

childcare providers, supermarket workers, the police – the list goes on. By every single person who came together to clap on their doorstep for the NHS, by those who donated meals to front line workers, and by those who did the shopping for a vulnerable neighbour or relative. And crucially, by the truly remarkable scientists who have worked day and night to deliver us the lifechanging vaccines.

So however hard the last year has been – take comfort from the fact that we all come together, in some way or another.

I know it continues to be a difficult time for all but with the additional Oxford vaccine now being rolled out, and the UK leading the way when it comes to vaccinations, there really is light at the end of the tunnel and with just one last effort from everybody to protect those we hold dear; As HM The Queen said so movingly in her address to the nation last year, 'We will meet again'.
