We have recently returned from a trip to Senegal to work with a mission that works with street children in Dakar.

We had a fantastic and at times heart-wrenching time but one of the things that most impacted me was on a simple morning's chore to get water. Like many places in Africa there was no running water and instead we filled buckets from some huge drums on the compound we were staying in that were intermittently filled from the local well.

I stood in the shade (already it was hot at 9am) with the tap running and a steady but very slow trickle of water gently filling my 25 litre buckets. For a moment I was tempted to

feel frustrated and try and work any way of getting this simple job done more quickly, when instead I just let go and in that moment I felt such peace. There was nothing I could do to speed it up and so I just enjoyed the waiting. UK life is so packed full, so overflowing.



Every job we attempt to complete as quickly as possible so we can get as many things done as possible and reach the great prize which awaits us at the end of the day, at the completion of all things, a sit on the sofa in front of the telly! It is one of the things I have always loved about Africa: it forces me to go slowly and to go simply.

When I consider the life of Jesus, a life that literally changed the world. a man who really transformed the whole of history, I am struck again by how simply and unhurriedly He lived. There's no rush or stress. Time

serves Him somehow and I find it so challenging and magnetic. Jesus seems unfazed by the oppressive political system, the abuses of power,

> poverty and pain. He just gets on with simply loving people and doing whatever His Father has for Him. whatever the cost.

Bring on more opportunities to wait, to stop, to live simply and slowly.

Reasons given described Anita as "working tirelessly... what ever the

I have seen her getting soaked in rainstorms, sweltering in heatwaves and shivering in the ice and snow, yet she always has a kind word and a smiley face and takes a genuine interest in the children she meets. She is vital to the heartbeat of our lovely town". Another comment read "Anita never wants thanks, works humbly and generously, and it would be so wonderful to see her efforts for this town acknowledged".

"Being a Lollipop Lady has always been my dream job," Anna told me. "I had a Lollipop Lady who helped me cross the road to school when I

was little. She was lovely and helped to brighten up those difficult days when everything goes wrong and you feel down. So when I got the job it was a dream come true.

"It can be a challenging job. In winter there is the risk of slippery ice and the sun gets so low that you have to be careful that the cars have seen you. In summer the kids have loads of energy and you have to slow them down so they don't run across the road before you are ready.

"The weather can throw everything at you and

drivers can get a bit impatient. But it is still the best job in the world and I truly feel blessed. I get to impart a bit of road safety to the next generation which hopefully they will never forget. And I get to see the same children every day and watch them grow up."

Anita was presented with her award at the end of a meeting in the Bridge, where she also volunteers and assists with the food bank. "It is an amazing privilege to be awarded the Citizen of the Year trophy, Anita said. "And it has made me feel really valued. Can I say a big thank you to everyone who voted for me".

Voluntary National Insurance can be a great investment

For each year that you pay National Insurance contributions, you generally receive a larger pension. But some taxpayers don't earn enough to pay National Insurance - risking a smaller state pension.

If you are self-employed, Class 2 National Insurance Contributions of £156/year are payable if your profits are over £6,365 (2019/20). But, if your profits are less than £6,365, then you do not have to pay Class 2 NIC - but you are given the option to pay £156 voluntarily.

If you reach state pension age after the 5th April 2016 you need 10 qualifying years to be entitled to any state pension, and the amount of pension you receive will increase until there have been at least 35 qualifying years – at which point your state pension is maximised. So, by paying voluntary NI of £156 you increase your state pension by 1/35th.

News from the Code Club

Southfield Junior School currently run two afternoon code clubs.

In both sessions, children are encouraged to use their imagination and broaden their knowledge of code. They can work together or individually using code of their choice. The children predominately choose to code with Scratch. Scratch is a free block-based visual programming language where they can create their own interactive stories, games and animations. The possibilities are endless.

However, there are many more programming languages to learn such as Python. With the help of Mrs Morgan (parent helper) some of the children have signed up to Mission Zero. This offers children the chance to write a computer

program using Python which, when completed, will be run on Astro Raspberry Pi computers in space on the International Space Station. They can send any message



and create a picture using 30 seconds of code.

All children will receive certificates to show where and when their code was run. Wow!

2019 Weather in my back garden and beyond

What a year it has been for the weather in the UK. We had snow in February, were deluged with rain and had five named storms bringing us high winds and rain. We also experienced some of the hottest days on record.

For several years I have recorded daily rainfall and min/max temperatures in my back garden which have helped produce observations about the weather. The data is compared to that from Met Office sites from around the country and serves as a guide to weather in the local community. See the list below.

Description	Rainfall mm
Annual Highworth 2019	880
Oxford weather station	723
Bradford weather station	1031
Lyneham weather station 30yr average	e 746

Rainfall for Highworth was above local average and less than the UK, which averaged rainfall of 1240mm or 107% of the UK average. (From Met Office data)

Looking at the local rainfall data recorded during 2019 revealed some interesting observations.

- There were 50 days with rainfall above 5.0mm
- There were 93 days with rainfall below 5.0mm
- January was the driest month with 25.5mm of rain.
- November was the wettest month with 120.0mm of rain.

- The longest dry period was 21 days between 26th June and 16th July.
- October had thirteen consecutive days as the longest period with rainfall each day.
- September had the wettest day when 36.5mm of rain fell
- There were five months with rainfall above 100mm: June, Sep, Oct, Nov and Dec.

There were a few high temperature records broken around the country. The highest temperature 38.7° C was recorded in Cambridge and the hottest February day 21.2° C was recorded at Kew Gardens.

The UK mean temperature was 9.4°C which was 0.6°C above the 30 year average. This ranks as the eleventh warmest year in the UK historical series since 1910. All the top ten hottest years in this series have occurred this century. Food for thought!

Here in Highworth it was also warm on those days, but no records were broken. We had 10 days where the maximum temperature was above 30°C.

The average annual temperature in Highworth was 11.92° C, slightly lower than last year's 12.24° C. In comparison, the average annual temperature in Oxford was 11.25° C.

Although it was a wet year, there were 1,455 sunshine hours recorded, 6% higher than the UK average with February being the second sunniest on record for the UK.

CLIMATE CHANGE



Feeling anxious, powerless or overwhelmed about climate change?

You're not alone. The number of local Councils and businesses gearing up for changes in how we live and do business is impressive. However, in the end the result will largely depend on how nearly 8 billion residents of our dear planet Earth adapt to the challenge.

This is the first in a series on climate change in *Ripples Community Magazine* for Fairford and Lechlade, and *Highworth Link Magazine*. These articles reflect the collective thoughts of a group of readers. We came together to try to make sense of the messages from scientists and to share some practical things that individuals can do. This article sets the scene; later we'll develop readers' ideas.

We believe in the mighty power of the collective actions of individuals. As Tesco says: EVERY LITTLE HELPS.

What are our options?

There seems to be two ways to deal with climate change:

- Slow down climate change.
- Mitigate the effects of climate change

These articles focus on the first, SLOWING IT DOWN, because we fear unchecked effects (such as loss of habitats, shortages of food and water and mass migration of displaced people) will be overwhelming. That requires a mass commitment from individuals to reshape our habits, supported by technologies, many not yet invented.

It will still be a big challenge to MITIGATE ITS EFFECTS because the genie is already out of the bottle. This is

largely a task for Government and Business, encouraged by us.

Climate change in a nutshell

Climate scientists have clearly demonstrated the link between the concentration of carbon dioxide (CO₂) in the atmosphere, as well as methane (CH₄) and nitrous oxide (N₂O), and the rate of global warming. Also how the various things we do have caused climate change and are making matters worse. Burning 'fossil fuels' to generate electricity and heat and to power our transport are big contributors.

This is not an 'exact science', but the science points towards unpredictable outcomes that are prompted by rises in temperature (known as 'global warming'). Scientists predict that there will be key temperatures (known as 'tipping points') that will trigger radical and quite unpredictable changes. The science is made all the more complicated by the vast number of causes and effects. The computer models to tell us about this in detail are still in their infancy. We cannot wait, hence we need get going quickly to avoid reaching tipping points.

There is no clear course of action to be found anywhere; no silver bullet, but the way to slow down climate change boils down to only these two credible solutions:

- Emit less CO₂ in the first place.
- Get rid of some of the CO₂.

A lot of our work will be about how we can change our behaviours to emit less CO₂, paying attention to what offers the 'biggest bang for our buck'. For instance

Actions	Meaning	Examples using gas-powered heating
AVOID	Avoid it (completely)	Stop heating our home – impractical
REDUCE	Reduce it (do it less)	Turn down the thermostat and wear more clothes, better insulation – both feasible
REPLACE	Replace it (find another way)	Replace our gas boiler with an electric boiler, powered by renewable energy – still expensive at present
OFFSET	Offset it (find a way to absorb the carbon that's omitted)	Work out how much CO ₂ our boiler generates and plant trees to absorb that CO ₂ – not an instant cure

home energy consumption, transport and backing energy suppliers that don't rely on burning fossil fuels. We'll also explore what individuals can do to absorb CO₂ from the atmosphere such as planting trees and investing in companies that are developing technologies to absorb and make safe CO₂ emissions from generators that use coal, gas and oil.

Along the way, we'll refer to the simple ARRO model (opposite) that we've borrowed from the construction industry. The best is always to Avoid, but many problems get in the way! Offset is the last resort.

Many of the actions to reduce climate change have desirable side effects such as saving money and reducing pollution and congestion although there can be unintended consequences. For example, if we all switched to electric cars *immediately*, the economic and physical disruption would be very difficult to manage.

Recent local news

Cotswold District Council declared a climate emergency in July and is currently recruiting a Climate Emergency Manager to steer the Council towards being a carbon neutral organisation by 2045.

Highworth Town Council declared a climate emergency in January and is setting up a working party to develop specific proposals for the Council.

St Lawrence Eco Church Group in Lechlade is hosting a meeting on Climate Emergency with Dr Martin Hodson

on **Tuesday 12th May** 7.30pm in Lechlade Memorial Hall. Martin is a plant scientist and environmental biologist based in Filkins.





'The Hard Way' - An Interview with Louise Jordan

'The Hard Way' is an exciting new one-woman show which combines song and storytelling to explore the life of Hannah Mitchell. I caught up with the writer and star of the show Louise Jordan...

1. How did you first hear about Hannah Mitchell? How did she become the inspiration for your show?

It was whilst coming to the end of my 2018 tour with 'No Petticoats Here' (telling the stories of extraordinary women of the First World War) that I was commissioned to write a song for UK Parliament's project Vote100. The research for this commission gripped me and urged me to look for lesser known aspects of the women's suffrage campaign. It occurred to me at a couple of conferences I attended (to share the resulting song 'Sooner or Later') that if academics had little knowledge of working-class women's experiences of the campaign for women's enfranchisement, then this aspect of women's history might be lesser known more generally. In the midst of all of this I heard the name 'Hannah Mitchell' and before long had managed to order a copy of Hannah's autobiography through Hampshire's inter-library loan service.

2. What is it about her that you find the most interesting?

Hannah Mitchell recorded her story with the specific purpose of capturing and sharing her experiences with future generations. Hannah's perspective is unique. She is honest, humble, witty and resourceful. Remarkably, Hannah describes herself as 'one very ordinary woman'. She is also a representative of many women who did not record their stories.

3. Do you feel a special connection to Hannah? Has she inspired you or changed your life in some way?

Through her autobiography Hannah shares her life story. From her childhood onwards, Hannah faces knock-backs and is forced to overcome challenges. Leaving home at the age of 14 Hannah seems to realise that she exchanges one life of domestic drudgery and servitude for another and we follow her through various employments as an unqualified worker at the turn of the 19th century. We then follow Hannah through her transition into adulthood, her decision to get married and have a child, her continued employment and struggles with the household budget. All this alongside Hannah's increased frustration at her lot in life, her

inspirational encounters with political speakers and her decision to become a public speaker and eventually a city councillor and magistrate. Anyone who has ever had to overcome challenges in life can connect with the emotional ups and downs which Hannah faces.

4. Was this your first collaborative project? What has it been like working with another musician?

I really enjoy collaborating with other artists and creatives. I worked with theatre maker and director Lizzie Crarer on 'No Petticoats Here' as well as sound designer Jules Bushell. It was great working with Stephanie Jalland of Hoodwink Theatre on this show 'The Hard Way' and Jules also joined us on this project. As a solo artist touring one-woman shows, it's a wonderful opportunity to share the devising process with others – it expands my ideas of what's possible whilst also helping me to maintain a realistic understanding of what's practical!

5. How difficult is it to organise a production like this one? Where do you even start with organising such a thing? How do you pick the venues?

I produce the shows myself and I organise the tour and bookings. I have to keep a balance between making the travelling manageable whilst trying to reach audiences across the UK from Cornwall to Aberdeenshire and as many places in between as possible! The benefits are that I know my own limitations. The touring community is very supportive; I have even received gifts of free-range eggs at performances!

6. Why do you think you are so drawn to the lives of other women and feel so compelled to tell their stories? Are there any other women who inspire you enough to write a production about them?

I am fascinated by human resilience and the ways people manage to achieve positive social change. I am also keen to challenge perceptions of history and to encourage people to be empowered by their heritage. I enjoy understanding other perspectives and believe this encourages empathy and understanding both of the past and the present. I have piles and piles of books at home, many of them autobiographies so there are many shows I have yet to create! I am also a complete museum geek and enjoy travelling so there are many stories I have collected in recent years which could inspire new




shows. I'm currently working on a new show which will start touring in May 2020 with performances at Salisbury Arts Centre and Lighthouse, Poole. 'Florence' will celebrate the lesser known achievements of Florence Nightingale in the 200th year anniversary of her

birth. A pioneering statistician and social reformer for decades of her long life, why does Florence's name merely conjure up images of a lady with a lamp?

Since two of the Churches in Highworth are represented, we feel it is a well-balanced statement with a good contribution to the wider community during these times. We would therefore like the Link to consider printing this letter for the wider community to read.

Statement from Church Leaders ahead of 31st January 2020

On Friday 24th January, Church Leaders released a joint statement regarding the UK's imminent exit from the European Union. This was accompanied by a letter from Church Leaders addressed to partner Churches and Church organisations in Europe.

Statement from British Church leaders and representatives as the UK prepares to leave the European Union.

We, the leaders and representatives of ten British Church denominations and networks, speak together as the UK prepares to leave the European Union on Friday 31st January 2020.

Three and a half years after the UK voted to leave the European Union, the point of departure has now been reached. The process of arriving at this point has been bruising and divisive. For some this date will mark the realisation of a long-held ambition and a moment of celebration. For others, however, it will be an occasion of great loss, marking the moment when deeply held desires for the nations of the UK are placed beyond reach.

Church members in good conscience continue to hold a wide range of views about Brexit. As Church leaders and representatives, we are united in wishing to seek God's guidance and a sense of common purpose as we move from this chapter of the Brexit process into the next.

As the UK leaves the EU, there are important choices to be made about the values that we as a country live out. As Christians, we affirm our belief that all people are equally created in God's image. Our country should be one that offers sanctuary to refugees and is intolerant of those who hate because of a person's race or nationality. Both Leave and Remain campaigns agreed on this and we must now make it a reality.

The continuing challenges of the climate crisis, global inequality and conflict will require both resolve and close international cooperation to be addressed effectively.

We greatly value the love and friendship of our sisters and brothers in other European churches, and a group of us are writing to them publicly today to assure them that these relationships will continue. We also recognise that 31st January will bring uncertainty and anxiety to many EU citizens living in the UK and British citizens living in the EU. Leaving the EU cannot mean abandoning our responsibilities towards these families.

Brexit exposed and exacerbated divisions in British society. The deeply-held convictions that fuelled the Brexit debate will not simply go away, but our Christian faith urges us to be people of peace and reconciliation. If the bitterness of the last four years is not to persist in polluting our national life, we will all need to resist the temptation to hold on onto the hurts of the past or to act in ways which will be perceived as triumphalist.

We will only be able to move towards having a sense of common purpose, despite our differences, when we choose to act with kindness, humility and respect towards those with whom we disagree. We call on our political leaders to set an example over the next weeks and months as we move towards negotiations which will require further decisions about priorities for the nations of the UK.

For our part, our Churches will be working and praying for:

- a society where the poorest and most marginalised are at the centre
- · a society that welcomes the stranger
- a just economy that enables the flourishing of all life
- a planet where the environment is renewed
- a world which actively works for peace
- · a politics characterised by listening, kindness and truthfulness.

We pray for the people of the UK, for our leaders, and for the whole of Europe, as we mark this significant moment together.



What do you know about Counselling?

The work is dependent on the Counsellor trusting the Client's innate sense of their own survival in pursuit of wellness.

Clients' process can be difficult at times, as changing life-time perceptions can be daunting and painful. However, once the Client has understood their process and becomes accustomed to being their new selves, they find alternative ways of seeing their life and behave differently, finding satisfaction and peace.

From our MP

In January, the Prime Minister delivered on his promise to get Brexit done. We have taken back control of our borders, laws and money, and we will once again have an independent trade policy. This is a fantastic opportunity for our country and I am pleased that we can move forward with confidence and certainty.

With the Brexit deadlock broken, the Government can now focus on other key areas such as the NHS, policing, schools and the environment.

The Government has brought forward The Environment Bill, an ambitious piece of legislation that will tackle climate change and better protect our natural environment for generations to come.

New powers will be established by the Bill to stop exports of polluting plastic waste to developing countries, which could prevent harmful waste from being shipped out of sight, whilst also boosting the UK's domestic recycling system. These new powers build on the work the Government has already done to tackle plastic pollution which includes: banning plastic straws, cotton buds and drinks stirrers; one of the world's strongest bans on beauty products containing plastic microbeads and the plastic bag charge, which has seen 15 billion plastic bags removed from circulation.

The new Bill will also require producers to take more responsibility for the products and materials they place on the market as well as introducing a consistent approach to recycling, tackling waste crime, creating powers to introduce bottle deposit return schemes and having more effective litter enforcement.

An independent Office for Environmental

Protection will be established to scrutinise environmental policy and law, investigate complaints and take enforcement action against public authorities and uphold our environmental standards. The office's powers will cover all climate change legislation and hold the Government to account on its commitment to reach net zero emissions by 2050.

The Bill will also include a new commitment to review the biggest developments in environmental legislation from around the world every other year which will drive forward our environmental legislation and ensure that Britain remains at the forefront of efforts to protect our environment.

Tackling climate change and protecting the environment are two of the most challenging issues facing the Government right now and I am very proud of the work it has already done to address them. The Environment Bill is an ambitious piece of legislation and I am delighted that it can finally be brought before Parliament.

Extracts from the minutes of a meeting of Highworth Town Council on 21st January 2020

73. CORRESPONDENCE Email from Cllr Saunders re: Facebook comments on overflowing bin outside the Golf Course Shop. SBC has refused to empty it, despite the Golf Course still being leased to Twigmarket by SBC. HTC is to empty it and take the bin. Cllr M Penny insisted the onus fell on Twigmarket to empty this bin and that SBC should be enforcing this. She will take the matter up with SBC.

75. REPORTS BY REPRESENTATIVES b. HCPG – the following projects are to be taken forward: To identify an overnight space for camper vans; to update the Memorial Garden to improve it; to encourage feedback on the Visitors' Centre and also operate a Visitors' Book.

76. OUESTIONS FROM COUNCILLORS b. Cllr N. Gardiner: Residents have complained that pavements around HTC are in a very poor state and are difficult to manage, especially with walking aids or scooters. Cllr M Penny advised SBC does inspect periodically but problems should be reported to them. Work on the surface of the High Street will entail the whole of the High Street being closed to traffic. d.Cllr J Murphy: Fly-tipping in Sevenhampton is an ongoing issue, e.Cllr Bishop: Councillor (Mrs) J Bishop is to take up the unsightly mess at 48 High Street with the Conservation Officer at SBC, f.Cllr S Wolfensohn: The repairs to McColl's Newsagents are still outstanding. Regular updates are received from the Conservation Officer at SBC. The guttering has been cleared but the building repairs are yet to be completed.




