#### Citizen of the Month for October: Rosemary Jackson, 1935-2020

Rosemary did a lot for Highworth and fully deserves to be recognised as our Citizen of the Month for October.

She was born on the 22nd September 1935 in Hebburn, Newcastle. She was the eldest of eight siblings and had four children: Margaret, Norma, Ronny and James.

Rosemary met her husband Keith Jackson in Henley Upon Thames in 1977 when romance began to bloom between the two. The pair finally moved to Houston, USA in 1981 and married five years later.

Rosemary had a variety of jobs over her life. Whilst in Houston she ran a Marriot Hotel. When the couple returned to the UK in the early '90s she was employed as a cook at Windsor Fire Station. When the devasting fire at Windsor Castle happened in 1992, it was Rosemary who kept the 225 firefighters drawn from all over the south and south east, fed with sandwiches and copious cups of tea. She worked 72 hours without a break and was presented with a medal for her services from the Queen.

Rosemary was an active member of Slough Lions (whose local club in Windsor didn't accept females at the time) and through mutual friends she was introduced to Frieda Cox who was keen to transfer her into the Highworth Lions when the couple moved to Queen's Avenue in November 2004.

Rosemary returned to college at the age of 70 to retrain as an Environmental Health officer. Her favourite story to tell was of the time she and a work colleague visited Tidworth and caused a security breach. Rosemary left her work bag on the pavement by the car and drove away. It was only after stopping for a cup of tea that the pair realised the bag was missing. They returned to Tidworth to find a scene from a movie. The road back to the bag had armed soldiers turning away cars. When they explained the situation, they were allowed through to collect the bag which was in a cordoned-off area about to be detonated with a controlled explosion. They managed to get the workbag back but not before a severe telling off from the army officer in change.

Rosemary received the Melvin Jones Fellowship for her numerous projects in Highworth, an honour awarded by the Lions to recognise an individual's dedication to humanitarian service. She trained numerous residents to use the defibrillators around the town. She organised the Easter Egg raffle every year which raised thousands for the Lions. She helped launch the Memory Café and supported at the Highworth Lunch Club. She was instrumental in setting up a ladies Highworth Town football team, organised a bag sale at the Great Western Hospital every year and was always Santa's helper at Christmas time.

Rosemary will be greatly missed by Keith and her four children, five grandchildren and three great grandchildren, as well as by her numerous friends around the town and elsewhere in the world.

#### Some personal recollections:

"It always felt like we were meant to be together. She was the loveliest woman in the world. She never got upset and I never saw her argue. She always thought more about doing things for others then about herself. She was a real fighter, she never complained. Nothing was ever too much trouble, no matter how much pain she was in or how ill she was. If something had to be done then she got on and did it. It is going to be very hard to carry on without her."

"Rosemary joined the Highworth and District Lions Club in June 2005, but before that she had been an active Member of Slough Lions Club for many years. During her time with the Highworth and District Lions Club she was President from 2009 to 2011 as well as holding a District Cabinet Office of Zone Chairperson for the year 2009/10.

"Rosemary guickly became involved in the Community and the Lions Club with her friendly and welcoming outlook and her desire to help others. She was a well-known figure and had many friends and acquaintances in the Town. As well as being actively involved with various Lions Club activities and projects, she was also the Club Publicity Officer and for several years wrote the 'Lion's Den' in the LINK Magazine and wrote many articles for the Swindon Advertiser. In additional to all this and despite the fact that her health was failing, she still found time to become involved with the local Neighbourhood Watch and was a keen supporter and fund raiser for the Brighter Futures fund at the Great Western Hospital.

"Rosemary will be remembered for her friendly and outgoing personality and her dogged attitude to getting things done despite her health problems. She was a very good friend to Highworth and to Lions Clubs International and will be sorely missed."

She always joined us for the meals and with her easy smile, was loved by everyone. She will be very sadly missed by all of us, volunteers and guests alike." "I first met Rosemary about 10 years ago after she came to Highworth and joined the Lions. We soon became good friends with a lot in common.

"Rosemary had led an active and interesting life and had travelled extensively. She used to talk about her early life growing up in the North of England during World War II and witnessing the air raids.

"I will miss Rosemary for her friendship and support as well as her chats on the phone for advice about various issues. Rosemary fought hard through her illness and was well cared for by Keith and her family."

"We would meet every so often for a natter over a cup of tea and she was kind enough to attend my children's schools' Grandparents Tea Party when their own grandparents could not so that they were able to enjoy the cakes (and miss a lesson or two). She is one of those people who soon creeps into your heart and although her passing upset me greatly, I know that her kindness will always form a part of me. I feel honoured to have know and loved her, if only for a short period."

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#### **Highworth Historical Society**

As our meetings are not going ahead at the time of writing here is a little taste of Highworth in the past:

#### The A361 to Swindon

Many of you will have crawled up the hill to Highworth behind a slow-moving vehicle. It could have been worse!

In 1792 the Lechlade to Swindon road was turnpiked. Pike houses were built to collect the fees from passing traffic. The one on the Swindon side of Highworth still stands, although much altered. This was known as The Bury Turnpike as it was built on the Bury Ground (part of the late golf course).

The hill always proved a problem to coaches. In January 1831 it was agreed that the Turnpike Company would pay £230 for unemployed men to lower the hill. "So that the rise shall not exceed two inches in the yard." This would help the parish with the funds being raised in aid of the unemployed. The work was done with picks and shovels. The earth thrown up can still be seen on the right as a raised embankment.

The original cottages on the left in the dip were

At John Phipps' death, the properties that he owned in the town were sold by auction. This took place at the Saracen's Head in 1864. As well as the Redlands cottages there were:-

- A house in the Market Place
- Two cottages in Cricklade Road
- Four houses in Westrop Terrace
- All of Bailey's Piece (a house and 18 cottages)
- A property in the Kempsford Road
- 10 Cottages on the south side of the Faringdon Road

Arkells bought seven of the Redland properties for £785. The reserve price had been £3 each. Our house at number 16 became a beer house, The Rampant Cat.

I have built up a lot of information about the Redlands properties and residents. More is always welcome.

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#### LOCAL HISTORY

#### 'The Bunk' or 'The Snailwaytrain'

This was Highworth's train to Swindon. Calling at Hannington, near the Freke Arms, Stanton Fitzwarren and Stratton.

After initial difficulties with the build the project was taken over by the GWR and the line opened in 1883.

In 1890 a works train left Highworth at 5.20am and returned at 5.45pm. Men no longer needed to walk to work at the Railway Works in Swindon.

The portion of line between Hannington and Highworth contained the steepest railway gradient in Wiltshire. A stretch of track just over half a mile long rose 1 in 44. In steam days the procedure was to open the regulator fully for full power and just blast your way up the incline. Once at Highworth care had to be taken that the train did not return to Swindon by itself!

There was no turntable at the station so the return journey was made with the coal bunker at the front.

#### **Station Masters**

A Mr North was the first but he only stayed for about a year.

Mr Robert Perrett came next and stayed until 1904. He lived in one of the cottages in the small lane from Swindon Road to Shrivenham Road just below the garage. From 1888 to 1903 James Bishop, the Hannington station master, lived in Highworth on Swindon Street.

Mr H. D. Mant arrived in 1904. He lived first in Westrop Terrace, then in the Station Master's House, built in 1911. He played a large part in the life of the town often acting as Master of Ceremonies at dances.

When he retired, the town lost their Station Master and come under Stratton. In WWII, with much increased trade on the line, Mr Samuel Toy moved from Leading Porter to Station Master. In 1939 he was living at 24 Park Avenue.

#### Freight on the line

Around 20 tons of coal came in every week for the Gas Company as well as supplies for the town's coal merchants. Bales of coco-mat fibre arrived for the Vorda Works. Bartrops sent tractors and parts (in WWI they were sending out 24 tons of horseshoes a week for the army). Large quantities of milk were carried from the local farms.

The last passenger train was on 28th February 1953. On 3rd August 1962 the final works train left. Exploding detonators marked the traditional way to see out the life of a branch.

The next Monday the workers had to pay 2/6d a day to travel by bus. The trains had carried them free of charge.

#### Memories of a trip on the line

This piece was sent to me by a lady who used to live in Eastrop.

"On Saturdays there was a shopping train to Swindon at 1pm which returned at 6pm. I think that it cost 1/- return; railway workers and their families travelled free. Mothers could take babies in their prams in the guard's van. "When the train stopped at the level crossing on the Blunsdon Road, the guard opened the gate and closed the road off. The driver would take the train across to the other side and then wait for the guard to open the road. Whilst this was happening, children would jump down and pick flowers and climb back on the train at the other side. "It was a lovely ride and a treat.

"One evening my father was late coming home from work because there was a cow on the railway line and it had derailed the train."

#### A History of Disease in Highworth

#### SARS-CoV-2, the coronavirus which causes COVID-19, is not the first deadly disease to reach Highworth.

There was a bad outbreak of Bubonic Plague in the town in 1646 which killed 81 residents. It was probably brought here by the Parliamentarians who were occupying Highworth who took it from the Royalists the year before. Bubonic Plaque is caused by the bacterium Yersinia pestis and is spread to humans via a flea bite. Once the bacteria enter the human body, they travel through the lymphatic system releasing toxins that causing flu-like symptoms such as fever, headaches and vomiting over the first 1-7 days. Once the bacteria reach and infect the lymph nodes they cause these nodes to swell and occasionally break open, potentially infecting others. Death occurred on day ten. The number of deaths in Highworth had already been high for several years before the plague, suggesting that Highworth had poor sanitation at this time.

Smallpox was another disease that ravaged the land in the C18th. Like SARS-CoV-2, smallpox is caused by a virus, is highly infectious and is transmitted by close contact with infected individuals or via contaminated objects. Sufferers first experience fever and vomiting, followed by a skin rash and the formation of sores in the mouth. Over a number of days this skin rash worsens and is replaced by fluid-filled bumps which scab over leaving scars and, in a third of all cases, blindness. Highworth had a bad outbreak in 1790 that killed 88 people.

Most inoculations in the C18th were very dangerous as doctors took pus from a person with a milder case of smallpox and transferred it to another by scratching it into the skin. The patient would then also contract smallpox, but hopefully in a more survivable form. But from 1774 a new type of inoculation was being used in the local area by Benjamin Jetsy fom Yetminister who used pus from cows suffering from cowpox instead. Which method Highworth used is unknown but in 1790 the entire town was inoculated with costs being covered by the Poor Rate, a special tax on property that the parish used to pay for the workhouse, to remove the unemployed poor to their own parishes and for other forms of poor relief. Around this time, Highworth also built two isolation houses: the Smallpox house (believed to lie somewhere between Botany Farm and Swindon Road) where smallpox victims were sent to be isolated from the community, and an Enoculating House were newly inoculated people stayed until they were no longer contagious.

Let's hope it is a long time before deadly contagious disease reaches our town again.



#### **Domestic Abuse**

Many of you may have watched the Victoria Derbyshire Panorama documentary 'Living with my Abuser' on the BBC.

Domestic Abuse has become even more prevalent since the COVID-19 pandemic: women being forced into isolation with their perpetrator, suffering from coercive control, physical and sexual abuse. The horrific statistics across England are that one in three women will suffer from Domestic Abuse in their lifetime and two women are killed every week by either their current or former partner.

At Swindon Domestic Abuse Support Service, we help over 7,000 women every year. We have a

refuge in Swindon with 22 self-contained flats, housing women and children up to the age of 18 years old. We have a Community Service where we are supporting 70 or more women at any one time.

Swindon Domestic Abuse Support Service now run the Helpline for Wiltshire for all the out of hours service Mon – Friday, 9pm – 9am and all weekends. We are there to help 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

#### It's up to all of us to control the spread of coronavirus

Crucially, anyone who has symptoms must book a test immediately. You can book a test, either at a local testing centre or by ordering a home testing kit, by calling 119 or visiting the NHS website.

The Council's 'Swindon: It's up to all of us' campaign was launched in August and aims to engage the community and encourage everyone to play their part in keeping Swindon and the surrounding areas safe. So far, this work has included leaflet drops, engagement with local businesses and community groups, and social media campaigns.

Regular updates are given on Swindon Borough Council's Facebook and Twitter pages, so head there to find out the latest information and advice. Together, we can control the spread of COVID-19.

#### Hello Highworth Residents, past and present

We want to put a 'call out' to those of you who have walked, and would like to continue to walk, a path that has recently been blocked by a landowner/developer.

The path in question is a short one but has been important to residents in the area for a long period.

We are sure the path will be, or will have been, familiar to many of you. It is the path opposite the entrance to Wrag Barn Golf Club on the Highworth to Shrivenham Road. For many recent years it has been a mixed surface single track 'road' leading to, and beyond, the dilapidated barns, which are now undergoing renovation.

The section of this path that is relevant to our request for help and information is the small section that leads from the road to the intersection with the public right of way that leads out of Highworth and past Warneford School. See map for detail, the path in question is in yellow highlighter.

To get public access to the path restored, it will be necessary to provide evidence that it has been used by the general public "as of right" for a period of at least 20 years prior to it being blocked.

It is imperative that we get as many residents as possible who have used the path to help us by completing a User Evidence Form. Any relevant documentary evidence in the form of historic documents, maps or photographs would also be welcome.

The responses will form the basis for an 'APPLICATION FOR A MODIFICATION TO THE DEFINITIVE MAP AND STATEMENT', which is the legal record of public rights of way held by Swindon Borough Council as highway authority.

We will provide the necessary forms and will be happy to help in their completion. We have enlisted the help of the local group of The Ramblers,

#### 'The Tapestry of Life' by Beryl Wicker

Published last year, this collection of 51 poems is an eclectic mix of childhood memories, observances of reallife people and explorations of the natural world. It is the perfect gift for those hard-tobuy-for occasions, with a short intro to put each poem in context and a scattering of personal photos. But most importantly, its poems have the power to hold the attention and move you to tears or make you laugh out loud.

Beryl has written poems ever since childhood. Her father would recite Shakespeare in the car and both her parents encouraged her love of the

English language from a very early age. A few of Beryl's poems have been published before in various anthologies but it was Val who really made the book a possibility. Beryl's poems would sometimes be read out in Church and were widely admired by the Methodist congregation. Long-standing friend Val recognised that these poems deserved to be collected and typed up before they were lost and, once she had amassed enough poems, she found a publisher through a friend and helped Beryl make the book a reality.

"I have no idea where most of the poems come from," Beryl told me. "I will get up in the morning and they are just there, waiting to be written down. The last verse is always the



hardest and sometimes the poems end very differently to how I thought they would when I first started writing. Finding a suitable title also requires a great deal of time and thought. It took me ages to come up with the title of the book but once I had decided on it then I wrote the first poem as a means of introducing the rest."

Lockdown has given Beryl the opportunity to write enough poems for a second book, this time entitled 'The Patchwork of Life.' "I needed something to keep my brain going," Beryl said. "And writing poetry certainly helps to keep the mind young.

"I have had a number of lovely letters and cards from readers here and in far-away places like Australia, Hong Kong, North America and even the Outer Hebrides. The new book has a page showcasing some of these messages. I have also included more personal photos and hope that readers will enjoy my second book as much as the first."

# Local Rotary club contributes to Africa region being declared wild polio-free

The Rotary Club of Swindon North has played a role in a significant global public health achievement, as the World Health Organization's (WHO) Africa region has officially been certified wild polio-free.

Polio is a debilitating disease, mainly affecting children, which can cause paralysis and even death. But decades of effort from Rotary clubs and volunteers around the world who have fundraised, campaigned

and worked tirelessly for more than 30 years, has helped eradicate polio from Africa. The certification comes four years after Nigeria, the last polio-endemic country in Africa, recorded its

final case of wild polio and now means that of the WHO's six regions, five of those, accounting for 90% of the world's population, are free from polio.

Globally, more than 2.5 billion children have been protected against the disease, which has reduced the number of cases by 99.9% from around 1,000 cases per day in 125 countries. The Rotary Club of Swindon North has played its part towards the End Polio

Now campaign in the recent past by holding fundraising events, making donations and arranging awareness-raising activities such as purple crocus planting.

The Rotary Club of Swindon North's President, Kathy Hobson, said, "This is a terrific landmark in



the world's battle to eradicate polio. Although it has been many years since polio has been present in the UK and Ireland, we are proud to have contributed to the alobal efforts to eliminate the disease for good. We remain committed to making the final, challenging steps towards making a polio-free world a reality. If we don't finish the job, it is estimated that, within 10 years, as many as 200,000 children

annually all over the world could succumb to polio, including here in the UK. The virus can literally be a plane ride away so vaccination is so important."



AFRICAN REGION CERTIFIED WILD POLIO-FREE Despite this significant milestone being reached, the job to fully rid the world of polio goes on as the virus continues to circulate in parts of Pakistan and Afghanistan. In order to sustain this progress, vaccination programmes must continue to protect every last child and strengthen routine immunisation to keep immunity levels high so the virus does not return to Africa or other parts of the world, including the UK. Rotary has

directly contributed more than US\$2 billion to ending polio since 1985.

# Avoiding meat and dairy products

This is the 5th part of a series of articles about what individuals can do about climate change, comprising ideas from readers of Ripples Community Magazine for Fairford and Lechlade and Highworth Link Magazine. This article focuses on how eating meat and dairy products contributes to climate change.

Climate scientists have long argued that the West's current consumption of meat and dairy products is unsustainable. This is a worldwide challenge and although the NFU (www.nfuonline.com) have an aspiration to make British farms carbon neutral by 2040, it is recognised that it will not be reached and will require significant government subsidy. However, some UK farmers are doing good work by helping degraded land to regenerate and increasing biodiversity. It is important that local communities support such activities.

Why? Climate change is starting to affect more and more people globally and is fuelled by greenhouse gases. In some parts of the world, such as Libya and Bangladesh, it is becoming commonplace for temperatures to exceed 50°C for months at a time.

The UK Committee on Climate Change has warned the Government that if we maintain current carbon use, a global temperature rise of  $3 - 4^{\circ}$ C is likely over 80 years. This does not sound a lot but will bring Saharan type conditions to southern Europe making it increasingly difficult to farm.

How? Methane (CH<sub>4</sub>) is the second largest contributor to global warming after carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>). Some 60% comes from agriculture. Cows, sheep, goats and other ruminant animals break down food in their stomachs through fermentation, producing methane. Manure also produces methane. Intensively raised animals produce vast quantities of slurry. Some is used on the fields as fertiliser but if too much is used, it is leached out by the rain and can contaminate water courses, ground water and drinking water supplies or drain off through streams and rivers into the sea.

Manure, slurry and overuse of fertilisers also release nitrous oxide ( $N_2O$ ), another very potent greenhouse gas that is much more resistant to breakdown within the atmospheric layers than  $CH_4$ . It also contributes to

ozone depletion. Ozone is critical for filtering out the more harmful UV rays from the sun before they reach the earth's surface.

The Met office says methane is 30 times more powerful than carbon dioxide as a greenhouse gas and nitrous oxide is nearly 300 times more potent than carbon dioxide.

Only about 6% of land management in Europe is organic. The vast bulk of food production relies on high inputs of fertiliser, pesticides, antibiotics and intensive feeding of animals. This results in CH<sub>4</sub> and N<sub>2</sub>O from the animals and their slurry and CO<sub>2</sub> released when ploughing land for feed crops for intensively reared animals.

Our World in Data (www.ourworldindata.org) shows that the livestock industries use more than 70% of the world's agricultural land yet produce only about 20% of food caloric supply and about 30% of food protein supply.

Many nations traditionally eat very little meat in comparison to the western diet, but research shows that increasing affluence increases meat consumption and if all nations ate a North American diet, we would need two planets to provide the land required.

#### What is a vegetarian?

The definition is loosely used but generally a vegetarian is a person who does not eat meat, fish or seafood.

Avoiding meat, fish and seafood is a major way to reduce your environmental impact on the planet. This is a good time to try a vegetarian diet as many people are working from home and have more time to cook and to experiment with recipes.

A vegetarian diet uses a whole range of different foodstuffs and the range of tastes far exceed the range of meats available. Plant foods also contain a much wider range of vitamins, minerals and fibre than meats. Many western diets are lacking in soluble fibre which is essential for a healthy digestive system.

Actions	Examples using meat		
AVOID it (completely)	Adopt a wholly vegetarian diet		
REDUCE it (do it less)	Have fewer meat meals		
REPLACE it (find another way)	Switch to meat substitutes that are plant-based		
OFFSET it (find a way to absorb the harmful gases emitted)	Not an option		

#### How can we help?

#### AVOID

Go vegetarian (or even vegan). Not for everyone but you may want to try. Keep reducing your intake of animal produce (see above).

#### REDUCE

Cut down your consumption of animal flesh. If you eat a lot of animal products, perhaps start to reduce in small steps.

#### REPLACE

Substitute plant-based ingredients into meat and dairy recipes.

#### OFFSET

This is probably not really an option for meat and dairy consumption because, unlike  $CO_2$  emissions, trees do not absorb methane and nitrous oxide.

#### Can't give up meat?

Every meat meal you replace will make a difference. If you do buy meat, buy good quality, local meat and ask questions about where and how it has been reared. Even if you reduce your meat and dairy consumption by just a quarter, you can reduce your carbon emissions significantly. You may find that your health will benefit and, as pulses are very cheap compared to meat, your pocket will too. Try not to just buy the processed 'meat' alternatives as that can be expensive and they have the same disadvantages as other processed foods.

By reducing your meat and dairy there will be less forest clearance for grazing and growing soya for animal feed, fewer air miles, less transportation generally and less refrigeration and packaging. What have you got to lose by giving it a go?

#### Have a go at these

Learn about vegetarian diet at the Vegetarian Society (www.vegsoc.org), vegan diets at the Vegan Society (www.vegansociety.com) and search for 'vegetarian' and 'vegan' on the NHS (www.nhs.uk).

Have one meat-free day a week then steadily increase the number of days a week you don't eat meat or meat products until you are completely meat-free.

Try the tasty vegetarian recipes at BBC Good Food (www.bbcgoodfood.com), Waitrose (www.waitrose.com) and other major supermarkets.

Substitute some of the meat in your usual recipe with pulses, grains or vegetables or tofu. For example, puy lentils are a good addition to mince recipes.

Get 'meaty' flavour from soy sauce, dried mushrooms or marmite; meaty texture from aubergines, jackfruit or pulses; cheesy flavour from sumach or yeast flakes. Roasted cauliflower with sumach is delicious.

Try other milks such as rice, oat or coconut. The majority are fortified and contain the same calcium and vitamin levels as cows' milk.

Get your calcium from green, leafy vegetables, broccoli, spinach, nuts, seeds, (especially sesame), and bread.

Pressure cookers are far easier to use than many people think and can cook large amounts of soaked pulses in less than 25 minutes.

#### **KEY POINTS:**

Methane and nitrous oxide, gases produced by meat and dairy agriculture, are far more potent greenhouse gases than carbon dioxide.

The livestock industries use more than 70% of the world's agricultural land yet produce only about

20% of food caloric supply and about 30% of food protein supply.

We need less meat and dairy and more plantbased options in our food system if we're to reach our climate goals.

## From our MP

Sadly, young people suffer the most during economic downturns. As such, my colleagues and I at the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP), and across government, have been working flat out to ensure that young people are at the heart of our post-COVID-19 economic recovery.

As part of these efforts, we launched the Government's ambitious £2 billion Kickstart Scheme this week. The scheme encourages employers, of all sizes, to place 16-24 year olds on 6 month Kickstart placements in the private, public and voluntary sectors. Employers will receive funding for 100% of the relevant National Minimum Wage for 25 hours a week, plus associated employer National Insurance contributions and employer minimum autoenrolment pension contributions.

The goal of this scheme is to provide those young people who are claiming Universal Credit and are at risk of long-term unemployment with the opportunity to gather real-world experience and get a foot on the job ladder. They will gain experience and confidence, build skills and boost their career prospects significantly. I therefore encourage our local businesses to utilise this fantastic scheme.

The Kickstart scheme comes as part of the Government's wider £30 billion Plan for Jobs. This substantial package of support will help people find existing jobs, will create new jobs through investment in infrastructure and housing and protect jobs by revitalising those sectors which have been hardest hit.

As part of the Plan for Jobs, we are also offering employers cash bonuses to hire trainees and apprentices. The Government is offering employers a £1,000 incentive for each new Trainee they hire, £2,000 for each new apprentice they hire under the age of 25 and £1,500 for any apprentice aged over 25.

One of the challenges we face as a nation is ensuring that our young people have the relevant skills needed to fill future roles in highvalue sectors. As such, we are providing £101 million to help 18- and 19-year olds to take high value courses at Levels 2 and 3, helping them obtain the skills needed to find work in sectors such as engineering, construction and social care.

During this uncertain time, it is also important that people have access to qualified advice and guidance. We are therefore expanding the National Careers Service by providing over £30m to recruit more careers advisers. We are doubling the number of Work Coaches through Job Centre Plus to 27,000, expanding the Work & Health Programme to provide intensive support to people unemployed for at least three months and will also launch a new scheme to support the long-term unemployed.

From this month, we are also providing a guaranteed foundation of support for all 18-24 year olds on Universal Credit. The Youth Offer will include 13 weeks of intensive support including a referral to work-related training or an apprenticeship.

I am at the heart of these efforts to support young people during this difficult time. I will continue to work with colleagues to ensure that young people are front and centre in our post-COVID-19 economic recovery.

#### **History Unearthed**



A Second World War dog-tag belonging to a US soldier has turned up in a Filkins back garden. The tag belonged to James V Pieper from Illinois, a surgical technician in a medical unit. During the Second World War, Bradwell Grove Hospital near Filkins, now Bradwell Village, was built as a transit camp for troops and later used as a receiving base for casualties, mostly American. Pieper worked as a surgical technician, applying and removing casts and other orthopaedic mechanics. He was discharged in April 1946 with an illness contracted in the line of duty, possibly due to the plaster-dust used in the casts. Pieper died in 1992.

#### VWHDC Councillors refuse planning permission for Steeds Farmland

Planning permission for 125 houses has been denied on the grounds of insufficient affordable housing and reduced s106 for infrastructure at Faringdon, Great Coxwell, and the Health Centre. Planners and developers say the site would not be viable if higher amounts need to be paid.

£470k is included in the legal agreement for changes to the Gt Coxwell junction (OCC are already holding £1.7m for this).
