Why Me?

The other night I was 10 minutes from putting the finishing touches to a special evening meal for my wife and I when the smoke alarm beeped. Now I am far from being a technical whizz but I knew that beep meant the battery was low. I expertly removed the unit, attached a new battery and replaced it all while stirring the sauce and checking the marinated parma wrapped chicken breasts weren't burning. All was well. Then; 'beep'. The other smoke alarm, this one in the hall, strangely needed my attention as well. Slightly annoyed I jumped to and replaced that unit's battery. Sorted. A minute later however, whilst tossing the mini roasties in some sea salt; 'beep!'

'What?' My stress levels rose. I pressed the reset buttons hoping the beeping would stop but to no avail. My expertly created wonder dinner was fast degenerating so I removed both units and took out their respective batteries thinking I would sort the problem after we had eaten. Beep!

How? Where is the beep coming from? They must have a mains powered alarm. The only thing for it, my overcooked brain thought, was to disconnect the units from the mains. I rushed to the garage, grabbed the right tools, turned the power off to the units and unscrewed them from the ceiling and the mains electricity supply.

The meal was ruined but I was victorious. Beep! You have got to be kidding me. I was tired. Stressed. Angry

and at a complete loss. And then I noticed the old alarm. The one the new units replaced 6 years ago. The one I had never touched. Beep. Noooooo!

Why me? It's a phrase, a viewpoint we often encounter at silly times, like I have detailed above, and also at major life-altering circumstances. Why me? What have I done to deserve this? It's probably one of the most unhelpful questions we can ever ask. It cries for answers that are unlikely found, focuses on the negative and leaves us frustrated, discouraged and self-centered.

As we move into new freedoms and new challenges the "why me's" will keep coming. Can I encourage you to instead replace that cry with a new one? Instead of why me you can ask: "Why not me?" Solidarity with a suffering world, whilst still leaving you with your mess, recognises suffering happens to all and sets us up for better questions like "What do I do now?" "What do I need to get through this?" and "Who can help me?"

These better questions have changed my life. Through them I have discovered faith, purpose and comfort. Unfortunately, burnt meals and misdiagnosed beeps are part of living in this messy world. I pray however, that you find the courage to ask better questions and through them find the strength, support and encouragement you need to keep going, keep living and find meaning. Blessings.

Highworth charity urges those in debt to get urgent help as lockdown restrictions are eased

Highworth Churches Together have been running a Christians Against Poverty (CAP) debt centre for seven years. The free service is available to all people in the surrounding area.

The combination of rising unemployment, reduced hours, illness and larger bills covering the period when so many people have been at home has created a situation where many people now have unmanageable debt. As people emerge from lockdown, the uncertain economic effects may impact people hard. However, for people here in Highworth and the surrounding area, there is a solution.

Kathryn Ford, Highworth CAP Debt Centre Manager, said: "Although we've continued helping people out of debt throughout the pandemic, we know that many people have been in survival mode and it's only as we come out of lockdown that they will start to seek help. We want everyone to know that we're here to give that help completely free of charge along with localised support, understanding and encouragement".

The Debt Centre currently has appointments available so we're urging people to get in contact as soon as possible to get help and get their lives back on track.

There is a team of volunteers, some of whom have been in debt themselves and are now out the other side, able to give a helping hand with practical solutions.

CAP client, Lisa*, said:

"Without CAP I think I would probably be dead as I wouldn't have had money to buy food! Now,

I'm going to Uni! Now, I know I can afford it and I feel mentally better, I'm hoping to change people's lives the way CAP has changed mine."

Pentylands Country Park Community Tree Planting

Back in September 2020, when the Friends of Pentylands Country Park were asked by the Great Western Community Forest to participate in a nationwide initiative to plant trees, it all seemed so simple.

We just had to arrange a day for the community to help plant 5000 trees in the park. Not a problem. In 2009 The Valentine's Day tree plant saw the community planting 400 trees in one day and contractors planting the remaining 2450 trees.

Then it started. Why only 5000 trees? Why not one for every resident of Highworth? Sounds a good idea. How many residents do we have in Highworth? Well, the 2011 census said we had 8000, let's play it safe, go for 10,000.

It soon began to look not so great. That number of trees required a licence, mapping of the planting areas, desktop archaeological surveys and details of all utilities, electricity, gas, sewage and water mains (3) with a 4th scheduled.

Throw in last minute requirements for ground radar surveys, shortages of trees, tree guards and stakes and COVID restrictions dictating the need for booked planting slots, and we were starting to feel that it really wasn't such a good idea.

At the last minute, a supplier came through with 4,500 trees and it allowed us to steam ahead. Public response was exceptional. Spread over two weeks, hundreds turned out to help plant, including the Mayor Richard Williams who visited each weekend to help with the planting. Some planted one or two trees, others larger numbers, but the important thing is that every tree counted.





One family who had never done any tree planting in their lives started with one tree each and ended up planting 63. A company, HRMI / NERC based in Swindon, planted 500.

Southfields School planted 250. The Pre-School play group planted over 100, but one family of four planted 200 trees; now that's impressive.

Being on site everyday was extremely rewarding. There was such a buzz from children and adults alike. Some families returned numerous times to plant "Just a few more trees".

By the time you read this, 10,000 trees will be in the ground and the stress, worry and sleepless nights will be a thing of fading dreams.

Thanks go to Marjorie Saunders, Berit Aherne, Paul Newton-Smith and others who helped out on the day, organising the planting events, booking everyone in and spacing out the planting area with poles, etc.

Special thanks go to the people of Highworth who gave up their time to help make this tree planting a success. You are phenomenal. You should be proud of yourselves. Without you, this couldn't have happened. Your efforts have truly made Pentylands Country Park, HIGHWORTH's BREATHING SPACE.

My thanks and appreciation go out to you all.

Swindon SEND Families Voice is a parent carer forum run by parents and carers. We are a non-profit making Community Interest Company and have been supporting local parents for over three years. We support all parents and carers in the Swindon area



who have a child or young adult aged 0-25 with any Special Educational Need or Disability (SEND) whether they have an official diagnosis or not.

We do this through providing free workshops, support groups and 1:1 support. We understand how challenging it can be to a parent of a child with any kind of additional need and we don't want any parent in our community to feel isolated and lonely. We are always only a phone call, email or message away!

Through the pandemic, we have been supporting parents by offering virtual coffee mornings and a telephone support line, sending our 'Helpful Guide' books to 500 parents. In the summer term we will be sending out 300 Support Packs! We can't wait for restrictions to ease so that we can get back to what we love doing, which is visiting

schools and meeting parents face-to-face!
Another big part of what we do is to work with
Swindon Borough Council and Clinical
Commissioning Group (who commission our
health services) to try to improve services for
families who have children with additional needs,
so we always want to hear from parents about
their experiences about local services.

Increased police patrols in Highworth

You may have noticed more police officers around Highworth Town Juniors Football Club following an increase in criminal damage there.

We've received reports from the club that, in the past couple of months, a large group of youths (approx. 15 in total) has been leaving drug paraphernalia and smashed bottles of alcohol at the clubhouse.

PC Sam Walton said: "The increase in anti-social behaviour and criminal damage means the club has to pay for the clearing up; costing time and money.

"The group, which has also been caught on CCTV, is also showing no regard for the COVID rules, mixing with others from many households and putting them and their families at risk.

"We will be increasing our patrols to find the perpetrators and to prevent further damage.

"We would ask that any member of the public who sees or hears anything suspicious in this area to report it to us via 101 quoting crime reference number 54200094277."



Local Environmental and Peace group join up for socially distanced demonstration against US/UK Trade deal

A few members of Faringdon Peace Group and Extinction Rebellion joined up with other environmental groups to protest about the ongoing negotiations with the US in connection with a possible US/UK trade deal.

The main issues of concern are:

- 1. The negotiations are been carried out in secret with no parliamentary oversight and will lead to lower food and environmental standards. E.g. Unlabelled chlorine-washed chicken and hormone injected beef. The US views UK standards as barriers to trade. The UK uses the 'Precautionary Principle' which means a substance or practice has to be proven safe before it can be used. The US don't have that.
- 2. The terms of the deal are enforced through International Investor State Dispute Settlement Courts (ISDS courts) where corporations can sue governments if a change in regulations means the corporation loses profit. If the UK enacts policies for the benefit of UK citizens, e.g clean air policies which results in lower profits for US corporations, the corporations can sue the UK government in the ISDS courts for loss of profit and there is no appeal.

- The talks exclude any discussion of carbon emission reduction targets, i.e. an issue as the deal lasts for 30 years and US standards are lower than ours.
- 4. The talks will lead to increasing privatisation of the NHS and higher drug prices. Higher drug prices have already been agreed but the main prize for the US is our NHS where they want increasing access for US healthcare companies and a move towards the US system of insurance-based healthcare and the reduction of the existing free at the point of use healthcare as in the NHS which is the envy of the world.
- 5. Poor trade deals fuel climate chaos and war.

Murder in Eastrop

The burial records for St. Michael's Church in December 1835 contain the following. 'Buried Eliza Jones, an Irish woman, Murdered.'

Several papers told the sad story of a jealous man

The main witness to the event was Sophia Dix. She was the servant of a Richard Griffiths of Eastrop. He kept a beer house and lodgings for poor travellers.

On Monday 7th December, Eliza had arrived at the house along with another woman, three children and a blind man. All were strangers and 'trampers'.

Some two hours later, about 7.45pm, a Henry Wynn came into the house and confronted the blind man. "Joe I don't thank you for sending me out on a walk and taking my woman away with thee." The blind man denied this and Eliza told him not to fall into a passion. She did not come with anyone.

At this, Wynn called her a liar and struck her on the head with his hand. He then took out a clasp knife, opened it saying "I have a d-d good mind to stab thee." Eliza was very frightened and got into a corner. A John Dyne told him to put the knife away. Wynn scraped his boot with the knife then suddenly stuck it into Eliza. He then handed the knife to Dyne.

The two men carried Eliza upstairs where Sophia undressed her and gave her a little gruel. She could not keep this down. The Highworth surgeon, Mr Gay, was sent for and arrived within

20 minutes. Sophia stayed with the victim until midnight and then returned the next morning at 5.30am. Eliza was in great pain and died at 8.45am

An inquest was held in Highworth. Sophia's account was agreed to by Mr Gay and Highworth's assistant overseer, Mr T Seeley. Mr Gay stated that that the knife had entered between the 9th and 10th rib, passing into the bowel.

Henry Wynn was a travelling tinker, a native of Birmingham and about 47. He and Eliza cohabited and he was a very jealous man. The jury found him guilty of Wilful Murder and he was taken to Fisherton Gaol

In March 1836 Henry was tried at the Salisbury Assize. He admitted stabbing Eliza but not wilfully. His reason had gone because she had left him and gone with the blind one.

He was found guilty. To be executed on Monday next, the 14th. His body to be buried in the gaol precinct.

On the 14th the prison chaplain preached a sermon based on the 8th chapter of 2 King's, the first part of verse 13.

"What is your servant but a dog, that he should do this great thing."

Henry Wynn was hanged at 12.15am and did not speak from the scaffold. The rain was falling heavily so there was only a small crowd gathered to watch.





Pandemic claims the lives of more than 2,000 people with dementia in South West England

Charity coalition says 'never again' as Alzheimer's Society investigation reveals 92% report pandemic causing more rapid increase in dementia symptoms

A staggering 2,000 people with dementia are estimated to have died from coronavirus in South West England since the pandemic hit the UK in full force in March 2020.

They are among more than 34,000 with the condition to have died in England and Wales from COVID-19, making people with dementia the worst hit by coronavirus. In addition, new calculations from the Office for National Statistics (ONS) reveal that deaths of care home residents, where at least 70% of people have dementia, are 30% higher than previously thought. There have been almost 12,000 (11,624) deaths since January 2021, which includes care home residents who have died in hospitals or elsewhere.

A coalition of dementia organisations including Alzheimer's Society, Dementia UK, John's Campaign and TIDE (together in dementia everyday), have come together to say never again will those affected face such hardship and loss.

Alzheimer's Society's investigation has shown the pandemic's toll goes even further than deaths from the virus. In a survey of 1,001 people who care for a family member, partner or someone close to them with dementia, an overwhelming 92% said the pandemic had accelerated their loved one's dementia symptoms; 28% of family carers said they'd seen an "unmanageable decline" in their health, while Alzheimer's Society's support services have been used over 3.6 million times since the pandemic began.

Alzheimer's Society's Dementia Connect support line has been flooded with calls from relatives revealing how quickly their loved ones are going downhill, losing their abilities to talk or feed themselves. Nearly a third (32%) of those who lost a loved one during the pandemic thought that isolation/lack of social contact was a significant factor in that loss. People with dementia in care homes have been cut off from their loved ones for almost a year, contributing to a massive deterioration in their health. A third (31%) reported a more rapid increase in loved ones' difficulty speaking and holding a conversation, and a quarter (25%) in eating by themselves. Only 13% of people surveyed have been able to go inside their loved one's care home since the pandemic began. Almost a quarter (24%) haven't been able to see their loved one at all for over six months.

Alzheimer's Society is calling for meaningful close contact, indoor visits to be the default position without delay from 8th March. There are an estimated 850,000 people living with dementia in the UK, including more than 92,000 in South West England. Dementia organisations, including this coalition, joined forces as One Dementia Voice in July 2020 to call for designated family carers to be given key worker status to enable care home visits to loved ones. Family carers are integral to the care system and to the people for whom they care: it's they who know how to get their loved ones to eat, drink and take medicine and are often the first to know when something is wrong. While the Government recently announced that indoor visits will restart for one family member from 8th March, the coalition emphasises that this must be the default position and that blanket bans on visitors (where there is no coronavirus outbreak) are unacceptable.

The pandemic has not just hit those in care homes. With 470,000 people with dementia living in the community, many are reliant on unpaid family carers for support. 42% of these carers say lockdown has caused a rapid increase in feelings of depression in their loved one, while over half (54%) say they've seen a rapid loss of memory. Carers themselves have been hugely affected – seven out of ten (73%) say that the last year has negatively impacted their mental and physical health with anxiety (42%) and

exhaustion (34%) the most cited symptoms. Over half (54%) are saying that the pandemic has left them feeling less able to care for their loved ones.

Alzheimer's Society, Dementia UK, John's Campaign and TIDE (together in dementia everyday) are calling for:

- A Recovery Plan with the needs of people affected by dementia at their heart.
- Meaningful close contact, indoor visits to be the default position without delay from 8th March
- An end to blanket bans on care home visits where there is no active outbreak.

- A recognition that family carers are integral to the care system.
- Family carers to register their carer status with GP surgeries to ensure they get vaccination priority and call on NHS England to ensure all surgeries enable this.
- Universal social care that we can all be proud of, free at point of use, like the NHS, like education and providing quality care for every person with dementia who needs it.

Turning a lockdown passion into a business

Lockdown has been an imprisonment for some, and an escape for others. For Cabin & Cowshed founder Jess, lockdown gave her the time she needed to create a new business venture.

"I am very passionate about sustainable living," Jess said. "A couple of years ago I switched from plastic packaged shower gel to soap bars. When the first lockdown began I decided to order a book on natural soap making as a

way of finding a fun new hobby and to learn new skills. I spent months researching and

sourcing materials and then challenged myself to create a range of eight all, natural soaps. What started as a lockdown hobby eventually turned into a business venture.

"Soap making is a bit like alchemy. You combine a base of oils and butters with sodium hydroxide and a chemical reaction called saponification then takes place, turning it into soap. Sodium

I spent a lot of time pairing essential oil scents together, researching top, middle and base notes and soon became fascinated with how different blends evoked certain feelings or memories. There was a lot of trial

and error involved as some blends smelt wonderful in the bottle but just didn't work well in the soap.

"I used social media to document my soap making progress and was surprised at how many people showed an interest. This definitely gave me the encouragement I needed to turn my new hobby into a business. I think it also helped that I was making soap in the middle of a pandemic where frequent hand washing was encouraged, but I also feel that people are becoming more aware of what products they are using on their skin and are always looking to turn to more sustainable solutions.

"The one piece of advice I would give to others about turning a hobby into a business would be to just go for it. If you're passionate about something and want to make it happen, take the leap.

I was nervous to post about my soap-making

journey on social media because I was worried about what people would think and when I first started making soap a few of my friends would say "Who would even buy soap though? Only old people use soap!" I think it's fair to say I've changed their minds now.

I've got a summer range of soap bars coming out soon and it'll then be time to formulate a new autumn and Christmas range. I'm hoping to move into a bigger space soon which will hopefully allow me to expand our product range and begin experimenting with body butters, bath teas and perhaps even some shampoo bars; we shall see."

Swindon Museum and Art Gallery virtual exhibition, **Optimism: Spring to Summer'**

Swindon Museum and Art Gallery has announced the launch of a virtual exhibition, selected by the committee of the Friends of Swindon Museum and Art Gallery, to celebrate Spring and the prospect of better times to come.

The Swindon Borough Council-owned venue on Bath Road has been closed for a year due to the global pandemic but Swindon Museum and Art Gallery has been making the best of digital resources to help people access the collection, which is credited with being one of the best in the UK.

This has included the continued work of 'Art on Tour at Home', which has developed a number of free online talks, activities and learning resources. This new virtual exhibition has been produced using ArtUK's curation tool, which has been invaluable for sharing Swindon's collection with audiences during lockdown.

Linda Kasmaty, the Chair of the Friends of Swindon Museum and Art Gallery, explained why this exhibition is so important. She said: "The slow reduction of restrictions allows us to look forward to enjoying the changes that Spring brings, followed by the arrival of Summer.


"The artwork reflects these changes with the soft greens of Spring, early flowers and wide skies. This is followed by the warm days of Summer, brighter colours, the casual enjoyment of the warmth, meeting in groups and travel for holidays. 

We just wanted to let you know that the Ramblers Wiltshire and Swindon representative Wiltshire Ramblers - Swindon & NE Wilts (wiltsswindonramblers.org.uk) delivered the application for the Definitive Map Modification Order (DMMO) to Swindon Borough Council on Friday 15th January, 2021.

The application is for 'a public footpath to be added to the definitive map between Public Footpath 37 Highworth and the B4000 Shrivenham Road, along the track to The Buildings.' This will allow pedestrians to walk up the bit of road opposite the road to Wrag Barn, in order to join the footpath running parallel to the B4000.

Its receipt was acknowledged by the Rights of Way and Highway Information Manager, Highways and Transport Service Delivery, at the Council. There is no stated timescale for a response however, when we receive any updates, we will, of course, share them.

Do you remember?

You may remember the 2012 Festival, it was Olympic year and the Olympics were in Britain. In Highworth our September Festival had an Art in Action theme. During the years lots of people had been involved in Art projects culminating in an Art in Action day at the Community Centre and the resulting work was to be displayed at the Festival.

What did we do? Well, the centre of Highworth was painted onto cereal boxes, each artist taking an individual building which was then pushed over the church railings to form a display. Shop windows had displays of peg dolls, along the railings there was home made bunting, each of the flags having details in some way about Highworth at the time, the groups, the activities, the prices of common items. Paintings were displayed in the Council Offices and there was a big cow and a tree that had been covered in pretty papers. The cow makes an appearance at times from the upstairs butcher's window.

We had several hundreds of fabric squares decorated by various techniques joined together by ribbons and displayed on the railings outside Inigo House. Southfield School joined in enthusiastically, (with practically all the classes producing a colourful item), as did many other people in the town.

The resulting collage looked spectacular. It's such a pity that this, representing hundreds of hours of work by so many people, has not been seen since that year and in these COVID times I hope that Link will print the photos of some of these fabric squares to brighten us all up.

The recycling is boxed up and sent to a company called Terracycle who process the plastic and turn it into all sorts of things such as garden furniture and playground equipment. You can see more of what they do at www.terracycle.co.uk. Please do have a good read of the list below to see what we can recycle for you and who you would be raising money for. Please check the items you pass forward though and if it's not on the list, pop it in your bin or recycle it as you would normally.

Drop off points (once lockdown is lifted) are Highworth Preschool and the Visitor Centre on the High Street. At some point in the future we are hoping to have more places to drop off so watch this space or to keep updated join the Highworth Recycling group on Facebook.



The Winners



FARINGDON

Award for caring neighbour

When Molly Day died in September her neighbours decided to honour her memory by creating an online bouquet scheme called 'Flowers from Molly.' This website allows Faringdon residents to nominate someone to receive a bouquet of flowers. Since then almost 100 bouquets have been delivered. Organiser mum-of-three Rebekah Pugh received an award from the High Sheriff in recognition.

Local Environmental and Peace group join up for socially distanced demonstration against US/UK Trade deal

Members of Faringdon Peace Group and Extinction Rebellion joined up with other environmental groups to protest about the ongoing negotiations with the US in connection with a possible US/UK trade deal.

The main issues of concern are:

1. The negotiations are been carried out in secret with no parliamentary oversight and will lead to lower food and environmental standards, e.a. Unlabelled chlorine-washed chicken and hormone injected beef. The US views UK standards as barriers to trade. The UK uses the 'Precautionary Principle' which means a substance



or practice has to be proven safe before it can be used. The US don't have that.

- 2. The terms of the deal are enforced through International Investor State Dispute Settlement Courts (ISDS courts) where corporations can sue governments if a change in regulations means the corporation loses profit. If the UK enacts policies for the benefit of UK citizens, e.g clean air policies which results in lower profits for US corporations, the corporations can sue the UK government in the ISDS courts for loss of profit and there is no appeal.
- 3. The talks exclude any discussion of carbon emission reduction targets, i.e. an issue as the deal lasts for 30 years and US standards are lower than ours.



- 4. The talks will lead to increasing privatisation of the NHS and higher drug prices. Higher drug prices have already been agreed but the main prize for the US is our NHS where they want increasing access for US healthcare companies and a move towards the US system of insurance-based healthcare and the reduction of the existing free at the point of use healthcare as in the NHS which is the envy of the world.
- 5. Poor trade deals fuel climate chaos and war.
