Spreading the love

If you were one of the many people that got out walking over lockdown, you might have spotted one of the many hearts dotted around our town, spreading joy and reminding anyone struggling with their mental health where to get help. We spoke to Lynette Kotecha, the person behind the hearts:

Lynette, how did the idea come about?

"In 2018 my twin sister set up a business called 'Team Kotecha Dance Fitness' which I've been really involved with. It was founded following the tragic suicide of our best friend, to keep her memory alive. It started as a dance class, but now it's so much more than that; it's a really supportive community for people who need each other.

"Then my neighbour lost his wife recently and was feeling very alone, and we wanted to do something to stop people feeling like that. When I moved to Highworth I loved the fact that I always felt supported. People would smile and say hello to me on the High Street, and when I had my first child I joined a music group at the library and everyone totally welcomed me in. I wanted everyone to feel that way.

"So I hoped the hearts would bring a smile to people who need it."

How many have you put out?

"We put out 20 in January and another 60 in March all around Highworth, including the old golf course and Pentylands. Now, we replace them



as and when we notice they are missing. My little boy is three and really enjoys getting involved!"

And what has the feedback been from the local community?

"We've had lots of lovely feedback from people of all ages. People particularly like the bus stop hearts, as it's a time you often sit and think about things so it could be a time when the help lines are really needed."



It's not the first time you've done something to spread a little positivity around Highworth, is it?

"No! We did a Christmas trail in December where we hid 20 Christmassy pictures around Highworth. If you found them all, you took a photo with your favourite and were entered into a competition! It went down really well."

How do people get involved with Team Kotecha?

"My twin sister runs the business, based in Wales, but I'm really involved and run challenges on Facebook that I know a lot of people from Highworth have joined. The challenges vary; from walking 5000 steps a day, to walking 100 miles. There is a great, positive community and it really is for everyone; our members range from 13 to 80!

"We also do dance fitness classes on Zoom, and a free craft afternoon every couple of months."

SpeedWatchers wanted



The Highworth Community SpeedWatch group at Redlands has issued an appeal to residents to make Highworth a no speeding zone.

The CSW scheme, run by Wiltshire Police, works with volunteers to operate calibrated speed cameras at sites with proven speeding issues.

Details of speeding vehicles are uploaded to Wiltshire Police who take appropriate action.

The scheme at Redlands has been authorised to recruit additional volunteers to operate on other roads in the town. Suggestions are Shrivenham Road, Cricklade Road, St Michael's Avenue and Roundhills Mead. Others would be considered.

A traffic survey will check the road meets the criteria for a CSW site once a minimum of three volunteers have indicated they are willing to cover a particular road.

Volunteers must be over 18, able to stand during a session, and able to read licence plates of passing vehicles.

HISTORY

Highworth War Memorial: 100 years

For those people new to our town, here is a brief account of how the memorial came into being 100 years ago on Sunday 3rd April 1921.

In May 1919, a group of ex-soldiers asked the town council how Highworth would remember the dead. A public meeting was held and a lot of ideas put forward. At this stage, no-one suggested the memorial that we see today. Mr. Wolfe-Barry of Parsonage Farm offered to give



the old Tithe Barn field, (the area now covered by the two Brewery Street car parks and the road), but only if a community hall was built. This idea was popular, especially with the Headmaster. It would save the school hall from smelling of tobacco and drink on a Monday morning.

Mr Moulton favoured a fountain and horse trough in the Market Place, but Mr Percy Clack had the most ambitious idea. The field had a spring, so why not a swimming pool and a hall? Carried away, he then proposed a free library, a garden and a band stand!

February 1920 saw another meeting and it was decided to have two memorials. One would be for peace. The cricket field, now the top Rec, would be bought by the council. This would give a safe place for children to play. The soldier's memorial would be the one that we see today.

Another meeting was then held to decide on the site. Rev. Bailey, the Congregational minister, felt that it should be by the road so that everyone who passed by would see it and remember. It was agreed. Finding the money was a problem and two appeals had to be made before the money was found in November.

So, on April 3rd 1921, Mrs Arkell unveiled the memorial. It was estimated that about 1000 people attended. The families of the dead stood, half-shielded by the church trees, but their sobs could be heard.

Over the years the memorial became very shabby and the Historical Society took on the project to have it cleaned. Donations came in from local traders, the Freke-Norton Trust, private townspeople and fundraising by the society. Work was completed and the memorial re-dedicated on Sunday May 3rd 2015.

Hamnet by Maggie O'Farrell

(London: Tinder Press, 2020)

Nominated Winner of the 2020 Women's Prize for fiction and Waterstones Book of the Year 2020.

Set in 16th century England in the time of the Black Death Plague, this is a very different book to Maggie O'Farrell's usual modern day, contemporary settings. I was not disappointed; a book about love, loss and grief and finding a way back from the brink; topics on which O'Farrell writes very sympathetically and touchingly.

On a summer's day in 1596, a young girl in Stratford-upon-Avon takes to her bed with a fever. Her twin brother, Hamnet, searches

The Thursday Murder Club by Richard Osman

(Leicester: Charnwood, 2020)

This is an exceptionally clever book, the plot being deft and daft in equal measure (maybe a few too many red herrings as one nears the end?).

It is centred around four friends in a retirement home; Elizabeth, Joyce, Ibrahim and Ron might be pushing 80 but they still have a few tricks up their sleeves. Can our unorthodox but brilliant gang catch the killer before it's too late? Well, I think you already know the answer to that! everywhere for help. Why is nobody at home? Their mother, Agnes, is over a mile away, in the garden where she grows medicinal herbs. Their father is working in London. Neither parent knows that one of the children will not survive the week.

Hamnet is a novel inspired by the son of our famous



playwright, William Shakespeare. It is a tender and unforgettable reimagining of a boy whose life has been all but forgotten, but whose name was given to one of the most celebrated plays ever written.

know that the mole can dig at a rate of 15ft an hour, midges are indiscriminate about their prey; humans, cattle or deer are equally attractive, there are eighteen different species of British bat and that the droppings of a bat are made up entirely of the wings and bones of their prey and have almost no liquid content at all?

'My Garden World' is Monty Don's personal journey through the natural year, month by month, season by season, observed from the immediate world around him. A beautiful read indeed, which brings us ever closer to the natural world around us.

It is catalogued as a crime book and indeed more than one person meets an untimely end, but its real strength lies in the acute observations on old age, middle age, family dynamics and really just on life generally. It is also funny; a wry wit which manages to hit the spot without tipping over into cruelty about human frailty.

Told from the perspective of a bully, this book explores themes of homelessness, while celebrating kindness, friendship and the potential everyone has to change for the good.

Inspired by Onjali's own childhood experiences of growing up in London and seeing the impact of homelessness on those around her, 'The Night Bus Hero' follows an unlikely friendship between our narrator and Thomas, who lives in the park.

Can they get to the bottom of some unusual thefts taking place across the city and discover what it takes to be a real hero?

Dear Editor,

The staff and parents at my son's pre-school recently organised various fundraising events for a beautiful, courageous, little 5 year-old girl called Avaya who is fighting Neuroblastoma (a very rare, but aggressive childhood cancer).

She has gone through various treatments but unfortunately it's still not enough. The National Neuroblastoma panel are looking at alternative treatment, but this won't be covered by the NHS. This treatment will come at a cost far beyond the family's means and that's why they need your help.

As soon as I became aware of Avaya's illness, I wanted to help save her life. I heard about a challenge that was well out of my comfort zone, which I knew would test me.

I decided to run four miles, every four hours for 48 hours (in total, 48 miles) starting at midday on Friday 30th April, finishing at 8am on Monday 2nd May. As a firefighter, I felt it would be challenging and appropriate to run the last four miles in fire kit, and I was overjoyed to be joined by other firefighters. Seeing all the support, including Avaya and her family, made me pull my socks up and give it one last push.

I can't thank everyone enough for all their support over the weekend and leading up to the challenge. Please help to save Avaya's life by donating to my GoFundMe page.

Working for Wellbeing

Working for Wellbeing is a new charity covering Lechlade, Fairford and the surrounding area. Its main aims are to connect those in need with local organisations that can help them, to assist in the setting up of

------& Lech Working For Wellbeing activities to foster a sense of

community and reduce isolation and loneliness, and to provide education for health and wellbeing.

The idea for the new charity evolved from a local Patient Participation Group. Founder John Read explained: "It was very apparent that many people visiting the surgery were suffering with loneliness or stress. We started to look for better ways to address these issues and came across an experiment in Frome for 'social prescribing'. Dr Helen Kingston, who pioneered the experiment, recognized the need to address the needs of patients which lay behind their medical issues.

She set up a database of local services and support groups and then referred each patient to those groups which were best able to help with financial, social and lifestyle issues. The end result was that the local hospital saw a large drop in its admissions to A&E."

Recognizing that such an initiative could ease pressure on the Doctors' surgery and improve people's wellbeing, the Participation Group invited organisers from Frome to make a presentation about their experiment. This was enthusiastically received and a working party was set up to see how the lessons from Frome might be applied to the Fairford and Lechlade areas. After several months work and advice from Cotswold District Council and the Gloucestershire Rural Committee Council, it was decided to form a charity to attract funding to employ a Wellbeing Coordinator.

"Despite Covid, we have been very busy finalizing our charitable status application," John explained. "It hasn't been an easy road. We have had to do a great deal of work to ensure that we have the right policies and procedures in place, for example, data protection and safeguarding, and that we have a properly constituted board of trustees and secretarial and financial systems. But we have had a good response from our communities with many volunteers, including representatives from the Town Council and Churches, putting themselves forward to help set these up. I am particularly grateful to the former Chief Executive of the Cirencester CHURN project who has given us invaluable advice.

"We have secured £20,000 from Gloucester County Council to employ a Wellbeing Coordinator for 20 hours a week to help support our Social Prescriber in signposting clients to the help they need. Our Community Café in Fairford Community Centre will open as soon as Covid restrictions lift and we shall also be partnering with Lechlade Baptist Church to provide the same opportunity to socialise at their Beans Café."

The group are also in the process of setting up social media accounts and hope to use this platform to promote and encourage

'neighbourliness' among the community. "Covid has been a chance for people to give their time to help others," John added. "And many of the volunteers I have spoken to are keen to continue volunteering in the future. We are hoping to use social media to connect volunteers to people who are vulnerable and isolated and who are in need of someone to help out in the garden or walk the dog a couple of times a week, or just have someone to talk to. We will also be encouraging people to contact us about their financial or social problems so we can put them in touch with the help they need."
