You need to submit a Tax return (for 2020/21) if HMRC send you a Tax Return to complete or, if you know that you have income tax or capital gains tax to pay. However, HMRC have a list of further circumstances where a Tax Return should be prepared, including:

- Your income from self-employment exceeded £1,000
- You are a company director
- You received over £2,500 in rental income. If it was between £1,000 and £2,500 contact HMRC
- You received more than £2,500 in other income such as tips or commission
- You received £10,000 or more before tax from savings/investments
- You made Capital Gains in excess of £12,000
- You have received dividends in excess of £10,000
- Your taxable income exceeds £50,000 and you, or your partner, receive Child Benefit
- Your taxable income exceeds £100,000.

Bosom Friends: Breast Cancer support

At the beginning of 2020, no-one knew just what the year would have in store. The coronavirus pandemic has meant that the last 15 months have been challenging and difficult for just about everyone.

Hearing the news that you have cancer is devastating; receiving such a diagnosis during these uncertain Covid times can be even more frightening. As well as the obvious physical effects, such a diagnosis is emotionally overwhelming and ultimately life-changing; it's common to feel alone, fearful and anxious.

Breast cancer is the most common cancer in the UK, with one in eight women being diagnosed in their lifetime. Men can also be diagnosed with breast cancer. Each year around 12,000 people will die from the disease. Although survival rates have improved dramatically, with more people now surviving breast cancer than ever before, there is still a long way to go.

Bosom Friends is a small, local support group run entirely by volunteers and offers a listening ear as well as practical, confidential support to those who have been affected by breast cancer. The group was formed several years ago by two women who wanted to ensure that others in Oxfordshire and environs would not feel the same isolation that they had experienced following their diagnosis.

Members of Bosom Friends would usually meet once a month, often in the home of one of the members with a chat, cuppa and cake. Although currently unable to hold normal group meetings due to coronavirus, Bosom Friends continues to hold monthly meetings online via Zoom.

Whether you have just been diagnosed, are currently undergoing treatment or completed your active treatment a while ago, the group offers emotional support and practical, up-to-date information. Above all, we can offer an understanding voice at the end of the phone should you ever need it.







Coming together for the children of Highworth

We can finally share the exciting news that Highworth Pre-School and Westrop Nursery have been working collaboratively to move forward together to create and strengthen Westrop Nursery, focusing on the local and school community. With both schools having served the families of Highworth for over 50 years, it is one strong team coming together.

From September 2021, we will have sessions available for children from two years old in dedicated playrooms for two year olds and three and four year olds. Our wrap-around care will be within the early years unit and we will have four dedicated early years outside learning environments. There is a woodland area and access to Forest School. Highworth Cycle Speedway

It was in 1949 that a cycle speedway team was formed by **Betty and Bert** Tremblin with the help of Maurice Haddock and Dixie Dean, who was a local policeman. They had become friendly with a number of local boys, some of them relatives. who were in need of something to do. Named 'The

Minster Lovell Pirates, provided great entertainment, and their spectator numbers grew until they were drawing a crowd of 1000. In fact, they were so successful that Betty's sister Grace was called upon to run the newly formed spectators' club.

Other teams were formed and they found the need to

travel to away competitions, so Roger Wise generously loaned them a large van.

The club continued to expand and a sign of its continuing success is a story told in the club newsletter 'Wolves News' of October 1950. It

describes the installation of an electric starting gate and lights, which was quite an achievement as the Highworth Wolves were the first club in the area to have this. The opposition often found this starting procedure rather confusing, as they were used to the pull-across starting gate.

Interest in the sport continued

Highworth Wolves' they were given permission to use the Welcome Home field (now Glebe Place) to hold their races on.

Their first race was held on 11th August 1949, when they defeated Stratton. Organised by Speedway Star Roger Wise, they went on to

reach the county semi-finals in their first season. During the interval of their first two home matches, the club received £29 in their collection boxes, this on top of the profit of selling programmes at 6d each.

Other teams they raced against, such as the Purton Panthers, Broadtown Bulldogs and the

to grow and, in November 1950, the Four Counties Speedway league was formed. This was made up of Minster Lovell, Longcot, Langford, Filkins and Highworth. Cricklade and Witney also expressed an interest.

In December 1950, through the continuing kindness of Roger Wise, a larger and more adequate club room was officially opened. This was greatly needed due to the increased membership numbers and was a great asset through the cold winter months. The club house was well used by the boys and a new innovation was a regular cinema show to members, which was a great attraction. Boys over 11 were

allowed to use the club providing they were members of the supporters' club, which cost only 9d (4½ p).

The first speaker at the club was Detective Hares of the Wiltshire Police. ittraction. Boys over 11 were Tournament which was won by Roy V

giving a very thrilling account of the work of the police and the detection of crime. The talk proved that crime does not pay!

In 1951, bad weather hit the start of the Speedway season which had a detrimental effect on the meetings, but great support was given by their supporters. The boys were practicing riding in the evenings, which showed the good riding of the junior team. This was most important as the following year some of their senior riders would be lost to the call of Military Service.

Although essentially a cycle speedway team, The Wolves activities were not only confined to cycle riding. There was the Cricket Eleven and they also played football matches. They had a successful football match against Faringdon Youth Club at Faringdon which they won 5 nil.

Ralph Coombs scored 2 goals and Roy Adams scored 2 more and John Peapell scored 1.
Afterwards there were team games in the Youth Club.

They also held a wide variety of events at the clubhouse to raise much-needed funds. It was reported in the Wolves News in February 1951, that suggestions were made that the club house could be used by the ladies for afternoon meetings to have games, sew, knit, gossip and have a cup of tea. A Rummage Sale took place on 24th February that year, resulting in £9 profit for the club. Other activities included a Snooker Tournament which was won by Roy Whitaker.

This was more than a Speedway club, it was a social club too. For instance. visitina Faringdon Youth Club on 10th March 1951. playing billiards. table tennis. darts Inter-

Club Quiz. Other non-cycling events also took place. On Friday 16th February 1951 they visited Purton Stoke for a Social Evening. Minster Lovell held a dance on 24th February that year, which raised money for the Four-Counties League funds, at which £10 was raised. Another time, a whist drive was held raising £1.15.0 (£1.75)

In 1951, the Festival of Britain Celebrations took place from 1st to 10th June, and a match was held during the festivities on Thursday 7th June, meeting the Bath team 'Norton Knights'. The teams paraded in the Market Square, headed by the Shrivenham Army Cadet Drum and Bugle Band and then marched to the field.

As well as the Festival of Britain celebrations, The Wolves got involved in other town events such as the Highworth Festival, Betty Tremblin recalled:

"Highworth Festival is now an annual event. Bert was on the committee of the first one and we thought it would be a good idea to visit the villages around, advertising and selling programmes the week before. What a week that was! Bert arranged to hire a barrel organ. Roger Wise again





helped by loaning us a van to transport it. We were a group of five: Bert and Maurice Haddock dressed as Pearly King and Queen, my sister Grace, cousin June and myself dressed as Gypsies. Later in the week, Ted Stranks joined us in evening dress. We had a lot of fun and a lot of drink and even got an AA man dancing in the street! At the end of the week we were very tired but managed to pull the organ round Highworth in the Carnival Parade. The week ended with a firework display, though not in the way it should have done. Bert and Billy Nichols, whose fair had been engaged for the weekend, were in charge. The first few fireworks were fine then all hell was let loose. Somehow a lighted

firework fell amongst the rest. It certainly was a display!"

One year, Bert and Betty Tremblin had the idea of carol singing around the town with a Christmas tree pulled on a trolley to raise funds. Bert wanted lights on the tree, so he arranged with people in various areas to allow us to plug into their electricity supply. All went well until they plugged into a row of council-owned prefab bungalows; one flash and everyone was in darkness!





Goodbye from TS Tech

This July, TS Tech will cease operations at its Highworth plant after almost 22 years



The company was formed in 1999 specifically to supply car seats to Honda of the UK Manufacturing or HUM in Stratton. Over the years the company has grown from a handful of 'associates' to over 900 employees making up to 1,200 car sets per day (237,000 seat sets per year). TS Tech has made car seats for Civic, CRV and Jazz over the years and made many, many additions and alterations to the plant.

Starting as one large production hall in 1999, various extensions were built and neighbouring companies' buildings purchased to make up the 16,000 square metres it is today. We have had various different satellite operation units and warehouses across Swindon over the years including sites at Elgin, West Swindon and Groundwell.

Associates have already started leaving TS Tech following collective and individual redundancy consultation. The majority of associates leave at the end of July 21, with a handful remaining until spring next year to decommission the plant and manage the voluntary liquidation process that will mean the end of TS Tech in the UK.

TS Tech will continue making car seats in Europe and the rest of the world, but with Honda leaving Stratton there is no future for the company in the UK.

The Company and its associates wanted to thank



the Highworth Community for hosting TS Tech for over 20 years and regrets it will no longer be part of the Highworth landscape. Many of its employees are Highworth residents and have worked at TS Tech since its inception and seen it grow in size and complexity over the years.

We have built relationships with many local business and especially want to thank partners such as Andrew's the butchers, Outsauce and Bloomfields who for years have catered to our seasonal 'Hog Roasts', and all the local organisations and charities who have allowed us to support their causes for our CSR activities such as Highworth Council (Christmas Lights), the local schools and pre-schools and others.

We would also like to thank our long-term partners and providers such as Acorn Electrics, Snack & Sandwich and Tim Crewe Facilities. Also, Omega and Blue Arrow Recruitment Services who have provided us with temporary associates for many years.

It is with a heavy heart that TS Tech and all its associates say goodbye to Highworth and move on to pastures new. Thank you Highworth residents for putting up with us and we hope we are replaced by a great new company that provides new opportunities for work for residents and growth for local businesses.

We are now focusing our attention on helping

our associates to get new jobs and we are running workshops and support activities to help them on their way. We would like to thank Swindon Borough Council and the Honda Task Force for supporting us and our associates and to Lee Hecht Harrison (our career transition support providers) with various initiatives to help our people move on.

From our MP

As we move closer to normality, we are very conscious that young people have been among those most affected by the COVID pandemic, with under-25s making up 54 per cent of jobs lost during the pandemic. In addition to this, the education and training of many young people has been severely disrupted during the pandemic, thereby potentially having an impact on their future prospects.

Therefore I very much welcome that the Government has announced a fresh and innovative package of support which focuses specifically on young people.

We know that a lack of experience can often be a barrier for young people looking for their first job. Apprenticeships can be a fantastic way for young people to gain skills and experience – while also earning at the same time. As well as benefitting young people, apprenticeships also allow businesses to invest in the skilled workforce they need for the future. To encourage more apprenticeship opportunities, the Government announced recently that businesses can now claim £3000 for every apprentice they employ as a new employee.

The Government's £2 billion Kickstart programme is another scheme that aims to help young people develop the skills and experience they need to start their careers. The scheme offers fully-funded 6-month placements to 16-24 year olds who are claiming Universal Credit and are at risk of long term unemployment. Employers of all sizes are taking part and already nearly 200,000 Kickstart placements have been created.

In addition to the Kickstart Scheme, the Government is investing in T-Levels, offering employers £1000 for every T Level Student they take on. The T-Level courses have been developed in collaboration with employers and businesses so that the content meets the needs of industry and prepares students for work, further training or study.

The Government has also created the National Skills Fund; a scheme that aims to support the Government's pledge that every young person has access to an offer of work-based training, work experience or a training programme. The fund will be backed up by £2.5 billion of Government funding, including £375 million being invested in 2021-22. The Skills Fund will see £95 million of additional funding made available to give adults free access to level 3 qualifications. Hundreds of courses have been carefully selected to support adults to gain skills leading to jobs in sectors such as construction, healthcare and digital.

Finally, I am looking forward to welcoming back students to my summer work-experience programme. I offer any interested students involved, the opportunity to shadow my Parliamentary team and I in North Swindon in order for them to see first-hand what I do to represent them. Interns get to see how my office functions day-to-day and how I represent constituents across North Swindon on a huge variety of issues, as well as working in groups on team exercises to understand the workings of Parliament, debates and campaigns.
