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A word from CAP (Christians Against Poverty)

For seven years, Highworth has been privileged to have a CAP (Christians Against Poverty) Debt Centre. During that period of time, nearly 170 families have been helped to address their debt situation. Over 50% of them are now debt free!

CAP nationally was started just over 25 years ago by a man called John Kirkby. He had become bankrupt and responded to God's call to set up a charity that would assist people in overcoming their debt issues.

The four churches in Highworth (St Michael's, the Methodist Church, the URC Church and Highworth Community Church) came together to set up the Highworth Debt Centre seven years ago.

Some people doubted that a town like Highworth had a debt problem. However, soon the first clients were coming on board. We have seen an increasing need of our services.

CAP services are freely available to anyone, regardless of their background. The programme assesses the size of the client's debt and negotiates with those organisations and businesses a repayment plan. For some clients, the way out is either bankruptcy or a Debt Relief Order.

CAP walks alongside our clients to the very end, whether it is through the legal journey or paying off their debts. The easy part is setting up debt plan. The hard part is persevering in paying off the debt. CAP is there to encourage, and where necessary, help the client in overcoming the obstacles that occur on the road to becoming debt free.

So, what motivates the CAP team? In the book of Micah the question is asked; "What does the Lord require of you?" The answer comes: "to act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God".

Jesus stated that his mission was "to proclaim good news to the poor, to bind up the broken hearted, to proclaim freedom to the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners and to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour" (Luke 4 v 18). As churches, we seek through CAP to carry out this Jesus manifesto. Our motivation comes out of the love of Jesus for each individual.

CAP in Highworth offers a Job Club, Lifeskills courses and Money Management courses. All are free of charge.

Many people across Highworth have joined an action group whose message is a simple: "Keep our old golf course green!"

Members of the newly-formed 'Action Group for Saving Highworth's Old Golf Course' are concerned by Swindon Borough Council's plan to open up the beautiful green space. affectionately known as "the old golf course", to development.

Here, those from Highworth and further afield who use the space regularly share why it's so special to them:

"It is magical. A great place to catch the sun or watch the stars. The increasing amount of wildlife is a joy to see."

"This is my healing place, my place of reflection, where the world's weight is lightened and perspective is always reached. I'm fully prepared to chain myself to the trees though if people can bring me food. I love seeing everyone's photos of how much they love it too. It's a special place"

"The Community is built around this."

"I suffer with PTSD and when I have really bad MH days, sometimes I will sit and stop and enjoy for a time too. It helps me, but now losing this green open space would be an absolute disgrace. I can't imagine and don't want to imagine not being able to walk here."

"I don't live in Highworth but I do visit the golf course regularly, sometimes with friends, sometimes on my own with my dogs. Not only does it provide a great open space to help clear your head but it's a space where you may bump into other like-minded people and have a chat and try and put the world to rights. In a world where mindfulness

and mental health are key right now, it's a green space that needs to stay green."

"When we were considering whether to move to Highworth, one of our biggest concerns was where we would walk the dog. The Golf course was perfect; even when it was in use as a golf course. Now we have even started to talk about moving house. We haven't a dog at the moment but it is only a question of time. Pentylands is horribly wet all winter!"

"Walking through an estate of 350 houses to reach what could be our future smaller and quite boggy country park, will be an insult to the people of Highworth. Not everyone is fit and able to walk to the bottom, which in the winter is also very muddy. Many just sit on the benches at the top and admire the views, contemplate and think just how wonderful this place is."

"The community is built around this."

What can you do?

- Plenty of suitable brownfield sites with preexisting infrastructure

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What Are Benefits in Kind?

Benefits in Kind (BIKs) are paid by an employer on behalf of an employee and are not repaid. BIKs tend to commonly cover; private medical/dental cover, personal use of company cars/vans and fuel benefits etc.

At the end of each tax year (5th April), the employer must submit the value to HMRC of BIKs given to the employee and what they were. When the employee receives their P60, they should be given a form P11D listing the BIKs submitted to HMRC. If the employee completes an Income Tax Return, they will be have to pay tax on the BIKs the following January. Otherwise, HMRC will collect extra tax by amending the employee's PAYE tax code.

Mary 'Paddy' Tipping turns 100!

Tuesday 20th July marked a very special day in the calendar for Mary 'Paddy' Tipping and her family and friends as she reached the landmark age of 100.

Paddy celebrated her day in style with a garden party surrounded by family and friends and hosted by the Fitzwarren House care home where she now resides. "It was a lovely day and something that Nan had focussed her sights on achieving, especially in the last few months" said her granddaughter, Lorraine. To top the day off, she received a very special birthday card from Her Majesty the Queen.

Highworth has always been in Mary's blood. Born in 1921, she lived in the High Street with her

older sister Betty and her parents Fred and Annie Croome who ran the local grocer's shop (now 'Two's Company' hairdressers).

She was a very independent woman for her time and, as a young woman, lived and worked in Oxford with her sister for a period. Then, in 1944, she married her first husband, Arthur Gerald Brereton Day with whom she had three sons, Tony, David and Ted who have all sadly died but who gave her ten much-loved grandchildren. She has always lived in and around Highworth and has spent 50+ years in Queens Avenue, initially with her first husband Gerald, until his untimely death in 1968, and latterly with her second husband Jack Tipping who sadly died in 2009. Recently, (in her late 90s) she made the move into Fitzwarren House and has been a lively member of their community ever since.

Paddy is under 5ft tall and very slight, but she



has always been a force to be reckoned with and is known to many in and around Highworth: once met, never forgotten! She has always been full of energy and has worked hard all her life. During her career, she was Secretary for the Amalgamated Union of **Engineering Workers** based in Swindon until she reached the then statutory retirement age of 60.

However, retirement was not for her and she went on to enjoy a number of part-time rôles including a period at Honda and also a number of years cleaning the local Highworth police station. She loved this job and only retired from it relatively recently and even then was very reluctant to do so!

She is renowned as a 'feisty' and determined person and has been a well-known Highworth character for many years, making daily trips to the Co-op and always sporting one of her many recognisable trademark hats. At the age of 70 she became 'Town Crier' for Highworth, a rôle which was very important to her as it was one previously held by her grandfather Jeremy Croome in the 1880s. She took great pride in being 'Town Crier' and became known to even more people in Highworth because of it. She might be small in stature but she definitely has a big voice!

When asked the secret to her long and productive life Paddy said: "Working for so long kept me active and the daily Guinness never did me any harm". She still enjoys her daily bottle of the "black stuff" and will hopefully continue to do so for many years to come.

Helping Highworth's Bees

Out of the blue, at the beginning of July, I was invited by Laura Soule, one of Highworth's newest beehive 'owners' at Northview to help check the bees. I have always been fascinated by bees, probably going back to childhood when I remember my mother telling me about how clever they were.

I had no idea what checking the bees

entailed, but I arrived at Northview to find 'frame-making' in progress. A sheet of beeswax is secured to a frame to slot in the hive the bees then build on the frames, making honeycomb and cells for the Queen to lay eggs in, so the hive is constantly growing.

Once the frames were made we had to get our beekeeping kit on. Bees find their way in through any gaps so gloves, the netting and the hat (secured by a zip) are essential if you are not to be stung. We then made our way to the hives and started checking them. Our aim was firstly to check the hives were healthy, to put the new frames into one of the hives that Richard Williams had recently put a new swarm in and check that each hive had

a queen. I was advised to stand behind the hives; the hives have a 'front door' for the bees to enter and leave by. Understandably, when they are busy minding their own business, working hard collecting pollen and nectar, returning to the hive, telling other bees where to find pollen and so on, they don't always take kindly to being disturbed so smoke is used to encourage them to go deep in the hive.

Queens are marked so they can easily be distinguished in a busy hive; they are larger than the other bees but can be hard to see. The fact that a queen cannot be seen doesn't matter too much if the hive is obviously healthy. Having checked all the hives, one or two frames had quite a lot of honey in the comb so these were taken out for the honey to be taken off.

How you can help Highworth's Bees

Bees collect nectar to make honey, the pollen is fed to the brood, and apparently prefer purple and yellow flowers. At the time of writing this there is lots of lavender, buddleia (which butterflies like too), yellow poppies, snapdragons, lilies and lots of 'weed' flowers. In my garden I have lots of yellow poppies which the bees liked, particularly in June and July and although there are still poppies out, they appear to prefer lavender at the moment. Early in the spring I also have lots of pulmonaria; fairly large oval leaves with spots and small pink or purple flowers. On a warm day in March the flower bed

under my window can literally be humming with all the bees.

I am in the process of potting-up both yellow poppies and some pulmonaria. Both are easy to grow and spread like crazy, in fact they are almost impossible to get rid of. Bees are vital to our existence so if you would like some of either of these plants to plant in your own garden or by a path or on a verge, please ask me and you can have them. I have also



collected poppy seeds and am having a go at growing some from seed; they seed themselves very well, me trying to help might not work!

I would like to thank Laura, Richard, Ken and Paul for letting me share the bees with them and for the jar of most delicious honey.

Community Speedwatch update

The Highworth Community Speedwatch team reported 1299 vehicles for speeding on the town's roads during July and ran 76.29 hours of sessions. In June, the team reported 802 vehicles for speeding on the roads of Highworth and ran 70.07 hours of sessions. Based on each session being done in pairs, the team volunteered 382 hours of their time over the last two months to help make Highworth a no speeding zone.

The team operates sites on Cricklade Road, Eastrop, Redlands, Roundhills Mead, Shrivenham Road and St Michael's Avenue. If you are interested in joining the friendly team to help run sessions and make the town's roads safer for all road users, please email highworthcsw@gmail.com.

Team members must be over the age of 18, able to stand for the duration of a session and be able to read the licence plate of a passing vehicle. CSW is a scheme run by Wiltshire Police.

All volunteers are trained by Traffic Management Policing Officers and comply with a code of practice.





Science Week at Southfield Junior School

Southfield Junior School was full of enthusiastic and engaged children investigating, questioning and experimenting during their recent Science Week at the beginning of July this year.

Southfield's science leader, Mrs Jenn White, said: "It was brilliant to see all the fantastic science happening during Science Week. Children in all classes have certainly enjoyed their hands-on science work which is a great way to help them really remember their learning".

The whole school took part in a wide range of practical science investigations, experiments and activities throughout the week.

Year 3 were busy learning about Light and Shadows. Their carousel of activities included investigating coloured light, testing their shadow puppets, light refraction through prisms and creating shadow patterns.

Year 4 looked at the different types of teeth, their various uses and why they need to look after their own teeth. They also recreated the human digestive system using a range of household objects to represent the stomach, saliva, small and large intestines, stomach acid and food and nutrients being absorbed into the body. The end of their classroom 'digestive system' even produced a 'poo'!

Year 5 investigated forces that affect water and air resistance. They designed, made and tested a range of parachutes from different materials, they had to consider the shape, size and any stabilization required for their Lego figure to reach the ground safely. They also designed, constructed, tested and modified a range of boats to carry the Greeks across the Mediterranean Sea as quickly as possible. The final race across the 'sea' provided much discussion about the effects of water resistance on each design.

Year 6 used kitchen ingredients to investigate and learn about the importance of the 'ingredients' that are in our blood. They blended the ingredients together to see what our blood looks like to the human eye.

My name is Juli Frances Taylor and I live in Kempsford. I write children's poems and last year started a project called Primary Colour Poetry which aims to write collective poems with primary school pupils, children's groups, and play schemes.

The idea is simple; the children choose a

subject, which they discuss, then write a few words about it. Those thoughts are sent to me and I compile them into a unique poem for the school.

And the best bit? It's completely free!

So far, we have six schools and two Brownie groups in the Cotswolds and Oxfordshire within the project, and have written poems about bullying, mental health, belonging, rainbows and guinea pigs!

I have appeared several times on BBC Oxford to discuss the project but am keen to get more schools and groups to participate.

I am very much still looking for more collaborations! So far, we have six poems written, but my aim would be to reach enough to publish in a book, with all the profits going to local libraries and literacy projects.

Since May of this year, I have had several groups contact me, and BBC Gloucester has asked if I might appear on one of their Upload/ new talent shows in the coming weeks.

I have also had two poems published in the book 'Collecting Rainbows', about positivity during lockdown, which includes a contribution by Pam Ayres.

The local groups on there at the moment are

Kempsford Brownies, Kempsford Rainbows, and The North Cotswolds Schools Federation (NCSF) of four local primary schools.

I am particularly proud of the NCSF's poem about bullying (their own choice of subject).

When I was assembling the words the children had written, based on their own experiences and thoughts, it moved me to tears. These little people said such heart-felt and extraordinary things that the poem basically wrote itself.

The complete opposite to that is the poem written with the Kempsford Rainbows, a group of 4 to 6-year-olds, who wanted to write about, "guineapigs, colours, unicorns and hedgehogs please"!

The children choose a subject to discuss in class or group, then each writes a word, sentence, or a few lines on that subject. The teacher or group leader then sends those ideas to me either via text or post and I arrange them into a unique poem, adding a few words of my own to make it rhyme.

It is unique and bespoke, and best of all, entirely free!

I include the two poems, written by me in collaboration with the children, that I described above for you to get a feel of what the project produces.

Esther Baughn: 1838 to 1883 Joint keeper of 'The Rampant Cat'

When we bought our house in Redlands I was interested to discover it's history, and who had lived there over the years. This is how I 'met' Esther. She and her husband lived in the house in the mid 1800's when it was an Arkell's beer house called 'The Rampant Cat'.

Esther was one of the children of Henry and Catherine Hollick. The family lived in Westrop and Henry was a farm labourer. In January 1842, he had a brush with the law and was sentenced to six months hard labour for 'robbery from the person'. This seems to have been his only offence. Esther however had two appearances at the Police Court. In May 1854 she was charged, along with four other girls, with stealing swede greens from a field belonging to Edward Tovey of Stanton. They were all fined.

Just over a year later she was again in court. The case against her was brought by a Mrs Alexander of Cricklade Road. (It seems that Mr. and Mrs Alexander had a mission to reform the youth of the town. They prosecuted regularly and, for their pains, had stones and snowballs thrown at their windows.) On a day in July Mrs Alexander went to St Michael's Church to play the organ and instruct children in singing. This was in order to strengthen the church choir. Esther Hollick and other girls were asked to leave, for reasons not given. After this they kicked and rattled the door of the church. Hollick, the ringleader, made disgusting and insulting remarks to Mrs Alexander. She was reprimanded by the court, fined 6/6d and her parents ordered to be surities for her future good behaviour.

In 1861 Esther married William Baughn, a thatcher, in the Congregational Church in the High Street. They set up home in one of the cottages behind Swindon Street on the east side. By November 1864 they had two children: Kate, aged three and a half and Frank, about eighteen months. The local paper had a report on an inquest held in Highworth on the death of Kate Baughn. She had been run over by a

horse and cart.

Thomas Prince, a cordwainer, was the main witness. He lived in Westrop Street, now The Green, and had seen the accident. Kate and her brother were standing in the middle of Swindon Street, looking towards the Lechlade Road. A cart loaded with coal was coming into the town from Swindon at walking pace. Both children were knocked down by the horse and the little girl was trodden on. She died in a few minutes but her brother was not hurt. The cart was in charge of a boy, William Harris, who had not been at the horse's head but following behind the cart.


The local jury found for accidental death but were of the opinion that the conduct of William Harris was highly censurable for not being in his proper place at the time of the accident. William then appeared at the Swindon Court charged with 'wilfully and feloniously killing Kate Baughn'. In March 1865 he was tried at the Assize in Salisbury. The jury here found no culpable negligence.

By 1867 William and Esther were down at Redlands running the Rampant Cat. William was still working as a thatcher as well as a beerhouse keeper. Esther is just given as a beerhouse keeper in the 1881 census. By this time they had four more children, one a cripple from birth. Also living with them was William's 84 year old aunt, also crippled. How they managed our winding stairs I don't know.

A beerhouse could open on weekdays only between 4 am and 10pm. Esther must have run it in the daytime when there would not have been much trade. There was no bar; the beer was drawn off into jugs.

Esther died at our house on March 16th 1883 aged 44. Dr Kennard of Highworth certified death as from Phthisis Pulmonalis (TB). William was present at the death.

Shoe boxes for children

It is very strange to be writing about Christmas at the beginning of August, but yes, Operation Christmas Child (also known as the "Shoe Box Appeal") will soon be upon us. The National campaign is from Monday 15th November to Monday 22nd November.

The Highworth Collection centre will be based as usual at Highworth Methodist Church. The opening times will be published nearer the campaign.

For those who may be unfamiliar with Operation Christmas Child, shoe boxes are filled with a variety of gifts which are sent to needy children around the world. From the UK, last year, 250,000 shoeboxes were sent to 13 countries and globally about 10 million shoeboxes were sent to over 100 countries. From Highworth, we collected 1660 shoe boxes, which was really amazing because of the Covid





situation last year. We are so grateful to everyone who donated.

We suggest that each giftfilled box contains a 'WOW' item that the child will immediately love as soon as they open the box. Ideas include: stuffed animal, deflated football and pump, toy truck, doll (baby, Barbie, etc.) or musical instruments depending on the age group. A personal note or photo of you or your

family can also be included. Shoe box leaflets which give full details of the gifts that can be included are available from the drop off points.

Dear Editor,

Last year, two walkers with dogs were killed by cows in Yorkshire. This month, friends and I had a narrow escape whilst walking a public footpath in Wiltshire, not far from the Iron Age Hill Fort at Barbury Castle.

We think the walkers ahead of us (carrying a baby in arms!) had their dog on a lead and then let it off (as is advised) when the cows became menacing. As we approached, the herd were chasing their dog and heading at great speed right at our small party. One of us jumped over a barbed wire fence sustaining injuries to limbs and trousers, the rest managed to get over the stile into the next field but there were trapped, as it was clearly dangerous to attempt to traverse the public right of way.

Our story has a happy ending when it might have ended in disaster. We found an alternative route back to the car park where we met the couple with the baby. Thankfully, we had been able to help their dog find his way back to them and, though some of us were bruised and tearful and all were utterly exhausted by the trauma, we lived to see another day!

The warning in this story is for all walkers. Never assume cows are mild creatures who wouldn't say boo to a goose, but just want to chew their cud in peace. We remonstrated and shouted like Gudrun in Ursula did when chased by a herd in Women in Love. But to no avail. I have walked through fields of cows for years without any particular anxiety and indeed had done so, with my dog on a short lead, earlier that day. From now on I shall be much more careful. Better safe than sorry as the old adage asserts.



A new Osteopath in town

Those of you with aches and pains might be interested to hear about a new osteopath clinic that's recently open at Halo Leisure Centre. We spoke to Amy Bryant, the founder of 'Amy Kate Osteopathy', to find out more.

Hi Amy. Tell us about your new clinic. What are you offering?

I'm renting out the treatment room within the leisure centre and I have completely revamped it, bringing a personal touch to the room.

There is free parking and disabled parking. The clinic room is on the ground floor. There is also a ramp leading to the room with no need to climb any stairs so it's easily accessible to all.

I first do an initial consultation. I go through a full medical history to gain an understanding of the patient's health and condition, then do a medical examination to obtain a working diagnosis. Once we have established a possible cause to the patient's complaint, I can begin treatment.

The treatments would be specific and tailored to each patient, but could include soft tissue massage, mobilisation and/or manipulation of joints alongside a variety of different manual techniques. Lifestyle advice and exercise prescription may be discussed too to either assist with injury rehabilitation or maximise health and wellbeing.

Who can you help?

An osteopath is a musculoskeletal specialist so I often treat people with injuries of the muscles, ligaments, bones, etc. However, I can also help those with chronic pain conditions. My service can also be used by those who want to maximise their health and wellbeing through lifestyle advice and exercise prescription.

I see patients young and old, from the age of 16.

Great. What experience do you have?

I studied at Swansea for 4 years and recently received my M.Ost in Osteopathy. During this time I worked with a rugby team doing soft



tissue and sports massages, alongside work pitch side doing first aid for the team. This built my experience with acute and chronic sports-related injuries. During my 4th year I worked within two clinics for the University; one private and one with patients that were NHS referrals. I observed a variety of different medical conditions during this time, especially chronic pain-related conditions, which I aim to study further

Why did you decide to get in to osteopathy?

One of our principles within osteopathy is to treat a patient holistically, considering each part of the patient's life that could be impacting their health. This is not to just help their pain, but to help prevent the pain from reoccurring. I love that this profession spends the time to get to know patients in such a depth. I get to know the patient's lifestyle, habits, physical and mental wellbeing, allowing me to maximise the patient's health and wellbeing from every angle. I personally see an osteopath and want to be able to help others in this same way.

Finally, do you have any opening offers?

From August to October I am offering 10% of the initial consultation with a verbal referral. Just tell me who told you about my service and you will receive the discount!

I do not charge for referral letters to the GP. Assisting someone with their health is part of the service.

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

From our MP

Planning and development has been prominent in Highworth in recent months, with many residents understandably concerned at the seemingly large number of proposed developments / houses for the local area. The situation is complex, so I will do my best to explain.

Prior to 2010, the then Labour Government set out centrally imposed targets for Housing development. In Swindon's case, we had been told to deliver a staggering 36,000 extra houses in just 20 years; almost double what Swindon had delivered in the previous 20 years. This would have been unsustainable.

In 2010 we rightly scrapped these proposed targets and allowed Local Authorities to set their own Local Plans. In effect, the Local Authority can allocate land for development. On allocated land, applications are judged on planning rules, whilst any proposals on unallocated land can simply be thrown out and rejected for any reason the Local Authority wishes. This gives full control to the Local Authority.

Labour (now in opposition) not unreasonably felt giving so much power to the Local Authorities would reduce the number of houses being built, so protections were put in place. Once a Local Plan has been agreed (and in Swindon it had cross-party support) it had to be delivered, with a check at 3 years and 5 years. Basically, you had to deliver the houses promised – this prevented Local Authorities putting forward unrealistic plans.

Despite having cross-party support, Swindon's Local Plan quickly ran into trouble as it included significant house building in the Eastern Development Area (yet to start) and Wichlestowe (long delays). So despite additional house building in the Northern Sector (Tadpole Farm and Abbey Farm, etc.) Swindon's Local Plan failed both the 3 year and 5 year tests, so the Local Plan 'falls'. This means all land is effectively 'allocated' so any (speculative) development can only be judged on strict planning rules.

Highworth has seen a lot of speculative development, for example along Shrivenham Road. With a Local Plan, I suspect none of these would have been allowed to proceed, but on strict planning rules Swindon Borough Council (SBC) weren't able to block them. There are many other proposed developments which will have been blocked on planning rules, often before they are publicly discussed / reach the Planning Committee. For example, new developments in

Blunsdon can't be brought forward as Highways England have now deemed the Cold Harbour junction to be at capacity – so future developers / developments would need to upgrade this junction or applications will be automatically blocked.

SBC is now consulting on a brand-new Local Plan, once passed unallocated land will once again be protected. This is vital and frankly should have been done much, much sooner. Works should have started when they failed the 3-year test.

It is the Local Plan consultation that has identified potential plans for the former golf course land which will be consulted on in the coming months. With no realistic chance that the golf course would re-open it was always likely SBC would seek to sell the land – this has caused understandable concern amongst residents. That said, SBC could have sought to sell the whole site to a developer. It seems SBC's proposals are for approx. 300 houses on 30% of the site, with the remaining site gifted to the local community (Highworth Town Council) for public open space, potential expansion of leisure / sports provision, etc. Residents will need to judge the proposals, but from my 21 years' experience of planning I know no developer would ever gift 70% of a site, so whilst SBC's proposals mean 300 more houses, it would protect the majority of the site for the community forever.

Whilst I am not part of the Planning process, I know both your Borough Councillors and Town Council are strong voices for the local community. I will continue to press SBC to get the Local Plan sorted. Whilst we all accept some development, it should be co-ordinated, sustainable and shaped by local residents – with full powers to reject any inappropriate development.

41 houses - Redlands Park phase 2

25 houses - Land West of Lechlade Road (between Crane Furlong and Blackworth)

350 houses - Land at Highworth Old Golf Course

FAIRFORD

Unmanned Aircraft Flight Restrictions around RAF Fairford

RAF Fairford is experiencing an increasing number of Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS), or drones, flying within its Flight Restriction Zone.


UAS operators flying drones near any military airfield must ensure they are aware of the UK policy for their safe operation. When you fly a drone in the UK it is your legal responsibility to be aware of the rules that are in place to keep everyone safe. Due to their small size and manoeuverability they are hard to spot and identify by pilots of larger, faster moving aircraft. This means they may not see it until they have already hit it, which could cause major damage and potentially loss of life. The Operations and Safety teams at RAF Fairford are committed to providing a safe operating environment and will provide the latest information as it becomes available.


The Drone Code forms part of the Civil Aviation Authority's guidance to drone operators which can be found on the website https://dronesafe.uk/drone-code/

The Drone Code refers to an airfield's Flight Restriction Zone and it is illegal to fly anywhere in this area without permission from the air traffic control unit at the aerodrome.

The permitted 'operating height' is limited to a maximum distance of 400 feet (120 metres) from the closest point of the earth's surface.

The Flight Restriction Zone also includes a 2.5





nautical mile radius 'cylinder' around the airfield, extending 2,000 ft above ground level; a rectangle extending 5km from the threshold of each runway away from the airfield and 500m either side, also to a height of 2,000 ft above ground level; and can be extended across unprotected areas by 1km beyond the airfield boundary. Further information is available on the drone safe website.

Operations within the Flight Restriction Zone may be permitted, but permission MUST be sought from the appropriate authority, which in this case is RAF Fairford Airfield Operations.

The base has a Drone Request Procedure and all enquiries should be sent to the Community Relations Adviser, Jenny Collyer, at jennifer.collyer.2.gb@us.af.mil / 01285 714965, or the Airfield Operations Chief at: 420abs.osa@us.af.mil / 01285 714820.

A minimum of 5 working days is required to process a drone request.

If you see any activity which you believe contravenes the Drone Code, or have any safety concerns, please contact the Ministry of Defence Police using the number 01285 714225.

On **Monday 6th September 2021**, Keith Ferguson will speak on 'Plants for Enthusiasts'.

Keith will discuss a wide range of more unusual and some well-known perennials, shrubs and climbers. Aberrant British natives like the peloric form of Linaria vulgaris, Hyacinthoides nonscripta var. bracteata, jack-in-the-green primroses and our native Daphne laureola together with other Daphnes will feature. As will the Chilean Berberis valdiviana and Crinodendron hookerianum, Asian Berberis jamesiana and Clematis koreana. Old cultivars are not forgotten with pinks and peonies and the talk would not be complete without specialities Veratrum, Trillium and Galanthus.

Keith trained as a professional botanist, worked in the USA for a period and then spent 29 years at Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, retiring as Deputy Keeper of the Herbarium and Head of the Pollen Unit there. He and his wife moved to Gloucestershire in 1996 and since retirement have created a new garden at their home in Longhope. They are both keen gardeners and plantsmen and have been members of the Royal Horticultural Society for more than 45 years and the Hardy Plant Society some 40 years. Keith is widely travelled, especially in the USA. He has written regularly for The Hardy Plant over recent years and has had articles published in The Plantsman, The Bulletin of the Hardy Plant Society of Oregon and in Plant Heritage. He has given talks in Europe and the USA.
