FIRST THOUGHTS

Harvest Time

October is traditionally a month of Harvest Festivals. In churches across the country, people will be singing about ploughing the fields and all good gifts as well as donating tinned and dried food to food banks and CAP centres.

Harvest services are times to remember and thank God for all that we have and to share some of that with others.

Something Jesus preaches and tells stories about is caring for our neighbours. Over the last 18 months we have become better at caring for our immediate neighbours, many of whom have become friends, but Jesus also teaches that our neighbours aren't just the people we live close to, but anyone in need of help.

We have all heard, read or seen the news that our precious planet cannot keep up with our insatiable need for more things. On my news feed at the moment is the famine hitting Madagascar. Famine is unfortunately not a new thing, but this one is a little different because it is the first caused by climate change rather than war or negligence. At our harvest festivals we will not only be thanking God for what we have, but saying sorry for our greed that has led to so much poverty.

Jesus took notice of the world around him, commenting on lilies, figs, sparrows, lambs, wolves, seeds, harvest and more. He clearly valued the created world and used it to help him tell stories and show people how much they were loved by God. He said:

"Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?" This simple statement from Jesus tells me that the birds are important and cared for by God, and I am loved even more. But not just me; also the person in Madagascar who is eating mud to try to stay alive.

We in this country have been relatively unaffected by climate change so far, while our neighbours in other parts of the world are feeling the direct fallout of our over-consumption. We have not been loving our neighbours and this needs to change. We can love our neighbours in other parts of the world by opting for a more local diet, buying less, buying better quality or shopping second-hand and lobbying government to push for greener policies and practices.

Many wonderful people are doing their bit to help. There are fantastic people collecting things not usually recycled by the local authority, the friends of Pentylands are managing the park with wildlife in mind, the people galvanised to help protect the 'Old Golf Course' for people and animals to flourish and wonderful Facebook groups to help encourage hedgehogs into our gardens. These are small steps in our local area but they can lead us to thinking and acting bigger. Our actions need not be big or grand or even noticed by others. Faithful actions and intentions are noticed, valued by God and will not be wasted.

Grow your own - from the allotments

It's fair to say that this year was a challenge for our allotments. With such a cold start. many seeds found it hard to germinate. Then the lack of sun throughout summer. the travellers (allegedly) causing contaminated water butts, and loss of some crops, damage and theft. Then blight on many tomatoes too. I have certainly found it hard to keep enthusiasm going and keep on top of my very persistent weeds.

That said, when I walk around the allotments I see so many successes. Some plots put mine to absolute shame though I did have a

couple of successes, in particular my potatoes and I actually grew some edible sized carrots! I've had my plot since March 2019 so I'm an amateur, or what my kids call a 'Newb'!

Jobs to do in September & October (From 'Allotment Month by Month' by Alan Buckingham)

Harvest – the rest of your beans, peppers, sweetcorn, globe artichokes, leeks, pumpkins and main crop potatoes, and sweet potatoes.

Pick – late plums, apples, pears, autumn raspberries.

Sow – the last of your oriental and salad leaves for this year. Sow broad beans for next year straight into the ground.

Plant – spring cabbages and Japanese onion sets to overwinter for next year. Also garlic, onions,



rhubarb and bare-root bushes such as currants and gooseberries.

Clear away – dead plant matter and, by the end of October, bean, pea and tomato supports. Add non-infected matter to your compost.

If you have an allotment, you will be aware of how rewarding it can be. Yes, it's hard work and a commitment, however, the physical and mental health positives are huge. It's great for children to be involved in too. Please contact the staff in the Highworth Council Offices with any queries.

Speeding increases in August

In August, the Highworth Community Speedwatch team reported 1869 vehicles for speeding on the town's roads, an increase of 570 over July. They ran 86.46 hours over 80 sessions. The increase in sessions as well as more accurate targeting of speeding on certain roads explains the upswing in reported vehicles.

In all, team members gave up a total of 177 hours of their time to help make Highworth a nospeeding zone.

Overall, there has been a reduction of excessive speeding vehicles from 7.08% in July to 6.15% in August, which reflects the feedback we have had from residents. Although 5.72% of motorists are still speeding, they are being more cautious and are moderating their speeds.

In one session on Saturday 28th August, the team reported 125 vehicles for speeding on Cricklade Road. In analysis of the data from the session by Wiltshire police, it was found that out of the 125

vehicles recorded only 11 came from the SN6 area. It is also worth noting that 49 vehicles were from out of county. There were seven excessive speeders with four of those being out of county. The team believes this proves the majority of local drivers are sticking to the speed limits and would like to say thank you to everyone who sticks to the speed limits in our town, making it safer for all.

The team operates sites on Cricklade Road, Eastrop, Redlands, Roundhills Mead, Shrivenham Road and St Michael's Avenue. If you are interested in joining the friendly team to help run sessions and make the town's roads safer for all road users, please email highworthcsw@gmail.com.

Team members must be over the age of 18, able to stand for the duration of a session and be able to read the licence plate of a passing vehicle. CSW is a scheme run by Wiltshire Police. All volunteers are trained by Traffic Management Policing Officers and comply with a code of practice.

For those of you who don't know, we started Highworth in Bloom 10 years ago



An update from Westrop Medical Practice

With the shift from social distancing back towards a more normal existence, general practice needs to adapt once again. Although we have been seeing patients when needed throughout the pandemic, the majority of work has been done over the phone. With the relaxation of Covid regulations, it was clear that patients and our clinicians were keen to get back to a world where more was done face-to-face. This has resulted in a recent change in the booking system throughout Westrop.

Now when you ring to arrange an appointment you will be asked if you want to see the doctor/clinician, or

whether you want a phone call; the patient has the choice. Of course, certain things lend themselves to needing to be seen in person; lumps and bumps, rashes, tummy pain, etc. (our reception staff can guide you). That said, a surprisingly large amount can be dealt with really effectively with a phone call, along with the benefit of not having to travel to or wait in the surgery. Don't forget we also still have the option of a video call or texting photos if needed, and with many patients having home blood pressure monitors and now even pulse oximeters, it's easy to amass a wide range of information to help aid diagnosis and management without leaving the comfort of your own home!

In an attempt to make the clinics as accessible to patients as possible, they are available to book online, a service that many are now making use of. When you do this, please add the best contact number (in the case of a call), or tell us if you are coming in to see the doctor. Also, try and give us a brief idea of what the problem is, just so we know it has been booked in with an appropriate member of the team.

As a practice we understand that plans change, or problems resolve, and we are very grateful to the vast majority of our patients who ring and cancel their appointment when it is no longer required. However, the move back to prebookable face-to-face appointments has seen the return of the dreaded "DNA" ("did not



attend"!). These are always such a frustrating waste of precious resources, and whilst it's inevitable that they will happen from time to time we thank you for helping us to keep it an occasional occurrence, rather than a regular one.

We very much appreciate your patience and understanding as we adapt the service to reflect the current Covid situation. As I write, the current wait time for a routine GP appointment (phone or face to face) is six working days, with a daily 'duty doctor' to deal with any problems that need to be seen more urgently than this. Over the last few weeks, this wait time has varied from three days, up to a maximum of seven. I know that prompt access to appointments at the surgery is something that is very important to patients, and it's definitely something we take very seriously at Westrop. The managers and partners review the wait time at all of our sites on a weekly basis and, despite fluctuating demand and sometimes staff availability, work hard to try and keep accessibility as good as possible.

We hope you find the new appointment system gives you the flexibility you need. As ever, we welcome feedback and one of the best ways to provide this is by joining our patient participation group (PPG); details are on our website.


If you haven't been before, our visitors have commented that our artwork is of a very high standard so please come along to judge for yourselves.


This second book continues the theme of helping children (of all ages) understand that we are all unique and should celebrate our differences, "because together we make the world extraordinary".

'A Flourishing Little Town'

This was the description of Highworth given by Pigot & Co's Trade Directory in 1830.

There was special mention of an excellent library kept by a Mr J Ricketts. Shopping at this time you could have chosen from the following shops: Three shoemakers, four butchers, two seedsmen, five grocers and tea dealers; three ironmongers, three drapers, four general shopkeepers, five tailors and three candle makers. Also a bookseller, a cheesemonger, a watch and clock maker, a hairdresser, a milliner and a glass and china warehouse.

Over the years many shopkeepers advertised in the local papers. Many of these had a more specialist trade or wanted to appeal to the middle classes. Quite a few combined several lines. The Mr Joseph Ricketts mentioned above had his business in the Market Place in 1848. He was a printer, bookseller and stationer, a subdistributor of stamps, a circulating library and a Chemist and druggist also an agent for Sun Fire and Life Insurance.

June 1856. Mrs Reynolds, Milliner and Dressmaker. High Street.

'Begs to announce her return from London, and that she will have a select assortment of Bonnets, etc. Of the Newest Designs ready for inspection on Wednesday 28th inst.'

NB: Two apprentices wanted.

December 1867. Comptons, Compton House, High Street.

'Drapery to suit every class. We are now prepared for the season with the Largest, Cheapest Stock of Goods we have ever had.'

There followed a long list of what was available. Included were stays, corsets, crinolines and waterproof cloaks. They also had a Mourning Department.

May 1870. Joseph Hill. Established 50 years.

'Begs to offer his choice stock of seeds for Swedes, Turnips and Mangolds. Also Bedding Plants from 1/6 (7p) to 2/- (10p) a dozen.'



In 1900 there is the first mention of a dentist in the town. (It was usual for a blacksmith to pull out bad teeth!):

Mr R L Pinniger, Dentist from Southampton.

'Begs respectfully to announce to the gentry and inhabitants that he may be consulted professionally every alternate month. His first visit is on Wednesday March 9th at Mr Reynolds.'

F B Higgs was a Practical Tailor and Breeches Maker.

In 1892 he could be found on the High Street but later moved to what is now part of The Highworth. The firm stayed in the town for many years and was well-known for the quality of their work. You can still meet men who remember having their first suit made by Higgs.

Marsh's Drapery.

Another famous Highworth Store (now Allen and Harris). They advertised frequently in the 1900's. Always two sales a year. 'Everything reduced in all departments.' In 1924 he had a special offer of 'Farm Coats of proven value. Enormous Demand. Coats 1/11 (10p) each with detachable buttons for washing. Two sent by mail, post free.'

F. Wadley & Co, Brewery Street. June 1911

'Established nearly a century. Light Family Ales, Invalid Stout, Haymaking Ales.'

'All brewed from finest malts and hops'

Unfortunately the firm did not survive the loss of workers to the army in WWI.

Where the podium is now used to be a row of small shops (including the premises of the infamous fish and chip shop and its arch-enemy, Mr Wheeler). December 1921 sees a sad advert

by Joseph Billington, late Private, King's Liverpool Regiment. He made and repaired willow baskets. Joseph had been blinded in WWI and then been trained by St. Dunstans:

> 'Please give me a trial'

I hope that gives a taste of how the town once was. Just a sample from my large collection.

When we came to Highworth in 1980 we still had the following shops: a bookshop, drapers, wool

and sewing shop, wine merchant, two ladies dress shops, kitchenware and china, two butchers, greengrocer, sweets and tobacco, bread and cakes, DIY, children's shoes, electrical, dry cleaner and shoe repairs, three banks, post office and chemist. Most now gone. Newcomers please support those we still have.

The Ridgeway 86 Challenge

For most a marathon represents the very limits of human endurance and rightfully so, but there is a weird and wonderful world beyond the recognised 26.2 miles and this is the home of the Ultra Distance Runner. In this world the emphasis shifts from 'race' to 'challenge' as each participant pushes their own physical limitations, wrestles with their own pain thresholds and balances their ability to adequately manage nutrition and hydration.

The 'Ridgeway 86' that took place over August's Bank Holiday is one such event and starts at Buckinghamshire's Ivinghoe Beacon and ends at Wiltshire's Avebury Stone Circle 86 miles away. A historic 5000 year old trackway along the Chiltern Hills and North Wessex Downs with over 6000 feet of ascents and descents. With a 40% dropout rate the faint-hearted need not apply. On the Saturday morning Highworth Running Club's Jason Campbell took to the start line and headed homeward, an undertaking of a full day's running followed by a full night's.
