### An update from the Old Golf Course Action Group



Since we last reported on the Old Golf Course, a lot has happened! A petition to Swindon Borough Council received 4,562 adult signatures; more than fifty percent of Highworth's entire population and, we understand, significantly more than any other petition ever presented to SBC. The Mayor of Swindon Borough, Councillor Gary Perkins, came into Council Offices on his day off to personally receive this petition; a key moment published for posterity by the Swindon Advertiser. He spoke of his passion for preserving Swindon Borough's public green spaces and of his personal support for saving Highworth's Old Golf Course.

A significant and heartening number of Highworth residents submitted personal consultation responses to SBC's Local Plan consultation, making their views on SBC's plan to cover one of Swindon's last remaining publicly-owned, publicly-accessible green spaces in high density housing very clear indeed. This was backed by 440 survey responses clearly highlighting the enduring value of the Old Golf Course to so many people as open, accessible green space to support physical and mental health and wellbeing and the preservation of flora and fauna.

In their official consultation response, our own fantastic Highworth Town Council also unanimously opposed SBC's plan to build any housing on the Old Golf Course land and they continue to earmark it as green space within the town's own Neighbourhood Plan; itself under consultation with Highworthians now.

The Action Group submitted an application for

the entirety of the Old Golf Course to become permanently designated formally as Local Green Space, in keeping with the Government's definition within the National Planning Policy Framework, in addition to it already being an SBC Asset of Community Value until at least 2024. Again, HTC supported this application unanimously.

And finally, of course, our very own Prime Minister and his Secretary Of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities have both recently highlighted former golf courses as specific examples of green space to be protected from development!

As a town, we now await the outcome of these many activities, but this will take some months to become clear. In the meantime, the Action Group plan to continue displaying more posters and banners, to talk once again with our MP Justin Tomlinson and are encouraging Highworthians to write to, and email, HTC and SBC Councillors to keep the issue in the forefront of their minds, with details of how to do so on the group's Facebook page and website.

The Old Golf Course has so much potential as a community asset for Highworth and neighbouring villages and towns, should we be successful in our efforts to get the site removed from the Local Plan. Here are the ideas put forward by the 440 people that responded to our survey during the summer. Some great ideas here. The full survey results can be found on our website.

Jobs to do in December (From 'Allotment Month by Month', by Alan Buckingham):

Harvest - Leeks, root vegetables autumn and winter brassicas.



Plant - Garlic, rhubarb and new bare-root fruit trees and bushes, avoid frozen or waterlogged

Prune - Apple and pear trees and soft fruit bushes.

Dig - Over your plot, and use plenty of well-rotted organic material. Cover plots to protect the soil.

Check - Nets over brussel sprouts, cabbages and other brassica.

I have just started renting out a property. What do I need to do regarding tax?

If the rent is lower than the personal allowance of £12,570 -2021/22 (and you have no other income), you will not pay income tax. But if the gross rental income exceeds £10,000, or the net rental income exceeds £2,500, then HMRC will still require a tax return.

If you make a loss on the rental, it is still a good idea to complete a Tax Return so that you can record the loss, carry it forward, and maybe reduce your tax in a later year.

I've made a film for Wiltshire Community Foundation, made my own showreel, built my website, improved my CV and my confidence has grown."

The Platform Project, now in its fourth year, is a social enterprise that helps prepare young people for the work environment and take their next steps into a career, with 89% of the young people they work with moving on into paid work, further education or self-employment.

### Want to help make our town safer?

During October, with fewer daylight hours and less opportunity to get out before or after work for those volunteers with full time jobs, the Highworth Community Speed Watch team conducted 41 sessions

719 vehicles were reported for speeding in the town. Of that total, 50 vehicles exceeded speed limits by 150%+. Over the last three months there has been a month-on-month reduction in the percentage of vehicles reported: 5.72% in August; 4.53% in September; 3.66% in October. This is seen as a very encouraging trend and the team would like to thank all those residents who are choosing to moderate their speed.

A few team members have had to leave the team for personal reasons and so new volunteers are required to help run sessions. The minimum commitment is one hour a month. If you are interested in helping make the town's roads safer for road users and pedestrians, please email highworthcsw@gmail.com. Team members must be over the age of 18, able to stand for the duration of a session and be able to read the licence plate of a passing vehicle.

CSW is a scheme run by Wiltshire Police. All volunteers are trained by Traffic Management Policing Officers and comply with a code of practice.

# Dementia Friends sessions for Highworth social and leisure groups

It's two years since Highworth was designated as working towards Dementia Friendly status. Part of that process involved the running of a number Dementia Friends sessions in the Council Room.

A Dementia Friend is someone who learns a little bit about what it's like to live with dementia and understands the small ways we can all help to create dementia friendly communities. From telling friends about Dementia Friends, to visiting someone you know living with dementia, every action counts.

These sessions have not been run for some time now, but online sessions are available and it is important for the social and leisure groups in Highworth to be more aware of the effect of dementia on those living in Highworth and what we can all do to help.

There is no time commitment to signing up as a Dementia Friend apart from the initial session. It is more about understanding and support rather than taking on any particular activity.

### Highworth Cadets: New beginnings and continuous improvement

#### New cadets

Recently, we have gained 14 new recruits at 878 (Highworth) Squadron, with several waiting over a year to join us due to Covid-19 restrictions. Since joining us, they have engaged in community events, including the Highworth Fireworks Display; been on a trip away to the RAF Museum Hendon; and officially been enrolled as Royal Air Force Air Cadets. They are also learning vital skills to sustain them throughout their cadet careers such as basic drill, the history of the RAF & ATC and sewing!

#### Continuing to improve

Over the last month, four of our cadets: Cpl Sam Brown, Cpl Alex Tilling, Cdt Katie Martin and Cdt Katie Revill, attended the Cadet Development Course held at MOD Lyneham. This consists of a training day and an assessment day. The course is designed for cadets to gain skills towards being an NCO such as leadership, knowledge of uniform and drill and a high standard of self-discipline. It is also designed to equip cadets with useful life skills such as interview techniques. All four cadets did themselves proud and can now continue to the next step in their cadet careers in due course.

We have also had three of our older cadets: Sgt Livia Foulds, Cpl Alex Tillings and Cpl Nile Austin begin the process to stay on past 18 years old; the age at which some cadets 'age out' and leave us. They have the choice to stay on but must put a case forward as to why they are an asset to the Air Cadets and have an interview with our Sector

Commander. Squadron Leader Pascoe. They must also complete paperwork and safeguarding training prior to their 18th birthday. Once all of this is done, they can then stay until 20 years of age, if they choose to, and we are

pleased to keep all three on our Squadron, contributing to the Corps and being rôle models for our incoming new recruits.

### Scouts go camping after a two-year break

15 Scouts from Highworth camped at Youlbury Scout Activity Centre in October. On arrival we walked down to the area in the woods where we would be camping for the weekend, unloaded the tents from the minibuses and set them up in the dark.

After setting up the tents, the Scouts and some of the leaders went on a familiarisation and exploratory walk around the site in the dark; this was where our torches came in very handy!

On our return to our site we had hot chocolate and a slice of homemade thick, gooey chocolate cake. The campfire was lit and we sat around it on the logs enjoying our sugary treats. Soon after, we were off to bed after brushing our teeth, of course!

The hot chocolate was the cause of a need for a

wee in the early hours, thankfully only a short stroll from the tent to the toilet block with the moon as a guide.

We woke around 07.20, to the smell of bacon being cooked, mmmm! After breakfast the Scouts were split in to two groups the older Scouts went to experience

archery for a couple of hours while the younger members started making a commando rope bridge between two trees. This bridge has two lines of thick rope, one directly above the other, for you to walk across one rope and hold on the rope above. An alternative method was to do a dead man's crawl along the single bottom strand of rope. The two groups switched over activities to complete the morning session.

Before the afternoon activities began, we were going to take the opportunity to invest our three newest Scouts. The leaders like to try and invest Scouts in special ways so what an opportunity we had and what a memory for the young people! All 15 Scouts climbed on to the commando bridge with the three to be

invested in the middle.

The Scouts worked in patrols during the afternoon doing a round-robin of activities:

- We had to follow a map and find the controls that were marked and the letters that were on trees or posts. This gave us a chance to explore more of the campsite in daylight.
- We learnt how to use a knife, axe and saw safely and made feather sticks to help us light the campfire.
- Our final activity was to prepare a sketch (a very short comic play). The leaders thought that some of these left a bit to be desired, but it is all about trying everything and not being afraid to perform in front of others.

After the three afternoon activities the patrols

had to prepare and cook their chilli whilst the leaders cooked the 'ton' of rice. Everybody tried the chilli although one or two Scouts didn't eat very much but at least everyone tried it! Thankfully, from the Scouts point of view, the campsite shop opened and the



sweet counter was raided.

We had a lot of wood to burn so the campfire was lit early. It was a nice big fire that kept us warm! The patrols performed their sketches that they practiced during the afternoon before venturing to bed after our cake and hot chocolate.

On Sunday morning, we took part in three problem-solving activities and took down our tents. All Scouts then helped with carrying the equipment back to the trailer ready for its return journey to Highworth. Before we drove home, we did a final check around our camp, making sure that we hadn't left any rubbish.







### **Highworth Historical Society – 50 years-old** in January 2022

The inaugral meeting of the society was held on January 30th 1972 in the Library. (For those new to the town this was a pre-fab with a dodgy floor opposite Parsonage Court.)

There was a good attendance and a committee was formed:

Mr E. Chick. Chairman: Vice Chairman: Mr R. Winning. Secretary Mr J. Twitchen. Treasurer: Mrs M. Jelous.

Committee members were:

Mr. A.D. Dicks, Mrs C. Collett, Mr. J. Archer and Mr. Cole.

The aim of the society was to foster interest in local history and in the preservation of the town. There was to be no political affilliation and evervone was welcome.

The membership fee was set at 25p a year. This proved optimistic and it doubled to 50p at the first AGM. This was to held in January each year but soon changed to September, that being the start of the winter programme. In fact we are now the only local history society not to have January.

By March, Mr Mike Stone had given the first talk to the society and had been co-opted on to the committee. At the following AGM, Dr. Bryan Lawton had also been elected. These two men were the driving forces behind several of the society projects. These included the recording of the church gravestones and the publishing of the 'History of Highworth' books. Two of these are now out of print with only a few copies left of number 3. It is hoped to start work soon on a new history of the town. This will be based on some of the material from the original three.

From early on, the aim was to have a town museum. Fund-raising was carried on with book sales and cheese and wine evenings being popular. The grand idea was never fulfilled as no suitable premises were found. We did come near as Wiltshire County Council (we used to belong to them) provided a history room in new libraries built. We were so near when that project ceased. Mere in the south of the county has a lovely one

in their library. We do now have a small one in Visit Highworth, curated by Paul and Ann Marie.

As the membership grew, the library proved too small and there were not enough chairs. At one stage people were asked to bring their own folding ones. I can just remember some of the meetings with chairs between the book shelves. No screen and projector, just the spoken word. Eventually the move was made to the Council Rooms were we met for a long time.

The society has always been busy collecting photos and other artifacts connected to Highworth. Reading the old minutes I realise that guite a few of these things seem to have vanished. The problem was that there was no central storage point. Items were farmed out to anyone with a spare room or cupboard. People moved or died and things were probably thrown out. We now have a storage room at the Community Centre. If you find any Highworth item, however small, please contact our archivist annmarie@annmariemurphy.co.uk or drop the

item into Visit Highworth.

With a Jubilee celebration next year it was interesting to see the plan for the Silver Jubilee. The theme for the floats was for each one to show something for a year of the Queen's Reign. The Historical Society chose 1957 as this was the 700th anniversary of Highworth Market. The original plan seems to have been for a tractor and farm cart on which would have been the following: stocks, a crate of hens, a calf, hurdles and a wicker cage for cocks. I would have thought this was asking for trouble. The idea seems to have changed to a stagecoach and horses.





#### From our MP

As readers will be aware, world leaders and various dignitaries arrived in Glasgow as part of the 26th United Nations Climate Change (COP26) conference. A Conference of the Parties (COP) brings together nations from across the globe to collaborate on tackling the urgent issue of climate change.

One such positive is the collaboration of more than 100 countries (which have 88% of the world's forests), to work together to halt and reverse the destruction of our forests, particularly rainforests, by 2030.

I have long campaigned in Parliament to protect the world's natural habitats and have worked closely with the World Wildlife Foundation to support protecting endangered species. The amount of forestation which has been destroyed in the last few decades has been devastating. Sadly, it isn't just the Amazon where forests are being destroyed, it is all across the planet.

As Sir David Attenborough recently explained to delegates at the conference; we must turn this tragedy into triumph. Forests and green spaces are the lungs of our planet. Reversing the loss of the earth's lungs could not happen sooner and I am glad that this commitment has been signed by all of the key countries.

Of course, it is important that we do our bit locally as well and I am delighted that Swindon Council is taking action to protect and enhance green spaces through the Swindon Forest Meadows Project. Being run in conjunction with Wiltshire Wildlife Trust (WWT), the project will support initiatives covering more than 170 hectares of land such as Sevenfields, Hreod Burna Urban Forest and other WWT reserves. In the case of Highworth, it is very

topical to seek to protect (and enhance) our green open spaces; this focuses minds further.

The UK is also keen to see more countries sign up to the commitment to reach net zero emissions. I often meet with local environmental groups in Swindon, including the well-researched Swindon Climate Action Network, making sure their ideas and challenges are fed in. I know just how important this is, especially to younger generations. We absolutely have no choice; those most affected by climate change will be the young people alive today, not some far off future generation. We must respond to this issue now and continue to do all we can to save and protect our precious planet.

As this is the last edition of the Link Magazine for 2021, I would like to wish everyone reading a very Happy Christmas and New Year. This Christmas, although the shadow cast by the pandemic will linger, we should be grateful for the opportunities we have and reflect on the year just gone.

on show around the town and at the Council Offices.




