Geoff always demonstrated what Christian service to his local community really means.



Through times of great joy and great sadness, in periods of peace and in times of turbulence, he cared for, visited and has been a friend to so many people. He demonstrated his love, commitment and service by doing what Jesus said; preaching the gospel and caring for our fellow citizens who need a hand, are voiceless

What have you enjoyed, what are your favourite memories?

I have loved being part of the community of Highworth, knowing so many people waving to them from my bike, blessing the Christmas tree lights on the Podium and other community events.

Working with the other Churches has been a joy, establishing our joint work in the town: our schools work, the Christians Against Poverty debt centre, the Link magazine. I am proud of the fact that the four Churches are increasingly known as 'the Church in Highworth'. I remember Bishop Mike Hill of Bristol coming to share his faith with all of us one weekend. We had breakfast at The Highworth, tea in Church and a pig roast after a service at the Rec, where he prayed individually for almost 200 people.

I am glad to leave a legacy of different teams and wonderful people taking forward the good or in difficulty.

Geoff has left thriving Churches in the parishes he served. Under his leadership, St Michael and All Angels Highworth was refurbished and transformed inside to be a beautiful setting for events from weddings to craft fairs and concerts, as well as a wonderful place for regular Church services and private prayer.

He also leaves behind a legacy of encouragement and teamwork, always valuing the gifts that others may bring. He played a key rôle in the

development of Churches Together in Highworth, working closely with our civic leaders and supporting the communities in the villages.

We send every blessing to Geoff and his wife Muriel in their retirement together and future new home.

Having a pint of the Rev James in the Rose and Crown, people shouting out 'Hi Geoff' as I pass on the bike, playing tennis at the Rec. Memories of bringing up my children here, with the wonderful schools, the girls football team and 'mini man' hot chocolate at Sally's coffee shop.

Ask AMS

My business has grown and I need an extra person. Do I have to make them an employee?

If you take on an employee you will have to consider: Employer's National Insurance, Employers Liability Insurance, Statutory Holidays, Auto Enrolment etc.

If you hire a self-employed worker it could be more beneficial because you will have significantly fewer legal responsibilities. However, this could potentially lead to other problems such as HMRC deciding the worker is an employee and that you have paid them 'wages'. They can demand Employer's National Insurance from you – plus interest/penalties. One of the key employment law factors to consider is: If you closely manage the worker to carry out their work, then HMRC are more likely to class them as an employee. However, if they work under their own control – more like a consultant or expert, they are more likely to be classed as self-employed.

From the allotments



They say, "If February starts with cloud and rain, then winter is almost over, especially if there is a westerly wind. However, if the wind is easterly at the beginning of the month, then winter will be here for some weeks to come".

February can be one of the coldest months of the year so I've started to use this month to get organised before the seedling madness of March.

Clean out old seed trays, pots and trowels, spades, forks, etc. Ideally this should have been done months ago, but if you didn't (like me!), here is our last chance. Sort out your seeds and plan a drawing of your patch/plot including rotation and positioning. My plan rarely goes to plan, but I do try!

If you are struggling to get seeds or seedlings

then join our Facebook page, 'Highworth Rec Allotment Group'. With 81 members, we have a lovely mix of generous people who will quite often give away surplus seeds and seedlings either for free, or swapsies.

Jobs to do in February, from 'Allotment month by month' by Alan Buckingham

Harvest - Cabbages, cauliflower, brussels sprouts, kale, leeks, celeriac, parsnips and swede

Sow - seeds indoors, broad beans, brussels sprouts, globe artichokes, kohl rabi, leeks, lettuces, onions, peas, radishes, rhubarb, salad leaves, spinach and tomatoes

Plant - shallots and garlic

Chit - seed potatoes

Dig - over your plot, add plenty of well-rotted organic material

Cover - seeds beds with polythene or cardboard to warm up soil

A productive year for the Community Speed Watch team

During 2021 the Highworth Community Speed Watch team reported an incredible 8365 vehicles for speeding on the roads of the town. 482 drivers chose to break the town's speed limits by more than 150% (45mph+ in a 30 limit; 60mph+ in a 40 limit).

Now we are in 2022, many will be looking for opportunities to do something new. By volunteering to join the friendly and successful CSW team, you would be helping make Highworth a safer place for residents of all ages, from children walking to and from school to our more elderly residents who may take that little while longer to cross the road. Each new team member makes a real difference and can literally save lives.

The only requirements are that you are over 18, can stand for the duration of an hour session

and can read the licence plate of a passing vehicle. The team uses WhatsApp to communicate so having a mobile phone on which it is or can be installed would be ideal. You would be expected to do a minimum of just one hour a month at time you choose to fit around your life. Even the busiest people can make a small commitment that will make a huge difference.

An update on Highworth's Old Golf Course

By the time this edition of The Link Magazine reaches your doorstep, Swindon Borough Council's full sitting will have voted upon whether or not to pass their 'Local Plan to 2036' to the Government-appointed Inspector changed, or unchanged, from its original form. As a consequence, we will know by now whether or not SBC has decided to listen to, or ignore, more than 4,600 Highworth and wider Borough residents who have made their views very clear indeed on SBC's intention to allow one third of the Old Golf Course to be built upon.

Whatever one's personal views, an unassailable fact is that a majority of residents answered a survey; submitted more Local Plan consultation responses than ever before recorded by SBC; completed an online petition with more responses than ever before recorded by SBC; distributed thousands of leaflets and flyers; put up hundreds of posters and banners and held vocal protests at SBC-led planning events; all in opposition to SBC's plan.

The Action Group for Highworth's Old Golf Course met twice with Mr Justin Tomlinson MP and lobbied both our own HTC Councillors (who unanimously opposed the inclusion of the Old Golf Course site in SBC's Local Plan) and wider SBC Councillors up to, and including, both the Mayor of Swindon and the Leader of the Council and, of course, the Head of Planning, Councillor Gary Sumner.

Little more could have been done to ensure that SBC fully understand the strength of opposition to the plan to build on even a part of Highworth's Old Golf Course. As an issue, this has certainly galvanised our lovely Hilltop Market Town like few issues before.

Aware of this feeling, and in a significant change from his previous position (as reported in the December Link), our MP Justin Tomlinson has responded to the Action Group with this statement:

"For me, the key issue is the overall number of houses already being built / being proposed for Highworth. The cumulative total of these developments in my mind are more than Highworth's 'fair-share' therefore the additional Highworth Golf Course is too big an ask. Both myself and ClIr Steve Weisinger have made this point to ClIr David Renard (SBC Leader), who alongside the petition raised etc., has promised to urgently review. Kind regards, Justin"

We will know by now whether, in the run-up to this May's key SBC elections, Swindon Borough's councillors chose to listen to, or ignore, our MP, our Town Council and an undeniably large number of their voting Borough residents. At time of writing, we sincerely hope that it was the former of these two choices.

HIGH STREET HEROES

"I was a money launderer"

It happened right under our noses. While we were grappling with what the lockdown meant in March 2020, lain Gray, proprietor of Highworth Hardware, was busy laundering our money. He took home his takings every day and kept it in separate plastic bags for three days, before washing the plastic notes and coins, ready for re-use.

These were uncertain times with lots of public health warnings but very little real evidence of how the coronavirus was transmitted.



The day after the lockdown was announced and traders closed their stores, lain went home and thought, "What can I do?" Next day he was delighted to hear that hardware stores were exempt from closure which was just as well because we then embarked on several months of DIY jobs and gardening at home. Yet he was quite anxious about picking up the virus until he erected a screen across the counter.

Highworthians took to the streets, lanes and tracks for exercise. For many, it was a welcome time to catch up on long neglected tasks and to enjoy the outdoors in what turned out to be an abundantly sunny springtime. Meanwhile, lain kept his shop open on reduced hours. Oh boy, did we need him!

Starting in computer repairs, Iain had a long history in hardware, 19 years in stores at Wroughton and Shrivenham, before setting up in Highworth with both hardware and gardening supplies. It's a veritable Aladdin's cave of items carefully curated by Iain using his wealth of experience. He's learned that the more items he has, the better the chance of a sale. "If I have the time I can sometimes help customers to repair something," he says. That's something you won't get in the big chain stores. Iain has noticed trade is on the up, although many have tended to shop earlier in the day during the pandemic. It's hardly been worth staying open after about 3pm, although I noticed shoppers calling after 3pm while lain told me about his pandemic experience. "I might have to extend a bit soon," he observed. But many High Street traders are not rushing to resume their former long hours. Office workers and employers have learned there are unexpected benefits of home working and local traders are reaping the rewards of slightly shorter hours. When Iain started out as a sole trader, he usually worked seven days a week, but now he's down to three as he employs Sarah Wild to extend service to six days a week. "Work's not everything" he says.

Although lain has taken some flak from a few impatient shoppers, his expanding base of loyal customers are full of praise for this bustling local hardware store. "Sarah and I thank everyone who us supported us over these four years," lain says.

His advice to others in small business? Avoid debt and plan for your VAT and tax liabilities. Don't take all the profit; keep a reserve in your business for a rainy day.

Fairford Choral society review, December 2021

It was splendid to be part of an appreciative audience at the Fairford and District Choral Society carol concert on 4th December, and particularly so after a year's gap due to the pandemic.

The evening was so warm and welcoming, despite the social distancing and mask limitations to which we have now become so strangely accustomed. In a well-chosen programme complete with excellent soloists, the audience was treated to Haydn's short St Nicholas Mass followed by a delightful selection of Advent and Christmas Carols.

Haydn is thought to have composed the 'Missa Sancti Nicolai' for the Feast of St Nicholas on the 6th of December 1772 as a seasonal 'thank you' to his employer, Prince Nickolaus Esterhazy. The Fairford choir, conducted by music director Marysia Gorska-Saj, and uplifted by the support of organist Robin Baggs, delivered this whole lyrical work with a lightness of tone and diction aptly suited to the festive occasion.

The professional SATB quartet was made up of conservatoire undergraduate Matilda Wale, recent graduates Nicole Boardman and William Pearson, plus Gloucester Cathedral Lay Clerk Nicholas Perfect. The ensemble created an excellent blend of song and, together with the

choir, highlighted the warm harmonies and lyrical legato lines of this delightful, lilting 'Mass in six-four time'.

After a short interval, the choir treated us to a balanced and enjoyable selection of Advent and Christmas carols, each thoughtful and reflective in nature. The carol choices gave us chance to enjoy the unique voices of each of the soloists, soprano Matilda and tenor William ably fronting Darke's lovely 'In the Bleak Midwinter' and the rich mezzo of Nicole in 'A Maiden Most Gentle'.

Of all the carols performed, I most enjoyed the choir's rendition of 'A Spotless Rose' by Herbert Howells. With a fine contrasting verse sung by bass soloist Nicholas, I thought the choir here demonstrated not only a particular clarity of diction and variety of dynamics, but also created a touching warmth of sound in its middle range; a quality I had also glimpsed on several occasions in the homophonic sections of Haydn's Mass.

Following two lively John Rutter arrangements, the concert drew to a close with well-loved audience carols. Despite the inevitable challenge which singing 'Ding Dong Merrily' in a mask brings (!) it was altogether a welcome evening reminding us of the true spirit of Christmas amidst these uncertain times!

Helen Browning's Organic

Helen Browning 60 is chief executive of the Soil Association – the charity that looks after the way we eat, farm and care for the natural world. She lives on a 1300 Church of England tenanted organic farm in Bishopstone, Wiltshire with her partner Tim and George a retired greyhound.

When did your family start farming? I've no idea! I do know that my grandfather was both farming and trading horses for the milk floats in Gloucester and Birmingham, and four of his nine sisters farmed together near Malvern. They were wonderful folk, and inspired me hugely. So I have always thought of myself as coming from a long line of farmers.

Did you grow up on the farm and has it always been in your family roots? My father moved to Eastbrook, where I still farm, in 1950, taking a tenancy from the Church of England. So I grew up here, and then took on the management in 1986.

Are there any differences between the farm now and the farm growing up? Well, it's still a very mixed farm, as it was when I was growing up here, but in other ways it's very different. For a start, it's now all organically managed, so no artificial fertilisers or pesticides; we have added new enterprises, like my fabulous British Saddleback pigs and more recently, lots of fruit and nut trees; and we don't just farm but sell our food to people both directly and through supermarkets; and we also run the village pub, with it's own little hotel, right in the middle of the farm... so people can come to experience what we do, tour the farm and eat the produce! So it's a busier place that when I was growing up, employing over 60 people, and focussed on enabling wildlife to thrive and giving animals a good life.

From our MP

As we enter 2022, I have been struck by the constructive and highly visible 'Save Highworth's Old Golf Course' campaign.

I have met with representatives of the campaign group who were always well prepared, well researched and presented their case strongly. I have seen the 4,500+ petition and you can't fail to notice the posters proudly displayed across Highworth. The scale of opposition to the proposed houses is clear.

I have previously written about the process for identifying land for new houses across Swindon. This will form a new Local Plan and, once agreed, this will provide full protection to land outside the Local Plan from speculative development. In recent years without a Local Plan, we have seen first-hand how developers have been able to secure new sites across Highworth, with little or nothing the Borough or Town Council can do to either block, or shape these developments.

The vast majority of the draft Local Plan is not contentious and whilst new development is often not welcomed by existing communities, the balance seems to have been struck. Ahead of Swindon Borough Council's crunch meeting on January 20th the areas still for debate are Highworth's old golf course and various proposed developments in Wroughton.

For me, balance is key. We need a Local Plan. Without one we have seen numerous developments across Highworth, in particular along Shrivenham Road. These, combined with the other planned developments through the Neighbourhood Plan, will see Highworth grow by 25% over a matter of years. That is more than enough and demonstrates that Highworth is providing more than its fair share of development for the Borough. So on balance, the additional housing at Highworth's old golf course is too much. Alternative site(s) could and should be found for the Local Plan.

I have never been an MP who calls for more housing nationally whilst opposing development in my area. Instead, I have sat down with developers to try and shape developments with maximum green space and investment for local communities, rather than just oppose which then inevitably leads to developers winning on appeal and reducing their spend on the community. It has always been about balance and every community in the Borough should play its part equally where possible. Highworth has done so without the need to build housing on a muchloved green space.

Along with Cllr Steve Weisinger, I have made strong representations to Cllr David Renard, Leader of Swindon Borough Council. Proposals for the 350 houses at Highworth's old golf course need to be removed; something Cllr Steve Weisinger will formally press at the January 20th meeting, with my full support. This site needs to remain for the community, solely for leisure use with a long-term, sustainable plan that protects the site both now and in the future.
