But with time it all seemed to work and I passed my driving test. Talk about a miracle!

Unfortunately, on the first Sunday of my ministry, I miscalculated the width of the bus in front of me, and hit it. No damage to me or to the bus, but the car; well, that needed intensive care. The church was very kind and understood and I had a ten-year ministry among them.

Then in 2010, when we moved to the UK, I had to relearn; on 'the other side of the road', using

different hands. But thankfully no accidents!

What at one time in my life seemed utterly impossible and made no sense, today is part of my life. I won't say I'm the best driver, but I know I am not the worst!

All this became a parable of life; learning, experiencing, trusting, being cared for, caring, even correcting mistakes and discovering that after that first time, I never had to worry about the width of a bus again. I would be much more relaxed if all drivers used indicator lights when they plan to change lanes, but again, life is not perfect. Always on alert!

I never imagined that the most difficult of tasks would help me develop my journey of faith, which is often like learning to drive and putting myself in the hands of God and hoping other drivers will remember they aren't alone on the journey.

Don't forget the indicator, it helps all of us! It's the little things that sometimes make the difference, as in life.

Community Larder scheme planned for Highworth

It is estimated that around 6.7 million tonnes of food produced in the UK is wasted. Yes, in the UK this equates to the average family throwing away 22% of their weekly shop, which is worth £730 per year, whilst about 8.4 million people are struggling to afford their food bills.*

One way of alleviating this problem is by making sure that some of this 'waste' can be accessed by consumers rather than thrown away.

We are looking at the possibility of setting up a Community Larder to receive surplus food from warehouses and supermarkets and make it available to the community at low cost. Similar schemes can be found in various towns in the area, such as Faringdon.

This project is only in the planning stage at present. We are in discussion with groups which collect and supply the surplus and are looking for suitable premises.

In the meantime, one way we can all avoid food

waste and excess surplus food is to use Olio. This is a free app on which anyone can list food, or other items, they do not need. Anyone else who has the app can then obtain the item.

Highworth Debt Centre Swimming Against Poverty so You Don't Have to Freeze this Winter!

This August saw 68 local people take part in a Swimming Against Poverty event at The Halo Rec centre to raise funds to help more people through this winter. They swam a total of 56km (that's nearly 35 miles) and raised over £7000.

The Highworth CAP debt centre is offering free debt help as the colder weather and the current energy crisis drives up fuel bills.

The Highworth branch of Christians Against Poverty (CAP) also covers much of the surrounding area and is based at The Bridge

Centre, Sheep Street, offering free debt help to local people struggling with rising energy prices or facing other money problems.

Kathryn Ford, CAP Debt Centre Manager, said, "During the pandemic, 37% of CAP clients told us they went without heating before seeking free debt help. That is already a very upsetting statistic and now we are facing a big increase in energy prices which we know will leave many more people in Highworth struggling to meet all their bills.

"Getting free help now can make a huge difference and it means that we'll be able to help



people keep their homes warm and the lights on. Our team is here to help with debt problems through our CAP Debt Help service and, because we're local, we can also support practically too. This includes linking people up with local food banks, arranging emergency shops, emergency fuel top-ups, support, encouragement and a friendly face. We don't want anyone worrying about how they'll manage to stay warm this winter."

The charge for visitors is £3. Or, why not become a member for £12, this covers our nine talks for the year.



Ask AMS Do you need to submit a Tax Return?

You need to submit an Income Tax return (for 2021/22) if HMRC send you a Tax Return to complete or, if you know that you have income tax or capital

gains tax to pay. However, HMRC have a list of further circumstances where a Tax Return should be prepared, including: Your income from self-employment exceeded £1,000; You are a company director;

You received over £2,500 in rental income. If it was between £1,000 and £2,500 you should contact HMRC;

You received more than £2,500 in other income; You received £10,000 or more before tax from savings/investments;

You made Capital Gains in excess of £12,000; You have received dividends in excess of £10,000; Your taxable income exceeds £50,000 and you, or your partner, receive Child Benefit;

Your taxable income exceeds £100,000.

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My experience at Strategy Camp 2022

particularly good at it). During the afternoon we headed for the inflatables but the line was too long and it was raining. We didn't want to stand







HIGH STREET HEROES

No Shortcuts in this Trade

In my hometown, Rockhampton, the beef capital of Australia, the meat trade was a vast local employer. A key player was Vestey, a British firm that ran a large abattoir. They also owned Dewhurst, a chain of butchers whose portfolio included a modest store in Highworth which closed in 1995. The Andrews, who'd met while working together at a 'cutting' plant in Andover, convinced the bank manager, bought it and set up a partnership now 27 vears old.

Today, there are two stores with an impressive payroll of 15. Andy Sears runs their Highworth shop and Andy

Ayris another in Marlborough. I asked Andy (Sears) about the key to their success. "The clue's in the name," he responded without hesitation. "Andrews Quality Meats. There's no shortcuts in trade, whether cutting meat, building houses or making a cabinet; there is no easy route."

Discerning shoppers want to know the provenance of food products, especially meats. The Andrews partnership has a firm control over their sources of meat which is why Andrews' supply chain is carefully selected and as local as possible, such as the lambs (with 'yellow fat') from Richard Manners near Shrivenham. They also source from farmers local to both shops. Andy explains, "It's so important to know where the meat's coming from, know the abattoir and be confident that you can trace it from the farm to the shop."

Although initially shocked by the government's lockdown instruction to close shops in February 2020, Andrews adapted quickly with a 'phone and collect' service and home deliveries. Orderly queues formed outside as Highworth's shoppers learned yet another benefit of shopping locally, ensuring they had a reliable supplier of quality meats in the High Street.

It's common knowledge nowadays that the demand for meat is reducing a little as consumers 'go vegetarian' or wish to reduce reliance on meat, which is perceived to have a heavy carbon footprint. Andrews have observed this trend and introduced offerings of meat and vegetables such as stir fries. They've responded to the demand for fast foods with a 'food to go' service with prepared dishes on (recyclable) aluminium trays, perhaps what our former prime minister would call 'oven ready'. They also stock a lot of poultry (white meats) and seasonal game.

Andrews also serves a flourishing lunchtime trade with cold meat and salad baguettes as well as breakfast for workers such as builders.

The meat trade runs through Andy's family. His father, Bob, was a butcher and lived in Highworth until he passed away in 2016, aged 83. Andy's son Mark has followed the family tradition.

This autumn, as you pop another banger on your autumn barbie, raise a toast to Andrews Quality Meats, Link's October High Street Heroes.

Barbara Ann Lawton, 1943-2022

Barbara Lawton, who passed away on the 25 May, was well-known for her love of flowers and was a very skilled arranger.

For many years she was Chairman of the Highworth and District Floral Art Society (HADFAS). During her first two periods as Chairman, the Club was chosen to represent the South West Area at the Chelsea Flower Show. To her delight, the Club won Gilt and Silver Gilt Medals. Subsequently, she was elected President and made an Honorary Member.

In 1972, HADFAS approached the Vicar of Highworth and asked if they could raise funds for the church by holding a floral festival and, before long, the entire town seemed to join in. This caused a revival of the Highworth four-yearly Festival with pageants and all manner of other events. This proved very successful until Covid-19 came along.

Born in 1973 in Ashton-under-Lyne, Greater Manchester, at school Barbara excelled at her

studies and later became head girl. She attended the Queens Road Methodist Church and also became a girl guide, choir member and member of the Methodist Guild and, after taking a secretarial course, she worked for the Co-operative Insurance Office.

Barbara first met Bryan when they both appeared together in a missionary play and they later married in 1964, settling down in Hyde, Cheshire. To their great joy, Sarah appeared in 1968 and later the family moved to Shrivenham, where Bryan got a job at the College, before moving to Highworth where they stayed for 52 years. Thereafter, Barbara joined the Highworth Floral Art Society, the

Highworth Choral Society, the Garden Club and was a founder member of the Rambling Club. She loved arranging her pedestals as part of St Michael's Flower Guild and on other major occasions.

> On hearing José Carreras singing in 1986, she became smitten by both the opera and the tenor's voice. She visited many opera houses both in Europe and America.

Although she and Bryan had a small garden in The Elms, it was well-stocked and she loved open days, either for the Garden Club or Floral Art Society, when she could open up her garden to visitors. On the last occasion, about 140 came in one afternoon.

For several years she maintained and re-stocked the planters opposite the Rose & Crown and in The Elms.


She was a great supporter of the Produce Show, the Upper Thames & Ridgeway National Trust and the Fine Arts Society.




Barbara's last flower arrangement (Easter)

From our MP

Throughout the summer holidays, I was delighted to welcome a number of students to the office as part of my work experience programme.

Each week a group of six students spent five days with my team and completed a variety of tasks and activities designed to help them better understand UK politics and the work of an MP. We spent a long time creating the programme to make sure it's enjoyable, rewarding and fulfilling. Tasks this year have included: presenting policy ideas to local councillors, taking part in a UN-style debate, debating various topical issues and creating manifestos.

The eagerly awaited new urgent treatment centre (UTC) and radiotherapy centre opened their doors to patients at the GWH and I was lucky enough to enjoy a tour of these impressive new facilities. The £15million UTC is an important expansion of urgent care facilities in Swindon, able to treat double the number of patients than the previous Clover Centre. Since we have seen a significant increase in the number of patients seeking urgent treatment, the new centre will significantly increase capacity and free up space for the most ill and injured to be treated in A&E.

The new radiotherapy centre is the first of its kind in Swindon, able to offer cancer patients treatment in Swindon meaning they no longer

need to make a 70-mile round trip to Oxford for treatment. The new centre was only made possible thanks to an incredible fundraising effort by the Brighter Futures charity who raised a staggering £3million, adding to the £16million of capital funding from the Government to see the centre become a reality.

The next key project is the planned brand new A&E, with works expected shortly. These projects have been a long time coming and will help futureproof the Trust as Swindon continues to grow.


