

Former Dovecote at Sevenfields

As promised, Highworth Community Partnership Group (HCPG) discussed the outcome of the leaflet drop regarding the former dovecote.

We also looked at the probable costs of replacing the dovecote, bearing in mind that certain costs would be recurring, including public liability insurance and regular inspections by a qualified engineer, both requirements by Swindon Borough Council as the dovecote would be sited on their land. Although there is a possibility that 50% of the cost of the dovecote would be covered by a grant, planning and construction costs would be in addition, and we would be obliged to use a Borough Council approved company. Members therefore reluctantly agreed that the replacement project was not a viable proposition. The gmail address has now been closed.

HCPG would like to thank all the people who worked hard to try to move this project forward. Unfortunately, on this occasion, the odds were stacked against us.



Having worked for and with him for thirty-plus years, we are almost like an old married couple. He's never one for blowing his own trumpet, so that leaves me to laud his praises, and he will hate me for doing it!

The man is the most considerate and compassionate of human beings. I've never seen him lose his temper. Even when my toys were flying out of the pram, he would just go and put the kettle on, everything would work out fine, and peace would reign. A number of clients even became personal friends, such was his engagement. He was

also very quick in recognising the future of graphics and production, becoming one of the first businesses in the town to transition from the traditional drawing boards to digital desktop publishing in the very early 1990s.

His talents also include playing guitar and singing, performing in a few bands over the years, notably 'The Sad Dads' and 'The Brewery Street Buskers'.

Of course he has his faults: He doesn't talk about football; likes aniseed balls, and feigns interest when I'm talking about badminton. He's by no means perfect.

His retirement from the field of battle will be noticed, but for someone who has worked so diligently and unseen in the engine room for so long, he will typically require no fanfare, just quiet acknowledgement of a job well done.

News from Westrop Medical Practice

Welcome to a new monthly article designed to help update the patients of Westrop surgery about the latest goings on.

Getting Covid over and done with first – I'm pleased to say that, at the time of writing, face masks are no longer mandatory when visiting the practice. However, this remains under constant review and, for obvious reasons, please still wear a mask or visor if your feel you symptoms could be suggestive of Covid-19.

Hopefully, the latest wave of Covid-19 booster jabs will help keep things under control this winter, and the Steam museum next to the Outlet Village in Swindon remains an option for where to get these done. As was the case last year, we will be co-administering the annual flu vaccination along with the booster, hence there will not be a separate flu vaccination programme at the surgery itself. If you are eligible for a vaccine then please arrange this via the national booking service, although certain cohorts will be given priority (a timeline of who can book and when will be released nationally). You won't be able to book your Covid or flu jab via the surgery.






Not only have Rabbits made us



LINK has reported on hundreds of community stories over the course of the magazine's history, and so many people have been involved. Here we highlight just a few of those events and note some of those people as recorded in the archives. There are so many people who have contributed to LINK's success we could fill pages with their names alone, and we are grateful for each and every one of them.

By this time, editorship and production had changed somewhat. Following on from Geoff Heaford, Adrian Young took the role of editor whilst full-colour production was undertaken by Graham Fry at the Stables Studio, saving the LINK from obsolence. By 2012, Helen Holly was registered as editor, and the magazine rumbled with the ever-controversial issue of changes at St. Michael's church.

LINK can also be found on the internet with its own website, and on Facebook. This social media presence was first established by Sarah Gardiner who worked as editor for around five years.

Tony Brewster headed up advertising and worked tirelessly on distribition for about 15 years. He was known to always carry a copy of LINK, never missing an opportunity to inform visitors and residents alike just how good the magazine was!



From the early days of LINK, Mair Huband, longtime resident of ______ Highworth and journalist for Swindon Advertiser, has been a constant presence, contributing quality articles and obituaries for LINK magazine up to the present day.

The magazine has survived the challenges of Covid-19 and the resulting lockdowns, and distributes around 7000 copies. It continues the solid tradition of bringing community news to the community, supported by a strong volunteer team of contributors and distributors.

Graham Fry continued as the lead in production of LINK until autumn 2022, retiring and handing the reins to Simon French who has also worked on LINK for many years. Debbie Hodgson has overseen advertising for ten years, and Rachael Laing Smith now sits as editor.

LINK **The People**

In the very first edition of LINK magazine, 'published by the Christian Churches of Highworth to serve the Community', editor Alan Norman wrote:

'The background to the production of this magazine is one of dissatisfaction with the extent to which the local churches seem to be in touch with the community of which they are part.

'Representatives of three churches met and agreed to finance and support the production of a monthly magazine, aimed at interesting the whole community, to be distributed free to every house in Highworth.

'A tall order?

'Yes, of course, but the team who have started the ball rolling are confident that it can be done and that the effort will be worthwhile.

'You can help! In practical ways, such as duplicating, folding and delivering, if you wish but, more important, by reading what is written and responding to it.'

Whilst the magazine was collated, constructed, distributed, and financed by the collective of Highworth churches, it was by no means intended to be a church magazine, but rather a community magazine. As it continued apace, the magazine welcomed ever more contributions from the community, including news articles, advertisements, poems, and letters.

LINK, as you see it today, is built upon that 50-year legacy and the hearts of volunteers who believe in this community of Highworth and beyond. And whilst it's unlikely many of us will still be walking this earth should LINK turn 100, it will have been a privilege to have played a small part in something so truly special.

Adrian Young

Adrian's time with LINK magazine covers quite a crucial time in its history.

'In 2005, it looked like curtains for Highworth LINK. The previous team, led by Geoff Heaford, would admit, I think, that they had reached the end of their road. With no one coming forward to accept the baton, Highworth's long-standing community magazine, sponsored by the churches of Highworth, was on the verge of closure. In fact, the 'final' edition featured Last Thoughts, instead of the First Thoughts, usually written by a local church leader.

'My neighbour and publishing colleague, Graham Fry, decided that we could not let LINK die, and so we hatched a plot that Graham would pick up the graphic design and layout while I would steer the words as editor. But there was a stumbling block. It seemed inconceivable to a few in the churches that I should become editor. Despite my childhood background in the Catholic faith, I'd developed an agnostic view of religion. It really made no difference to me; all I needed was the publisher's editorial policy. I persuaded the decision makers that the magazine would be in safe hands, albeit with a different, more 'inclusive' flavour.

'In that team, accountant Terry Williams took the reins of finance. We recruited Chris Waterman and Peter Croton to manage distribution in Highworth, while Keith Ratcliffe continued to oversee distribution in the villages, not to mention a veritable army of volunteers who delivered door-to-door. Along the way, Keith Bateman joined the team as proofreader and, finally, Tony Brewster took on the tricky task of selling advertising-the very lifeblood of the business.

'From the outset, the magazine was different, with the first cover photo by local professional photographer, Simon Apps. While retaining First Thoughts, I introduced the more secular Second Thoughts, and made every effort to inform readers that the new LINK would reflect the views of the wider community-it's a community magazine, after all. I quite enjoyed my five years as LINK editor, and don't remember there being any significant disagreements with the proprietor.

'The magazine was operated entirely by volunteers. It was some years later that Graham and I realised we'd missed a trick by not acquiring the ailing magazine in 2005. By 2009, we'd launched Ripples, the community magazine for Fairford, Lechlade and surrounding villages. Eventually, editing the two magazines whilst holding down a freelance writing job became too much. In 2010, I met Helen Holly in the Saturday market. She made my day by agreeing to 'have a go' as editor, and so I passed the email account and editor's red pen to Helen. Graham and I continued to publish *Ripples* until 2021, when the Covid emergency and our yearn to retire took their inevitable toll.

'Long live Highworth LINK-the little humdinger community magazine for Highworth and surrounding villages, for which I still like to write?

Phyllis Reid

Over the years, Phyllis has featured many times in LINK magazine, largely for her involvement in the Operation Christmas Child project and The Bridge Centre.

'Operation Christmas Child began in 1997 when we sent 200 boxes overseas, and the project grew to become many thousands of boxes over the years. It still continues to this day.

'In 2004, I went to Azerbaijan with the boxes and, following on from this, over £3,900 was raised in Highworth as part of St Michael's Community Harvest Project in the town. This money went towards supporting the ongoing work in one of the orphanages in Azerbaijan.

'The Bridge Centre opened in 2001 and was used largely as an admin office for Highworth Community Church, incorporating the sale of Fairtrade food (which was a relatively new idea) and many youth projects headed up by a fulltime youth worker and two full-time volunteers. In 2011, this all changed when we opened up The Bridge Centre every morning as a drop-in centre for the community, where people could get help using computers, photocopying, coffee and a chat, and a prayer if



and a chief and appropriate. This continues to this day, alongside the work of CAP (Christians Against Poverty) the Help Centre and Food Collective, as well as other ventures.

Douglas Jacobs

Doug was the editor of LINK magazine for a short period during the 1980s.

'My term was strictly as a stand-in for about ten issues until someone of a more religious inclination became available, as the Canon, who was then the incumbent at St. Michael's, wasn't keen on someone of no faith holding the post. My tenure came about due to a close association with the then Advertising Manager, Ray Jackson, who stressed to me that the magazine was stuck for someone to cover the role.'

Geoff Heaford

Back in 1997, the year of LINK's 25th anniversary, Geoff Heaford wrote about his time with LINK magazine. Below are extracts from that article.

'I was appointed to the editorship of LINK by the Highworth Interchurch Committee towards the end of 1987, and I suppose my greatest contribution was to move the magazine into the then technological age.

'When I took over, the magazine was typeset on electric typewriters, cut into separate lines, and pasted down to make up the pages. The first suggestion was that we used the Amstrad word processor which was a simple computer, but thanks to the vision of Ray Beck, and with the help of B&D Computing, we purchased one of the first IBM compatible computers—an Apricot Xen-i.

'In those days, there was almost no email and definitely no worldwide web, so everything was written on paper; sometimes nicely typed, sometimes scrawled on scruffy pieces of paper. Everything had to be retyped. This meant dismantling the computer, taking it round to the typist, assembling the computer, waiting a week, disassembling the computer, taking it home, and reassembling it. Looking back, it seemed a miracle that the magazine ever got out.

'Gradually technology improved. We bought an Amstrad portable to take to the typists, and gradually they bought their own computers.

'The biggest change was the coming of email so contributions could be sent directly to the editor. This meant that the typists were gradually phased out. It was then decided to have the magazine professionally printed, and we asked Highworth Press to take on this job. It also meant that we could use photographs on the front cover, and colour, including full colour on the front cover and inside the magazine.

'My time as editor was one that I will always treasure as it brought me into contact with so many people in the community of Highworth. So many people were involved: Ray Beck and Ray Jackson were pillars of support, and the late Les Edwards who, in the later years, used to proofread the magazine and we had many a tussle over my use of English. It is so good to see it continuing and my best wishes go to the present editor [Helen Holly] and contributors for making this one of the best community magazines.

'I have lived in Highworth since 1975 (sometimes away due to RAF postings) and had viewed the magazine (or sheet as it was then) with some interest over the years as it gave enough information and viewpoints to keep me and my family looking forward to the next issue.

Operation Christmas Child

Operation Christmas Child (also known as the Shoe Box Appeal) will soon be upon us. The national campaign is from 14 to 21 November inclusive.

The Highworth collection centre will be based, as usual, at Highworth Methodist Church, 9:30am to 1pm each weekday. On Saturday and Sunday, boxes can be dropped off between 10am and 12 noon.

For those unfamiliar with Operation Christmas Child, shoe boxes are filled with a variety of gifts which are sent to needy children around the world. Last year from the UK alone, nearly 250,000 shoe boxes were sent to 13 countries, and globally about

within one of the following age groups: 2 to 4 years, 5 to 9 years, or 10 to 14 years of age. We suggest that each aift-filled box







Joyful About Celebrating 30 Years in the High Street

The supermarkets and filling stations offer an easy answer for someone needing flowers in a hurry. There's not much thought needed – it's a quick fix. But when you really want an arrangement that's unique and with better quality flowers, your logical destination is your local florist, Highworth Flowers.

Started in 1992 by former owner Carol, this year Highworth Flowers celebrates 30 years in the High Street. Now 28 years in the job, Justine Ballamy learned her trade at the age of 15 at Lackham College (a centre for agricultural learning since 1946, now Wiltshire College) near Lacock.

'It's a physical job,' says Justine, 'you have to be very strong.' But surely flowers, you might ask, are not heavy? Yet anyone who's worked in a shop knows you're likely to be on your feet all day. The job includes receiving deliveries, arranging the display, assisting shoppers, individual selection and wrapping, and all the paperwork. At peak seasons, such as Mothers' Day and Christmas, it's all hands to the pumps in 18-hour days. Justine is often assisted by her long-time florist colleague, Jacqueline.

If you're up early, you might see a truck parked in the High Street unloading flowers



for Highworth Flowers. Justine explained that the Netherlands is the European gateway for flowers from all over the world. What about local suppliers, I asked. 'Unfortunately, it costs more to produce flowers in the UK.' Evidently a massive investment is needed in heated greenhouses and the Dutch and others are already well established.

Brexit, according to Justine, has not been

kind to the flower industry. There's added paperwork to get a consignment through customs. I was surprised to learn that flowers now need special passports.

Justine does much more than supply flowers to High Street shoppers. Her business extends to internet customers and contract work. She works with event organisers and is part of

> the Interflora flower delivery network, associated with over 58,000 affiliated flower shops in over 140 countries.

When the pandemic struck, Highworth Flowers closed initially. 'There was no stock with wholesalers and an enormous loss of flowers in production. It took us eight weeks to get back to a sustainable operation,' she says.

Justine says most customers are well informed when they come in to order flowers. Even the lads getting flowers for Mothers' Day and mum's birthday. I admit I had no idea in my 20s and was grateful to understanding florists.


