Kathryn Ford, area manager, said, 'This year we've seen the cost of pretty much everything rise so it's more important now, more than ever, to try to manage your money as best you can and ask for help if you need it, particularly as energy is going to cost a lot this winter.

'Our Church and local CAP Debt Centre want to be here to offer help and advice to our community during this challenging time and are continuing to provide people in need with practical and emotional support in Highworth.

'We hope those struggling to afford their energy bills will find our tips to be helpful. We would also encourage any local people in need to contact us if they want to find out more about the free help Christians Against Poverty can offer.'

- 2. Ensure that your meter readings are accurate and that you are only paying for the energy you use.
- 3. Investigate whether your home needs insulation to keep as much of the heat you are paying for in your home rather than having it escape through the roof and walls.

Ask AMS

What is a Qualifying Year for state pension purposes?

To get the maximum Basic State Pension, you must have 35 qualifying years (which means you must have made National Insurance contributions for 35 years – and contracted-out years don't count!).

For the current tax year – 2022/23 – this would mean a salary of more than £6,396. Above this figure, you start paying National Insurance at (strangely enough) 0% - which counts as a qualifying year. At a salary level of £9,880 (from July 2023, £12,570), the Employee's National Insurance rate increases to 12%. (Employer's National insurance at 13.8% begins at a salary level of £9,100).

New Community Services in Highworth Library

From January, Swindon Borough Council's faceto-face Customer Services office will move from its current Wat Tyler building location, out into the community, to be delivered by library staff.

Swindon's five core libraries (Central Library, Highworth, North Swindon, Park and West Swindon) will have self-service machines where. with support from library staff, you can access services such as Blue Badges, bus passes, waste and recycling, requesting home repairs, parking fines, and permits.

These services, as well as lots of others, are also available at www.swindon.gov.uk

The changes will mean that you can access these services without needing to travel into the town centre, as there may be a library closer to home.

The Customer Services telephone line will continue to be available and will enable staff at the Council's Contact Centre to answer more enquiries, reducing waiting times for those calling for

Operation Christmas Child

The national collection campaign for Operation Christmas Child (the shoe boxes!) was held in November 2022. The Highworth collection centre was based, as usual, at

Highworth Methodist Church.

For those who may be unfamiliar with Operation Christmas Child, shoe boxes are filled with a variety of gifts which are sent to needy children around the world. From the UK, in 2021, 250,000 shoe boxes were sent to 13 countries and, globally, about ten million shoe boxes were sent to

over 100 countries. In 2022, it was intended to send over half of the boxes collected in the UK to

children in the Ukraine.

This year, from Highworth and the surrounding area, we collected 1771 shoe boxes. This was really amazing particularly in light of the Covid

situation of the last two years. We are so grateful to everyone who donated either a filled shoe box, a cash donation, or knitted items to go in the shoe boxes.

News from Westrop Medical Practice

Availability of appointments within general practice is definitely a hot topic. Patients understandably want to see a clinician for their medical ailment in a timely fashion. Opinion regarding what constitutes a reasonable wait time is influenced by many factors, including how concerned the patient is and how disruptive the symptoms are.

From our perspective, we need to provide sufficient provision for urgent, on the day appointments, whilst ensuring enough access for more routine problems or follow-up of existing issues. Demand for on the day appointments varies from one week to the next, which can make it difficult to plan for. At the time of writing this article we are in the midst of the scarlet fever outbreak, with demand for urgent appointments at the highest levels I've ever known. One option during these times is to change the ratio of urgent to routine appointments, but this then increases our wait time for non urgent problems. In addition to this, we have to factor in cancelling clinics at the last minute due to sickness, difficulty in recruiting locum cover at short notice and allowing time out for staff development and training. There are therefore many variables that can impact on waiting times.

So what do we, as a practice, feel about appointment accessibility, and what are our targets? Well, I can assure you that it's something we think about a lot, and we work hard to keep accessibility as prompt as possible. Our aim is to ensure that everyone who needs an urgent on the day appointment gets one, and thatitroutine issues get to see a clinician within a maximum of 2 weeks. This is reviewed weekly at the partnership meeting, and if wait time is creeping up then extra provisions are added where possible. Of course, sometimes it's simply not possible to add anymore emergency appointments to the day, or we have to cancel a number of clinics at short notice and the routine wait time shoots up, but these instances are rare and overall we hit our targets the majority of the time. Based on a recent survey patients seem to agree, with almost three quarters stating their experience of booking an appointment at Westrop as "good", compared to the national average of 56%.

There are, of course, things that you can do to help keep accessibility as good as possible. Whilst we don't expect you to self diagnose, using guidance via 111 or the NHS website to decide if your symptoms do need an urgent GP appointment, may help. Also, you'd be surprised by the number of people we have who come back for a review although the original symptoms have resolved. Think about whether that follow-up with the GP really is needed, or perhaps a phone call would suffice? Remembering to cancel appointments if you can no longer attend is also much appreciated, and following on from my article last time, consider whether using one of our excellent allied health care professionals may be a better and quicker option to access an opinion.

Ultimately whatever we do, I think demand for GP appointments will remain high, but rest assured that accessibility remains one of Westrop's highest priorities.

Hope in the Shanty Towns of Costa Rica

It's been just over three years since Highworth received a visit from six young lads and four leaders of the Educación Plus charity, from a shanty town in Costa Rica, Central America. They were featured on the cover of the Highworth Link of December 2019/January 2020.

Those three years have been strange in many ways thanks to the Covid pandemic and its management worldwide. But the boys' families survived, even though they lost their incomes – no government 'safety nets' in the shanty towns! At one point one of them bought a pig's carcass and cut it up in their

shack to sell to the neighbours.
EdPlus lent another of the families the capital to buy fruit and veg from a wholesale market to sell on.
One of the boy's parents split up under the pressure and yet another lost his grandmother to the

Meanwhile, the Educación Plus staff remained fully employed! Weekly Bible studies were delivered door-to-door.

virus.

when our Bible clubs had to close down. We also managed a scheme, sponsored by an international Costa Rican footballer, that distributed \$8,000 dollars worth of groceries to 100 suffering families. Education was virtually put on hold for over a year with state schools providing patchy lessons via the internet. OK as long as students have mobile phones and access to an internet signal! EdPlus provided for three of those boys who came to the UK, among others, to purchase second hand mobiles or get their old ones repaired. We also provided valuable group tutoring sessions for junior school kids, run by qualified teachers who found themselves without work.

During months of being locked down in small, overcrowded shacks with Armageddon being promised daily on the news, the

and Highworth were very precious. The boys have told us how they would look through their photograph albums of the trip before they went to sleep each night, which reduced their anxiety and gave them more hope for a return to normality.



We are also taking part in an exciting project linked to Swindon Town Football club. All to support mental health in our children across the school.

The Colour Monster's feelings are all over the place; he feels angry, happy, calm, sad and scared all at once! To help him, his friend helps to untangle his feelings and show him what each one means. We used this story to talk about our feelings, recognising how our bodies change when we are experiencing them, learning the names for them, what we can do if we don't like a feeling and, most importantly, that it's ok to feel however you are feeling!



In our <u>toddler group</u> we are supporting children and families from a very early start. We welcome the whole community not just children at Westrop. A chance for toddlers to explore, question and wonder and for parents/carers to talk with staff and other carers.

Engaging hearts



Our children's wellbeing has been enhanced with the introduction of the **OPAL** scheme at lunchtimes where children can use their imagination and have fun with their friends playing with a variety of objects from tyres to tennis rackets, scooters to saucepans.

Review of Handel's Messiah

We only usually associate the Messiah, Handel's Baroque oratorio, with Christmas but it was originally written for Easter, and first staged in Dublin in the New Music Hall, Fishamble Street, at noon on 13 April 1742, doubtless to an audience as appreciative and spellbound as in St. Mary's, Fairford, 280 years later, on 3 December. What a lovely performance. From the first notes of tenor John Bacon's measured solo introduction, it was obvious that we would be in for a treat.

The rippling polyphonic lines – especially at speed – in this tremendous work are pretty taxing to sing, but the Fairford and District Choral Society, under the direction of the brilliant Katrine Reimers managed it splendidly. The choruses were sensitively handled, with plenty of dynamic contrast and clarity of diction.

The acoustics suited the fine voices of the four professional soloists. They were engaging and commanded audience attention; the arias and recitatives in this piece deserved no less, and the quartet of Charlotte Newstead (Soprano), Olivia Gomez (Contralto), John Bacon (Tenor), and Matthew Clark (Bass) – Matthew stepped in at the last moment – did full justice to Handel's masterpiece. Their solo performances were a pleasure to hear, and most moving.

This was storytelling matched in expressive content and nuanced, sensitive delivery. How lucky we were to have the opportunity to see such accomplished performers in a local setting.

In the absence of an orchestral ensemble, the accompaniment was well balanced between the heroic organist Robin Baggs, (I found myself wondering how many notes he had to play), and a well chosen, unobtrusive keyboard accompaniment. It was intriguing to see the keyboard played by Katrine while simultaneously conducting. This was no mean feat. The splendid insertion of Stephen Cutting's trumpet made a glittering, dramatic addition to the whole. My neighbour at the concert described it as, 'Riveting.'

Bravo Fairford and District Choral Society for a beautiful start to the Christmas period. I haven't heard you before, but from now on I am a fan!



Dear Highworth Link,


This is a story told me by my cousin, Shirley.
