Aldbourne is an attractive little village well known for its duck pond. Perhaps this is how the locals came by the name of 'dab chicks'. In the Middle Ages it was a much larger and wealthier place. There was a cloth weaving industry and, until about 1826, a bell foundry. Many local churches, including Faringdon and Great Coxwell, still have Aldbourne bells.

Highworth Holistic Health Open Evenings

At Highworth Holistic Health we are mindful of the huge numbers of people who have chronic diseases which often have at least part of their roots in our lifestyles. These include, among others, diabetes, osteoarthritis, and

osteoporosis. These conditions are increasingly common, partly as a result of our increased life expectancy, but also partly because of the ways in which we live our lives now.

Compared to how our forebears lived two or three generations ago, most of us have access to enough calorie-rich foods and we don't have the levels of daily activity that used to be built into

our lifestyles. Unfortunately, we are now in the situation where the conditions that our bodies developed to cope with and our lifestyles don't match and, for many of us, this results in chronic diseases.

I am a McTimoney chiropractor and a nutritional therapist, so my interest lies mainly with the chronic diseases that I see in clinic that increase levels of aches and pains. Diabetes can result in changes in body chemistry that make osteoporosis and osteoarthritis, among others, more likely, so addressing the diet and lifestyle root causes of these conditions gives me another level at which I can work.

Eco Church at St. Michael's Church

The Church of England has committed to being carbon neutral by 2030. Our diocese, Bristol, has stated that reducing the effects of climate change in its churches is core to the five marks of mission and their undertaking to safeguard the integrity of creation.



Eco Church is a national scheme to help grassroots church communities of all denominations to improve their environmental impact. It was developed by A Rocha UK which is a Christian charity working for the protection and restoration of the natural world and committed to equipping Christians and churches in the UK to care for the environment.

Scouts Quiz

19 teams took part in this year's Scouts Quiz. Clutter and Bling were never headed and finished with an impressive score of 105 points out of a maximum of 120.

The Toddletons were three points further back in second place, and three teams tied for third place: Serendipity, The Jammie Dodgers, and The Sons. Thanks to everybody who took part and helped to raise £547 for the group's funds. Thanks also to Simpsons Cars for their continued sponsorship of the evening, which we very much appreciate. St Michael's first became involved in Eco Church about two years ago and our former curate, Emily Swinerd, championed and supported initial projects including the young people's wilding of the church yard. This work is now being coordinated by a small team led by a member of our PCC.

As part of our current work we have identified a small wildlife garden outside the church offices in Vicarage Lane. A poll amongst congregation members has named this EcoEden and our intention is to make EcoEden an accessible place which promotes opportunities to learn, share and enjoy wildlife.

To date we have:

- Built a large church-shaped bug house and planted 30 wildflower perennial plug plants in the grass.
- Acquired four bird boxes and feeders, a squirrel house and two hedgehog houses which we are in the process of locating.
- Appointed two young people as rangers to take responsibility for researching and promoting specific habitats for pollinators and hedgehogs.
- Liaised with the council to cut the grass in this area in late October when natural seeding of the wildflowers and grasses will have taken place.

This is just one example of the range of developments that we are exploring. The Eco Church project is multi-faceted, ongoing, and there is never a dull moment for everyone involved! We look forward to sharing more of our adventures with everyone in future months and to hearing about similar projects which are happening in our parish.

Ask AMS Can I claim expenses for working from home for my business?

Business owners can claim the expense of using their home as an office. (as a business expense). based on the portion of rent, mortgage interest, council tax, water etc. used while working at home. There are 2 ways to calculate this:

Weekly Claim: Business owners spending small amounts of time, say, invoicing or doing minimal work relating to the business can claim £6 per week (or £26/month) without calculating the actual home expenses used.

Actual Expenses: If the owner spends, say, a few hours each day at home running the business, they can claim a proportion of actual home expenses. (Rent. rates etc. as above)

If you want to use the 2nd method; HMRC provide examples online – but they are complex. I recommend that you ask your accountant to do the calculation.

Raine Conquers Snowdon

Eight-year-old Southfield Junior School pupil Raine Gough, along with her parents and three grandparents, climbed Mount Snowdon on 17 April to raise funds for Coeliac UK.

Raine was diagnosed with coeliac disease last autumn following concerns about her behaviour and concentration levels.

Although Raine's grandmother also has the genetic condition, it was still a surprise to discover Raine has it too. Raine's mum, Ella, explained, 'Raine didn't suffer from any of the digestive issues associated with coeliac, but I've discovered there are more symptoms to look out for, including behavioural and neurological issues.'

Raine has dealt with her diagnosis incredibly well and is much happier as a result of a strict glutenfree diet – the only way to treat coeliac disease.

Raine and her family took the Pyg track to the top of Snowdon and came back down the



Llanberis path, an almost-eight mile walk which took six hours and 45 minutes to complete.

Raine had originally planned to get the train back down with 'Boppa', one of her grandads, but

a few days beforehand the family discovered that the train didn't reach the summit. This meant Raine had no choice but to walk the entire way.

'However, she absolutely nailed it,' said Ella. 'And I'm convinced she could have done it all again the next day! She took it all in her stride and led us all to the top with no issues or complaining whatsoever! The same can't be said for the rest of us!'

Raine has always been a lover of walking and the outdoors and therefore loved the idea of both



climbing a mountain and raising money at the same time. She has so far raised £1154 for Coeliac UK.

It ended up that Everybody blamed Somebody when Nobody did what Anybody could have.'

An excellent mantra to be instilled into the young that public service (which volunteering is) is a truly honourable and worthwhile venture. I thought it was an excellent reminder to us all that a lot of what happens within the community is driven by those willing to give a little bit, or a lot, of their free time for the benefit of others. Much of what happens for your pleasure is organised and run by a dedicated and, by and large, silent legion working behind the scenes so others may benefit, enjoy, engage or learn from their efforts. Some groups become an essential local resource for those with disabilities and various other difficulties.

Much of the graft that goes on is unheralded: No awards, no personal gain, but the satisfaction of knowing that you've done your bit and given the community a service is reward enough.

I know of no voluntary organisation, club or community group that has enough volunteers. The Lions, Scouts, charity shops, WI, and a plethora of sporting clubs and community groups to name check just a few – this magazine has featured so many over the years – and all can only survive by someone stepping forward to lend a hand. In most cases having experience is always helpful but not essential, just a willingness to assist. Meeting and working with new and likeminded people and having a lot of fun doing it. You're never too young or old to get involved.

Next time you're at any community run event, shop or stall, please go out of your way to thank a volunteer, it means a lot. Better still get involved, because if you don't... who will!

> 5 designed and built rockets, experimenting with different sized rockets, tails, and fins to find out which flew the furthest, whilst the Year 4 and Year 6 classes challenged each other to build the strongest bridge that spanned 20cm using only eight pieces of A4 paper and one metre of sticky tape. The winning bridges from

each class took part in a grand final with Mrs. White (our science leader) in assembly.

The strongest bridge held nearly four kilogrammes! The winning bridge was from Year 6, Oak class, who built their bridge with a team member from Wroughton Junior School.

During Southfield's Science Week each year group also had a variety of visitors who talked to the children about how they use science in their jobs. Our speakers included: A veterinary pharmacist; an RAF engineer; a GP; a railway design engineer; a microbiologist; an engineer for Historic England; a specialist in manufacturing and testing in the food industry; a representative from The Natural Environment and Research Council and many more.

Our Connections science week truly connected Southfield's children to science, building bridges with another school, working scientifically together, and learning about careers in science.
