FIRST THOUGHTS

Broken Yet Beautiful

Leonard Cohen has a song called Anthem. This is a favourite of mine, particularly these lyrics, 'There is a crack in everything, that's how the light gets in.' These are important words reminding us that our humanity makes us vulnerable and fragile no matter how strong we would like to be. The truth of the matter is that we all have cracks, but does that make us imperfect? And as the song says, it is through our cracks that the light gets in.

Have you ever heard of Kintsugi? This is a traditional Japanese art and it means 'golden joinery'. It's the art of repairing broken pottery by mending the areas of breakage with lacquer dusted or mixed with powdered gold, silver or platinum. As a philosophy it

treats breakage and repair as part of the history of an object rather than something to disguise.

I believe both these concepts are helpful for us to realise that we all have our cracks which are a result of life – our pains, our sadness, our frustrations – we all have them. Even people of faith



experience situations that leave marks or cracks or brokenness. Sometimes they are the result of a terrible accident which needs repairing, often the result of situations that aren't visible but have left deep scars. Whatever the cause, they lie there and will fester if ignored.

It is in recognising our scars, our cracks, that we can begin to heal and connect with others who also feel the pain of brokenness. And then light gets in, and in this connection we become stronger, more caring, more accepting, more loving, less judgemental. In short, this is what makes us more human. Jesus once said it wasn't the healthy that needed a doctor but those who knew they needed healing.

> Our cracks are there, not to brag about them but to know they are there. And in this way we can let the light in, shine and share. We don't look for pain, we find it. But we can also find wholeness through our cracks. We can become a beautiful vase.

News from Highworth United Reformed Church

As an integral part of our Christian ministry, Highworth URC widely shares income from a trust fund with Victorian origins. We are modestly proud of our record of gifts totalling more than £700,000 since 2001.

The largest grant is to the URC and its ministers nationally. Close behind is a major gift to the vital local debt advice of Christians Against Poverty, also the Lighthouse bookshop. In 2022 we helped 17 other charities, both local (principal among them the Swindon Food Collective) and national, including two disaster appeals.

Our church fellowship, meeting at least fortnightly for worship, is sincere, tenacious, thoughtful and warm in welcome. We love our historic High Street 1825 chapel, long resonant with faith and peace. Take a look at our website *highworthurc.org.uk* and you will see we seek to be 'faithful people searching for God's guidance, trying to follow the way of Jesus. We are here for you.'

However, we must share with you that we face an uncertain future.

We expect, subject to agreement of church members, soon to effect a legal amalgamation with our sister church, Immanuel URC, Swindon – 'one church in two locations'. We have no financial worries. But, though strong in trust in the Good Lord, we are few in number, too few to maintain our worship in the coming years; that is painful to contemplate.

Ten Ways to Save Money on Your Food Shop



Check expiration dates: Get into the habit of checking the expiration dates on any items that don't have a long shelf life.

Study the yellow labels: It's a good idea to head to the reduced section first to see if you can pick up anything that's on your list. Check they're good value for money and make sure you use them before they go out of date.

benefits: Lots of supermarkets offer free loyalty cards and other benefits that can save you money on various everyday items.

Don't shop when you're hungry: Shopping when you're peckish increases the likelihood of impulse buying.



Shop around for the best deals: Compare the cost of shopping in different places so you know how much you pay for each item at each different store.

Try a cheaper brand: Taste tests commonly show that we can't really taste the difference between luxury and budget brands, so give a cheaper version a try – you might be surprised.

Shop in the early evening: You can often find a bargain or two in the early evening as supermarkets push to sell off products that are nearing their expiration date.

Share the cost: Having people round for food? Ask your guests to each bring an item or ingredient for the meal, instead of shouldering the cost by yourself.

Cardiff Bay Rugby Codebreakers



This story starts on the day of Queen Victoria's funeral in 1901 when a young merchant seaman arrived in Great Britain from Antigua. His grandson, my cousin, was one of the Welsh Codebreakers who have finally been recognised for the rugby talent they demonstrated back in the 1960s and 1970s.

On 19 July this year other family members and I went to Cardiff for the unveiling of the Codebreakers Statue, a bronze statue sculpted by Steve Winterburn of Yorkshire Fine Arts. The statue honours three men, all sons of immigrants. Guz Risman, on the left (see photograph), was born in 1911 to Russian immigrant parents and became one of the greatest rugby players produced by Wales. In the middle, with his arms round his fellow players, is Billy Boston MBE, born in 1934. The player on the right is my cousin Clive Sullivan MBE, born in 1943, who became the first black captain of any Great Britain team and led his country to victory in the 1972 Rugby League World Cup. His mother was my Aunty Doris.

All three left Cardiff for the north of England, along with many other players, in the days when rugby league was professional and rugby union was an amateur game. They have now been recognised, and in these days when there is so much concern about racism, inclusion, diversity, the evil of slavery and so on, the words of the leader of Cardiff Council sum it up.

'The exceptional achievements of so many rugby players from Cardiff Bay's multicultural melting pot have for too long been overlooked. They not only brought honour to themselves, their city and their nation but also helped to break down the barriers of racism and social injustice. They strode confidently into the wider world and their example and achievements are an inspiration to us and future generations.'

To any young people I would say don't let your gender, skin colour or anything else hold you back. If you have a talent for something, work hard and strive to achieve your best.

Letter from the New Rector of St. Michael's Church


Dear Friends



Eco Tip from Weigh It Up

Have you ever looked at your cleaning products and seen those big red symbols telling you how bad they are for the environment and your skin?! There are plenty of eco alternatives available that do the job just as well and chances are you've got some of them at home too.

White vinegar can be used to clean windows, remove limescale from taps and kettles, and to clean your kitchen or bathroom tiles. Bicarbonate of soda (bicarb) can be used to remove stubborn marks on pans, to clean your oven or get off tough limescale when mixed into a paste with a little water. Mixed with white vinegar it can even unblock drains. Adding it to your washing machine will get your whites whiter!!

And if your wooden chopping board is starting to smell of chopped onions and garlic sprinkle it with salt, rub it in and leave for 15 minutes, and then use half a lemon to rub all over in small circles before rinsing away.

Alec Ernest Woodbridge 1 January 1932 to 19 June 2023

Alec was born in Highworth and lived in the town until his death, aged 91. He was the fifth child of a family of six born to Ernest George (master saddler) and Sarah Ann Woodbridge.

At the age of seven he joined St. Michael's Church choir and sang with them for the next 22 years. Alec loved all kinds of music and began piano lessons as a boy. He used his talent to play toe-tapping dance music in concerts and dances throughout his years in the youth fellowship and continued playing keyboards until the last year of his life.

Alec was always good at figure work and mathematical problems and he used these skills in accountancy with his first job being at the Oriental Matting Co. on Brewery Street. As a young man, he was also good at sport, particularly playing football and cricket for Highworth Town as well as football for Coleshill and Ashbury. He also loved table tennis and badminton and later in life took up cribbage and dominoes.

It was a great sadness to Alec that his mother died when he just 17. Following National Service with the RAF he returned to Highworth and married Peggy. Together they took on the tenancy of The Red Lion pub in Sheep Street (no longer used as a pub) and soon they were blessed with the birth of their daughter, Sarah. Tragically, Sarah died aged just two years and this sadly led to ill health for Alec and the breakdown of the marriage.

Following Alec's death, his sister Beryl found a book of poetry which Alec had written. In 1969 he had noted these short lines:

'Anglo Saxon, Agricultural, Residential Market Town. Commanding views of Vale and Down. Antiquity bounded by a modern face A pleasant and attractive place.'







Update from Justin Tomlinson

I have been actively supporting the fantastic Save Highworth Golf Course team as we rightly seek for the land to be transferred to local community ownership and not developed for housing.

In the May local elections Swindon Council changed from Conservative control to Labour so all the previous Council's commitments had to be reviewed. It was with much relief the new Labour Council indicated they expect to maintain the position of transferring the land to community ownership. Negotiations around costs and plans are still needed.

Highworth is set to expand by more than 1000 homes over a five-year period when it already has more than its fair share of new housing. Protecting this vital open space is essential. As the Save Highworth Golf Course group and Highworth Town Council work on their draft proposals for the site, I continue to fully support their efforts.

I recently joined the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust for a walking tour, looking to learn the lessons of the Tadpole Garden Village nature park. This land was gifted as natural habitat to offset the impact of the new housing development, something I was proud to





secure back in 2008. This is beneficial to the environment and provides vital open space for the community to enjoy. This is the future of development, either as part of a development or using alternative sites to improve the overall natural habitat/ biodiversity. This provides an obvious model for the former Golf Course with significant funding available where we work jointly with the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust.

Alongside the potential to expand the sports provision and transform the former club shop to a café, this shows that an exciting, sustainable future can be secured.

Swindon Council still need to formally transfer the site, something which is likely to have cross-party support. Your local Borough Councillors and I will formally press that this is done quickly with a 99-year lease at £1 peppercorn rent. This is key to securing relevant grants and partnerships.

I am in awe of the fantastic work that has been done to lead this campaign, making sure the whole community is fully engaged. The work of the group, the town councillors and the excellent town clerk, Deanne Rose, has been first-class.
