
FIRST THOUGHTS

Operation Christmas Child

Operation Christmas Child (also known as the Shoebox Appeal) will soon be upon us. The national campaign is from Monday 13 November to Monday 20 November inclusive.

The Highworth collection centre will be based, as usual, at Highworth Methodist Church. The opening times will be from 9:30am to 1pm each weekday, and on Saturday and Sunday boxes can be dropped off between 10am to 12 noon.

For those who may be unfamiliar with Operation Christmas Child, shoeboxes are filled with a variety of gifts which are sent to needy children around the world. From the UK last year, nearly 250,000 shoeboxes were sent to 13 countries and globally about 10 million shoeboxes were sent to over 100 countries. From Highworth, we collected 1771 shoeboxes, which was very similar to 2021. We are so grateful to everyone who donated.

Shoeboxes are filled for either a boy or girl and for age groups: two to four years, five to nine years, or ten to fourteen years. We suggest that each gift filled box contains a 'wow' item that the child will immediately love as soon as they open the box. Ideas include: A stuffed animal; deflated football and pump; toy truck;

doll (baby, Barbie etc.); or musical instruments (depending on the age group).

A personal note or photo of you or your family can also be included. Shoebox leaflets, which give full details of the gifts that can be included, are available from the drop-off points.

Ask AMS Do you need to submit a Tax Return?

You need to submit an Income Tax return (for 2022/23) if HMRC send you a Tax Return to complete or, if you know that you have income tax or capital gains tax to pay.

However, HMRC have a list of further circumstances where a Tax Return should be prepared, including: Your income from self-employment exceeded £1,000; You are a company director;

You received over £2,500 in rental income. If it was between £1,000 and £2,500 you should contact HMRC;

You received more than £2,500 in other income; You received £10,000 or more before tax from savings/investments;

You made Capital Gains in excess of £6,000; You have received dividends in excess of £10,000; Your taxable income exceeds £50,000 and you, or your partner, receive Child Benefit; Your taxable income exceeds £100,000.



It makes you more financially resilient: Having regular conversations about money can help you stay focused on your financial goals and gain useful skills from others.





Eco Tip from Weigh It Up



Neighbourhood Plan 2

It has been some time since we updated you on the Neighbourhood Plan, but it has been a busy time with a lot of work happening in the background and good progress being made.

The committee have been working hard to pull all the public consultations and surveys together and to identify the objectives that have come out of the public engagement. This has enabled us to understand what policies the Neighbourhood Plan 2 should include. Some existing policies from the old

plan have been retained and strengthened to ensure they are effective, and some new policies have been identified. These policies will help to shape the town going forward. If you would like to see a summary of results of the public workshops, they are available on the Highworth Town Council website.

Due to a successful application for grant funding, we have been able to engage a professional design company to work with us to publish a design code document and housing needs assessment. The design code document supports the new Neighbourhood Plan and details what any new development will need to look like to ensure it complements its surroundings. The housing needs assessment identifies the sort of housing and size of properties needed for the future.

We are very close to a completed draft of the new Neighbourhood Plan and will be engaging with Swindon Borough Council imminently to check the plan meets national policy, aligns with the current Swindon Borough Council plan, and meets certain criteria. Once the draft Neighbourhood Plan has been verified we will move

on to pre-consultation stage with all residents, known as regulation 14. This gives everyone the opportunity to review the plan and make comments. When we know more on timings we will let you know, so watch this space!


