Snowdrops at Cotswold Farm

Cotswold Farm is a beautiful Cotswolds Arts and Crafts garden in a stunning location overlooking a quiet valley on descending levels with a terrace designed by Norman Jewson in the 1930s. We have an established snowdrop collection with over 80 varieties, named and naturalised, in the borders and along the woodland paths. A winter step garden with

scents and textures leads down to the magical bog garden with streams and waterfalls.

Highworth Climate Talks

The Future of Food

As a country we rely on a complex collection of farmers, importers, distributors, and retailers to feed us all. In our next talk, What might a sustainable food system look like? Local organic farmer Jamie Carr will argue that this is not only a fragile arrangement which promotes short-term profit over long-term health and sustainability but that there are lots of better ways forward.

Drawing on over ten years of working in the organic vegetable industry, he will lead discussion on topics such as short supply chains, how much land do we really need to feed everyone and, crucially, how much will all this cost? We will also cover how different systems have radically different outcomes for the planet and what might happen if we don't change soon.

We will meet on **Thursday 22 February** at Highworth Methodist Church on Lechlade Road, Highworth, from 7:30pm to 9pm. There is limited parking, refreshments are available, and it is free to attend the talks.

Ask AMS

Can I claim Flat Rate Expenses when working abroad?

The normal way to claim expenses when overseas is to record your actual travelling expenses (including flights, taxis, accommodation and meals). You have to be disciplined and convert any foreign currency payments into Sterling for the actual transaction date.

However, it may well be worth using the HMRC benchmark rates for employees/directors who are required to travel abroad. These benchmark rates give the daily rates for food and accommodation (not travel costs) that you can claim, without needing to keep receipts. The benchmark rates, for various cities/countries, are available on the HMRC website.

Start a New Year, a New Hobby or a New Skill

With the start of a new year, many people make New Year resolutions to realise a personal goal. If this is something that appeals to you, how about starting a new hobby or learn more about your local history?

The National Trust's Buscot and Coleshill Estate SN6 7PT, which has only recently been fully opened to visitors, is within easy local reach of Faringdon, Highworth and Lechlade.

One of the biggest draws for visitors to Coleshill is the Heritage and Rural Skills Centre showcasing expert craftspeople who can teach people about the skills that created and restored great houses and estates like Coleshill. This is where you can start the new year with a new hobby or learn more about bygone heritage conservation skills with a beginner's or hobbyist's course on blacksmithing, lime plastering or carving (wood or stone).

Tom Ball is one of the Estate's expert craftspeople and a Lead Woodcarving Lecturer at City and Guilds of London Art School. In November 2023, he won the Heritage Crafts Woodworker of the Year Award 2023 and received his £2,000 prize and trophy at a presentation at St George's College, Windsor Castle.

Coleshill's Old Carpenters Yard – aptly named for the trade that was historically carried on here – features a



second-hand bookshop, café and welcome centre. The bookshop offers a wealth of interesting pre-loved books where book lovers can easily spend a whole day browsing round the well-stocked shelves. The newly renovated café has recently been taken over by Blakes Kitchen, well-known for baking their own bread every day and offering delicious sweets and savouries.

The Buscot and Coleshill Estate is somewhere new to go for coffee, breakfast or lunch, sign up for a new hobby or skill, or have an enjoyable family day out.

Obituary: Wendy Barbara Ratcliffe (1945 to 2023)

Wendy Ratcliffe, who passed away on the 1 October 2023, was well known to many in the town, particularly for her commitment to St. Michael's Church for many years. Her funeral was held on 17 October 2023, led by the Rev'd John Martin, and attended by many former parishioners, friends, and relatives.

When the family moved to Highworth they joined St. Michael's Church and it wasn't long before Wendy was PCC Secretary and an assistant to the vicar, Richard Dent. She

was very active in those days with Highworth Churches Together and helped organise the holiday club which was offered to all children in the town in the summer months.

This led to her close friendship with Jean Ashton who persuaded her to help with classroom work in Southfield Junior School. After a few years, Jean guided Wendy to apply for a vacancy in Warneford School to be on the staff as a learning support assistant in a department led by the late Alice Hignett. She later studied at college and qualified to teach after-school classes improving literacy



and numeracy, until her retirement.

Her husband Keith received many cards mentioning Wendy's inspired leading of individual journeys into deeper faith and her deep biblical knowledge and wonderful example of faith in action.

Wendy worked with Arthur Randall to help set up the first Christian bookshop (Lighthouse Bookshop), in those days working in a room above Silk's grocers (which is now Two's Company).

Keith has been supported by his daughters, Jaine and Helen, guiding him through the practical and legal formalities after Wendy's passing. Jean Ashton has also been very helpful at this time.

Wendy will be missed and remembered by many. She faced the end of her earthly life with confidence and peace. She is now with her Saviour in a much better place where we hope to meet her again one day.

Together they moved to a detached house in Cleeve Lawns, Swindon, and were thrilled to see three of their children (lan, Susannah and Janetta) born there. Their fourth child, Shaun, was born in Barra Close, Highworth.

In her youth, Janet enjoyed ballet

and keep fit classes, but she particularly loved her car and was known as a courageous driver. Indeed she was very proud of her Advanced Driver Certification status.

Later in life, Janet became an active member of three local choirs and was very keen to serve the community by volunteering as Chair of the Highworth Guides and Brownies, President of the Highworth Evening WI, and as a member of both the South Marston Friendly Club and the Floral Art Society. Whilst living in Sevenhampton, Janet also served as a church warden and was a proud member of The Wrens, being Chair of the Swindon branch for seven years. As a Leading Wren she had served on the Thames in

London on HMS President.

Later in life her increasing lack of mobility did not stop her enduring passion for gardening, a pastime which gave her hours of pleasure.

Known as a loyal friend to many and a mother, grandmother and greatgrandmother, she will be sadly missed by all who knew her.



The Lighthouse

For many years the Lighthouse Bookshop has been a 'light on the High Street'. It was established in the early 1980s when John Silk, a former Highworthian and son of Jack Silk the grocer, inspired retired butcher, Arthur Randall, to set up a Christian book distribution system for Highworth and the surrounding villages.

Ironically, Arthur was not an avid reader of books but felt a calling to make Christian books readily available to those who did not have easy access to a Christian bookshop. The business was launched from Arthur's spare bedroom and saw mobile bookcases placed in churches around the area. As sales increased, the business was registered in 1983 as a charity, 'The Seekers Light Trust'. As trade improved, Arthur was able to move the base from his house to a room above Silk's grocer's shop in the High Street.

The business continued to grow and in 1990 Arthur retired and handed it over to Tony Chapman. Again, trade increased and in November 1993 ground floor premises were secured at 40 High Street. Customers would travel into Highworth from a wide area, many of them taking the opportunity to spend some money in the local cafés! Still bookcases were being sent out to the village churches and they continued to supply Christian conferences with bookstalls.

When Tony retired, Malcolm and Val Swift took over managing the business. The irony was that Malcolm had become a Christian after reading a book given to him by

Val, called 'A Whole New Ball Game' written by Gerald Williams, the BBC tennis and football commentator. So, in taking on the bookshop, both Val and Malcom knew the potential for people's lives being transformed through reading a Christian book!

Over the years, the Lighthouse has indeed proved to be a real resource for Highworth and the surrounding area. People loved being able to find the latest Christian books and music locally and to obtain a Bible that suited their needs. In addition, the Lighthouse did a roaring trade in greetings cards and gifts, and it always carried a range of materials suitable for children.

Many people came into the shop to post Scout Christmas Cards or to purchase tickets for local events. In addition, the Lighthouse acted as an Information Centre for visitors to the town. Others came into the shop just in need of someone to talk to.

Over the years, the management have been supported by a great team of volunteers.

Sadly, following the Covid epidemic and the decline in the reading of books, sales began to drop. This was not helped by people finding it easier and cheaper to purchase their requirements online.

As a result, the trustees recently took the decision to close the Lighthouse from the 31 January. This is truly an end of the era for an establishment that has been a key part of the High Street for nearly 40 years.
