Life to the Full

None of us should be excluded from society just because we don't have enough money.

Yet the Joseph Rowntree Foundation's January 2024 research revealed that the UK's poverty rate means 14.4 million of us are trying to survive on an income that doesn't cover even the basic needs we have in life. 4.2 million of these are children. Freedom, dignity, hope and life are being stolen from people every day.



But this is not God's design, not His plan. We live in a broken world where pain, injustice and suffering abound – with each other and within ourselves.

When Jesus came to earth to show us God and to give us a way for deep, lasting peace with Him, He said, 'The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they might have life and have it to the full.' (The Bible, John chapter 10 verse 10)

God's desire for us is not that we might merely survive;

He wants us to thrive. As Christians, that's the transformation we chase after. A person having 'just enough' to live on or a parent unable to clothe or bathe their children doesn't satisfy our hunger for justice.

For Christians Against Poverty (CAP) this means we roll up our sleeves to serve our communities with services that free people from poverty's grip, equip them to

confidently manage their money and give them the skills to pass on to the next generation.

For us, this means we speak up to those in power to instigate change that results in a fairer, more just society. It means we personally pray for our nations and raise awareness in our churches, workplaces and communities of the harm being caused by UK poverty. We set our sights higher than 'just enough', and instead reach for 'life to the full'.

Highworth Climate Talks

Can renewable energy power the UK? The race is on. Gas and oil companies across the world are gearing up to expand their fossil fuel production just as scientists warn that the Paris target of 1.5C is slipping away.

But if renewables can be built at speed, we can bring back hope of reducing the worst impacts of global warming. Chris Church is on a mission to stem the tide.

Chris, whose background is with Oxford Friends of the Earth and Westmill Sustainable Energy Trust, will present the facts behind the formidable task of switching the UK's power from dirty fossil fuels to clean renewables.

There are many challenges to the big switch. How do we tackle the impacts of solar and wind farms on nature and food production? Will it be too costly? Can we produce the extra electricity needed to power cars and heat our homes?

Chris will give his talk on **Wednesday 15 May** at Highworth Methodist Church, Vicarage Lane SN6 7AD.

Lechlade History Society

On Monday 13 May, 7pm for a 7:30pm start, speaker Sue Smith will present 'The Friends' Ambulance Unit in the World Wars' in the Memorial Hall, Lechlade.

The Friends' Ambulance Unit (FAU) was a volunteer ambulance service set up to provide an alternative service to fighting. It was founded by the Quakers in line with their Peace Testimony during the First World War, when universal conscription first became compulsory. It operated during both wars and beyond in many countries in Europe, Asia and Africa.

It took some years to be accepted but, by the end of WW2, Quakers had been awarded the Nobel Peace prize for their non-partisan work providing humanitarian aid.

Support Christian Aid Week

Seven days, so many ways to make a difference. Every Christian Aid Week people across Britain and Ireland raise funds, act, and pray for their global neighbours in a celebration of hope for a fairer world.

This year's appeal is from **12 to 18 May** and is focusing on the organisation's work in Burundi, one of the most densely populated and poorest countries in Africa. Heavily reliant on agriculture, it's also one of the least prepared to combat the effects of climate change, including droughts, floods, and landslides. The global cost of living crisis has intensified the challenges: More than 70% of the population live in poverty, and more than half of children are chronically malnourished.

Thirty-five-year-old Aline Nibogora is the chairperson of a VSLA (Village Savings and Loans Association) which supports some twenty-five families in a remote village in Makamba Province. Aline escaped an abusive marriage only to find herself on the streets begging for a place to stay. Her life changed when she went to a three-day, Christian Aid-funded community workshop. With a small start-up loan, Aline began trading avocados and peanuts locally. She's now a grocery wholesaler and living on her own plot of land where



she's building a home for her family. In the next five years she hopes to expand so one day she can buy a mill. This will provide a source of income without the need to transport heavy goods over long distances.

"I don't want my children to have a painful life like mine, remembering it makes me weep. I could never have dreamed I would one day have a brick house and be a successful businesswoman, able to feed and clothe my children. This is a plan, and I will do it; I am a woman who is an achiever."

British Science Week

This year's British Science Week theme was 'Time'. All classes at Southfield had an additional special science lesson on Time during the week and discussed what the concept meant to them. They then carried out time investigations.

Years 3 and 4 were challenged to time their brains! They worked with a partner to measure their reaction time and then practised to see if they could improve it. The children then discussed why one hand had a faster reaction time to the other – why could this be?

Years 5 and 6 created water clocks; they added intervals to measure one minute of time, tested their water clock, and compared the different scales on all the clocks in the class. Lots of discussion and debate ensued about the observed differences and possible reasons for them.



Why Should We Learn a Second Language?




The Arts Society Upper Thames

On Thursday 9 May at 2pm we would be pleased to welcome you as a visitor to our lecture entitled 'Gold of the Gods: Treasures of South America and the search for El Dorado', with our lecturer Chloe Sayer.

Gold in South America had a spiritual importance. Its brilliance evoked the Sun – the golden disk that nourished the Earth. In Peru and Colombia, goldsmiths made some of the most spectacular treasures of the ancient world. Cast and hammered, gold was transformed into sacred offerings for tombs and temples. Europeans, by contrast, saw gold as a commodity – the ultimate symbol of wealth. For decades, Europeans searched in vain for El Dorado, the legendary Golden One. Although many golden treasures were melted down for bullion, magnificent works of art are preserved in the museums of Peru and Colombia.

Our speaker, Chloe, is a freelance specialist in the art and culture of Latin America. She has lectured internationally and curated exhibitions, whilst also assisting on TV documentaries for the BBC and Channel 4. She is Research Associate in the Department of World Cultures at the Royal Ontario Museum and in 2016 she was awarded the prestigious Ohtli medal by the Mexican government for her longstanding commitment to Mexican culture.

The Holidays of May

Happy May everyone. As you know summer is just around the corner, but before summer we have May Day. Have you ever thought about where May Day has come from and why we celebrate it?

First of all, it's not to be confused with the use of 'mayday' when lost at sea! This is an anglicised version of the French phrase m'aidez, which means 'help me'. May Day has been celebrated for centuries and in the UK it probably makes you think of fayres and dancing around the maypole. The celebration is to say goodbye to spring and welcome summer and this year it falls on the fourth of the month (always the first Monday) – this just so happens to be Star Wars Day as well. 
