Ask AMS

Do I need to register for CIS if I employ a friend?

The rules say, if you pay your friends as employees, (deducting PAYE and National Insurance) you don't need to register for the Construction Industry scheme (CIS).

But, if you pay them as self-employed workers (not PAYE), then you must register as a Contractor under the CIS rules. You will probably need to deduct 20% tax (depending on their CIS status) from what you pay them for labour; provide them with proper statements; send monthly returns to HMRC and keep proper records. And your friends should register as Subcontractors under the CIS rules and obtain a form CIS4(P).

The penalties for failing to comply with CIS regulations are very harsh, so take advice now if you are in this position.

Eco Tip from Weigh It Up

Did you know that Brits are wasting 19.4m food items every day that could have been eaten? So next time you're sorting your cupboards or fridge check it before you chuck it.

Dried pasta in a sealed container is fine for up to three years after the best before. Tinned food can often be eaten years after its best before date as it goes through an extremely high heat process that kills bacteria and sterilises its contents. With hard cheeses like cheddar, any mould can be cut off and the rest will be fine – this doesn't work with soft cheeses as the mould can quickly pass through. Vegetables like potatoes, lettuce, root veg and herbs can be revived by soaking them in cold water. Put eggs in a large bowl of water – if it lies flat at the bottom it's fresh, but if it sinks and stands upright on the bottom it's likely fine to eat. If it floats, gases have accumulated inside, and it shouldn't be eaten.

Why Tackling UK Poverty Should be a Priority for Us All



At Christians Against Poverty (CAP) we believe that tackling poverty in the UK should be something we all care about. In my job as the local CAP Debt Centre Manager here in Highworth I've seen the challenges

people face, so here's why I think we should all be concerned about poverty.

One in five of us lives in poverty. Did you know that 14.4 million people in the UK are surviving on an income that doesn't cover the cost of basic essentials? Poverty isn't just a distant issue – it's right here in our own community!

It affects our health. Financial struggles can take a serious toll on our health. Three quarters of the people who sought help from CAP said their money problems affected their physical and mental wellbeing. These issues can worsen existing health conditions or create new ones, putting extra pressure on services like the NHS. It's a vicious cycle that needs breaking.

Millions lack basic essentials. Everyone deserves to have food on the table and a warm home, but millions in the UK are having to skip meals or live without heating because they simply can't afford it. This isn't just about adults – it's affecting children and pensioners too.

Borrowing to get by. This not only puts people in deeper debt but also threatens the economy. When too many households are in unmanageable debt, it can lead to economic problems like recessions.

Our future is at stake. The number of UK children living in poverty is on the rise. This affects their schoolwork, friendships and overall wellbeing.

The rising demand for debt help. Here at our Highworth CAP Debt Centre we can see how poverty is impacting our community. Daily we see local services being stretched to their limits by rising poverty levels. Last year across the UK, CAP's Debt Centres had no choice but to turn away over 4,000 people due to appointments being fully booked. We are feeling the pressure too in Highworth.

Highworth Climate Talks

Two things tend to come to the fore as the autumn nights draw in: Keeping warm, and those pesky energy bills. That's why our talk on 17 September focuses on a raft of practical solutions to reducing energy and saving money. Saving energy is a nobrainer way of reducing carbon emissions and becoming less dependent on the price fluctuations of foreign oil and gas.

There are quick wins to keep your house warm. Stopping drafts can create a more cosy home at almost no cost. Insulation prevents the escape of that valuable heat you're paying for. At the other end of the scale an air source heat pump is a long-term investment. You can get a £7,500 government grant which often covers most of the cost.

Surprisingly, heat pumps are the heating choice of people in Norway, but they are new to the UK and treated with suspicion. The idea that heat can be sucked out of the nippy air outside to keep our houses warm inside seems to contradict basic science and logic. But if the snowbound Norwegians do it, why not us?

Special appearances from fan favourites



Delight and Gratitude from WrdeUp Crew



First and foremost, I want to say a huge THANK YOU to everyone who supported us on our first year running the WrdeUp Festival!

Thanks to the attendees, all our performers, to our crew and the outgoing committee who lent invaluable support on our takeover year. Also to our wonderful sponsors, KMS Construction, Austen Dawson, and supporters at the Arts Council England.

Overall, the event was a roaring success and we're proud of our achievements personally and for the town. We had fantastic numbers turn out on the main festival Saturday with lower numbers on the Friday (affected by the rain!) and lower on the experimental pay-what-you-feel approach to the Sunday...this is why we experiment!

It was a genuine challenge for our small team at Fandangos but one which rightly pushed us to excel and bring better for the town. The event in total cost a little over £66,000 to produce (not including VAT!), of which just under a third was from the Arts Council. We spent double compared to previous years. The rise in general event costs coupled with us being a business (rather than a charitable committee and so not being able to access previous cheaper prices for event infrastructure) meant we had to really make it work! Although this year didn't turn a profit, we're confident next year it will at least pay for itself – ultimately the event needs to be profitable to continue.

The grassroots element of the event was a real achievement. We engaged local schools, ran DJ workshops, supported funding a new sound system





for Warneford, ran free jazz workshops, supported Swindon Welcomes Ukraine and also ran a work experience programme for budding event enthusiasts. We're working on a new grassroots scheme for 2025.

I hope that the person who was so disrespectfully cruel and thoughtless is reading this and is feeling ashamed of themselves for being so judgemental.

Please, when you see someone who may be having difficulty in either speech or mobility, or both, don't make instant assumptions that they are inebriated or under the influence of other substances. If you are concerned, politely ask if they require assistance or ask a member of staff to do so on your behalf. These are ordinary people trying to cope with life's challenges. I know that your respect and, on occasion, assistance would be appreciated.



different route through each Section based on ability and marked out by coloured flags.



News from Highworth's Mayor



Before I tell you about the events I've attended, I want to share that the public consultation for the Neighbourhood Plan has concluded, with the Committee reviewing 325 comments. The revised plan will undergo a further six-week public consultation by Swindon

Borough Council. If you have strong views on any policies, please participate in the next stage – dates to be confirmed.

On 6 June, I hosted the 80th anniversary of D-Day with a special commemoration where distinguished guests included Lord Lieutenant Sarah Troughton and Deputy Lieutenant James Arkell. The event featured a proclamation by our Town Crier, a service overseen by Rector Phil Goodey and wreath-laying at the Memorial, with a coffee morning and exhibition in the Council's Community Room. In the evening we were joined by WW2 vehicles, personnel and songs of the 1940s from Chelsea Millard. A poem, roll of honour and a national tribute were all followed by the lighting of a beacon on the Podium.

On 17 July, myself and over 100 residents attended the Swindon Borough Council Cabinet Meeting to raise questions regarding the future of our much-loved Old Golf Course. The Cabinet committed to working with Highworth Town Council to consider our proposal submitted in October 2023. We continue to advocate protecting this space and hope to be successful in designating it as Local Green Space through our Neighbourhood Plan which, if successful, protects its designation in perpetuity.

I recently hosted the opening of Northview Play Park which included a picnic and treasure hunt. Special guests included Deputy Lieutenant Mohammed Ali and newly elected MP Will Stone. It was lovely to see so many of you there.

How Can You Best Love Your Neighbour?

Mims Schulter, of the London Institute of Contemporary Christianity, wrote this recent article which I now share with you.

How did a Taylor Swift dance party tragedy in Southport degenerate into some members of ethnic minorities across the UK being too scared to leave their homes?

The news of rioting across the country has been hot in the headlines this last month. After the horrific stabbing of three young girls, thousands of men and women took to the streets. The targeting of hotels, homes and businesses believed to be owned or occupied by asylum seekers and refugees, is parasitic upon Southport's pain, opportunistically seeking to drive an anti-immigration agenda.

We've witnessed old and young threatening police, smashing windows and setting streets alight, courtesy of this angry mob of destruction; all driven by fear and loathing of those who are perceived as 'other' – those the rioters believe do not belong. Resorting to violence is so painfully wrong. What does it look like for us to support the bereaved and fight for justice?

Jesus, in his teachings in Mark 12:28–34, gives us a very clear commandment. In fact, it's one of the two greatest commandments, which is to love our

neighbours as ourselves – to love both the grieving families, friends of the young girls who died, and the marginalised who have consequentially got a target on their backs.

Immigration concerns and policy aside, the people we live alongside are our neighbours. When we are faced with the person in front of us, what should our first and ultimate response be? Jesus says it is to love – to unconditionally commit to work for their welfare.

We do not live anywhere near Southport or where these uprisings occurred. But our loving response doesn't have to directly impact the northwest coast. This isn't a wishy-washy posture or a virtue-signalling exercise; it's a radical ministry that feels awkward. It goes against our individualistic instincts and shapes the culture of our communities.

Love in action could be volunteering to sweep up debris, helping a couple translate the food store price labels (true story), or baking a cake for those in mourning. Perhaps even leaning in and listening to those who resonate with the rioting, for they are neighbours, too. Whatever it is and wherever you are, Jesus said we should love our neighbours. How could you be loving yours?





