We can't all help a child in Africa, I understand that, but we can all take what we've been given – whether it be time, talents, personality, finances or skills – to enrich someone else's life. As community together we have the extraordinary opportunity to make a difference simply by being ourselves. The greatest gift we can ever give to anyone is the understanding that we see their value; and whilst we use Christmas as an opportunity to spread a message of joy and peace it can be a lifestyle which lasts all year long.

Why not set yourself a challenge in 2025 to make a positive difference to other people? And, if nothing else, remember that your little is beyond price.

# **Christmas Funds for Wiltshire Bobby Van Trust**

The annual Christmas Fair at Bowood Hotel Spa and Golf Resort is once again raising money to support the Wiltshire Bobby Van Trust.

Christmas shoppers will have the chance to browse unique gifts from craftsmen and women amid the atmospheric surroundings of Bowood at the

Bowood Festive Food and Gift Fair on Monday 2 December and Tuesday 3 December. Whether you're looking for stocking fillers, leather goods, festive food, inspiration for important family members or just to spoil yourself, you'll find all you need at the fair.

The annual fair is a showcase for the best in local producers whilst also raising funds for the Bobby Van. Director Jennie Shaw explains:

"The charity works in partnership with Wiltshire Police with three operators who are former police officers; visiting homes across Wiltshire and Swindon, to offer free practical home security measures and fire safety assessments for people over 60, those at risk of domestic abuse, or over 18 with a registered disability. It also has a team of Stay Safe Online volunteers who visit older and vulnerable people in their homes and give talks to groups about preventing online fraud.

"The fair is such a lovely event because, within the setting of Bowood's hotel with the music, carols and the buzz of everyone shopping, you really get a sense of the season. It's such a joyous time but it also helps

us to think of those who need our help all year round. The money raised by the fair will go such a long way to continuing to support the safety and joy of those vulnerable people and will allow them to enjoy the festive period too."

The Monday evening's preview event runs from 4pm to 8pm at just £15 per ticket. Visitors will be greeted with a glass of wine and canapes, as well as atmospheric music and carols in the Kerry Suite. The fair is open again between 9am and

3pm on the Tuesday providing another chance to meet up with friends to shop, share Christmas plans and enjoy the festive atmosphere.

# Highworth Climate Talks

We welcome Ashley Smith on 17 December, the founder of WASP or Windrush Against Sewage Pollution – a local charity that has had national influence through the quality of its data analysis and investigations into the water industry and regulators. His talk is entitled 'Privatised Water: Three Decades into Monopoly Ownership'.

Ash decided that people had to fight back if we are not to lose our precious waterways to profiteering monopoly businesses. The group is made up of a core team and a wider group of volunteers and supporters. Ash is very knowledgeable and has the information and photos to back up all his data!

And you're welcome to join us again on 21 January to hear an inspiring talk from Dr. Halid Abu Bakar from the University of Cambridge Institute of Sustainability Leadership; who is an international expert working towards the idea of a circular economy.

Will some of our waste plastic end up in the sea, endangering wildlife? Will our defunct digital items end up smouldering with toxic fumes in some distant country's waste mountain? What if our world was redesigned so that materials never become waste and nature is regenerated? The good news is that, on the international scene, scientists have a plan to make that happen – the idea of a 'Circular Economy'.

It's great that Weigh It Up is now in the heart of our town, making it easier for us to avoid plastic waste. Far too much of what we buy comes encased in plastic!

All our talks take place at Highworth Methodist Church, Vicarage Lane, Highworth SN6 7AD. Doors open at 7pm for refreshments and talks begin at 7:30pm.

Tax rules for Christmas parties

The rules around tax relief for Christmas parties are fairly generous so long as the party is open to all employees and not just directors/ management.

•Party costs (including travel etc.) are fully tax deductible if they are no more than £150 (inc. VAT) per head (including guests).

• Be careful. If, say, £200/head is spent, then the Employer will need to pay PAYE and National Insurance on the total party cost of £200/head – not just on the excess £50/head.

• The £150 is an annual limit so would cover a Summer Party and a Christmas Party in the same tax year. But, if the costs of multiple parties exceed £150/head, then an Employer could use the £150/head limit to cover the most expensive party, and only pay PAYE/NI on the other one.

At the Heritage and Rural Skills Centre over 260 people took part in 33 courses. We held our first conference with over 80 delegates and demonstrators – keep an eye out for the 2025 programme as it will be on our website (www.nationaltrust.org.uk/visit) and on our Facebook page 'Heritage and Rural Skills Centre NT'.

Over 800 people came to one (or more) of our Open Days with 300 coming in September for Heritage Open



Day – that was a busy one! The mill ran for a short while before low water levels stopped play, many visitors discovered the underground bunker for the first time and many more visited the bookshop. Farm history tour guides shared the stories with over 250 people.



Over 3200 students came on school visits. 416 Year 5 students found out ways to save the planet at our Earth Summit. Duke of Edinburgh students tidied up the orchard and created a lovely display in the bookshop. Young people from alternative education came for a series of blacksmithing workshops. We launched a weekend club for 16 young people as part of the National Saturday Club. Our family workshops and tracker packs have been a hit with younger visitors. We also made time to be a part of the Highworth Volunteer Expo – it was so lovely to meet many of you.

None of what we do is possible without our brilliant volunteers and we thank them all for their time, their enthusiasm and their generous spirit. We wish them a peaceful and restful festive season – every one of them deserves it.

## Your Surgery Needs Your Views!

We are extremely fortunate in Highworth to be part of one of the best medical practices in the Swindon area, but the partners of the practice know things are not perfect. Rather than moaning to your friends (which may well raise your blood pressure!) the best way to express your praise or concerns is to talk to the Patient Participate Group (PPG).

We welcome all your feedback and want a balanced view on the performance of the practice so that we can bring about positive change.

The Government expects every medical practice to have a PPG to enhance the communication between the surgery and the patients. In Highworth this group has operated through an online group and also through a face-to-face group.

Several times a year, the PPG issues a survey to patients who have joined the group and the results of this survey are looked at carefully; any actions identified from the survey are put to the team at the surgery. The group aims to challenge and encourage the practice in their work. Their comments are guided by the information that comes through the survey and from contacts with patients as they go around the town.

Issues covered by the group include: Communication between the practice and the patients; access to appointments; telephone call waiting times; organisation of large events, e.g. 'flu and covid vaccinations; contact via reception; and future provision at the surgery to cope with the growing population of Highworth. The more feedback the PPG receives the more effective the group can be in representing the interests of the patients.

The group is also consulted by the Care Quality Commission (CQC) Inspection team when they visit the surgery.

I would like to encourage as many patients as possible to sign up for the online group, but even more important is the need to increase the size of the faceto-face PPG. It would be great if we could increase the diversity of the group so that we are even more representative of patients; and membership of this group only involves attending around three meetings a year.


## Local Author Publishes First Book


The ongoing debate regarding the future of the Old Golf Course continues, with hopes of a resolution in the new year.
