


The bench disappeared after Christmas and has been completely refurbished and returned to its position in Parson's Lane and will hopefully be

We would like to invite you to join us for our upcoming talks at Lechlade Memorial Hall.

On **Monday 17 March**, 7:30pm, we have Dr. Hugh Pihlens with us who will present 'Littlecote Roman Villa'. The Roman Villa is one of the great treasures of Britain. First discovered in the early 18th century, then covered, forgotten, and abandoned, 250 years later it was rediscovered. A team of archaeologists worked for 13 years exploring and restoring it, and visitors can now enjoy it.

Littlecote is an unusual villa as it covers the whole of the Roman occupation and houses one of the finest and largest mosaics in Britain.

Mike Bottomley will be with us on **Monday 14 April**, 7:30pm, with his talk 'Queen Katherine Parr - Gloucestershire's Queen'. This will be an integrated live presentation of the extraordinary life of Katherine Parr, the sixth and last wife of King Henry VII.

Mike will use music, readings, and video to recreate the atmosphere and intrigues of the Tudor Court to tell the largely unknown story of the queen and her journey from obscurity to the heart of English history, before her final resting place at Sudeley Castle. Katherine's life story resonates through the ages.







Still boasting the old wooden beams and open fireplace, the building has looked after us well as we've welcomed many. many people to come and experience its guirks and history whilst also choosing from our selection of second hand books. We've hosted storytelling events for grown-ups and children alike, as well as a book signing session and a sci-fi day, all under the glow of fairy lights and flickering candles. And we've been delighted to provide a home for the Yarny Ninjas to display their amazing post box toppers. All in all, it's been wonderful.

Gregory's Books was only ever meant to be a pop-up shop, temporary but nonetheless sincere. Now it's time to take down our lights, pack away the remaining books, and leave number 13. We'll forever be grateful for the warm hugs it has given us and the beautiful people who've entered the doors. If you've been one of them, thank you for your kindness, generosity, and friendship. Synergistic Collaboration

'I love it when a plan comes together!' So declares 80s icon Hannibal Smith, leader of the A-Team, Well, I think we all love it and I for one love it even more when you discover someone else has a plan and you get to join in.

That's what happened to us at Highworth Community Church. We have been holding Sunday services at Warneford School for over nine years now, making use of their great facilities right on our doorstep. Our gatherings are in the school hall where anything from

100 to 170 people come together, from all ages and backgrounds, joined by their belief in a creator God who loves them. We even have lots of people come who are just investigating faith or giving faith a go. The hall understandably looks like a school hall and I wondered late last summer if we could collaborate with

the school to make the hall more of an event-style venue which would better suit our needs, the needs of the community, and the school's needs for their events. So I contacted James Hanson.

I had connected with James in 2023 and was seriously impressed with his passion for performing arts and his dedication to the students (he's Head of Music at Warneford School). As with so many of our fantastic local teachers, despite years of change, new targets, another set of acronyms to learn, and pressure from Ofsted, James steps up because he really cares and truly believes in what he's doing.

What followed was one of those dream conversations (at least for me) because he already had a plan and I loved it. You can read below what James has been doina.



This collaboration sees an ongoing sharing of resources, in terms of things like lights and speakers, and also skills – from carpentry to streaming. So do go and see the next production at Warneford and feel free to join us any Sunday, 10:30am, as Highworth Community Church.

£18,000 has been raised through charitable and personal donations. We've been able to remove all the old outdated theatrical installations and replace them with state-of-the-art sound and lighting, front of house controls, and new theatrical drapes. We are excited to see what community benefits the collaboration will bring in the future.

My Personal Journey with Christmas Shoeboxes

Back in 1996 I first read about 'Love in a Box'
Operation Christmas
Child shoeboxes going to needy children in Eastern
Europe. The project was started in 1990 by Dave
Cooke from Wrexham when he saw on TV the appalling suffering of children in Romanian orphanages.

Our westernised Christmas is so very far removed from

the true meaning of Christmas, and so this seemed to me an ideal way to redress the balance. With the support of a small group of friends from Highworth Community Church I sent out letters to local schools, churches, and the community of Highworth through LINK magazine.

The following Christmas, having no idea what to expect, I was delighted to receive approximately 200 shoeboxes filled with gifts! A small team got together and we delivered the boxes to Melksham Warehouse where the boxes were checked and packed before being sent overseas to an expanding need revealed in Eastern Europe. A small group of us from Highworth got involved in Melksham Warehouse on a regular basis.

In time, we set up a satellite centre in The Rec where boxes could be dropped off any time of day. We gathered a small team of volunteers to check and pack the boxes ready to go to the warehouse. We also





received many beautiful hand-knitted items such as jumpers, blankets, mitts and hats – these were exciting times!

The project continued to go from strength to strength and in time around 2,000 boxes were sent overseas each year from Highworth and the surrounding area, which is an amazing number of individually packed

boxes going to children who otherwise would not receive any gift at Christmas.

In 2004 I joined with a national team from Samaritan's Purse who had taken on the running of the project from Dave Cooke. I went to Azerbaijan and was shocked to see the conditions of some of the orphanages

there, and it was an honour to give out gifts to children of all ages in such need.

Following on from this visit Geoff Sowden, vicar of Highworth at that time, suggested running a Harvest Appeal across the town to raise funds to send overseas to help with the upgrade of one of these orphanages. Geoff and I did many joint presentations to churches in the local area and the astonishing sum of almost £4,000 was raised! This money went towards both the upgrading work on the orphanage, and paying for support workers and volunteers who would work with the children to teach them basic skills, such as toothbrushing.

In more recent years my practical involvement in running the campaign was less but I have continued to always pack two shoeboxes each year. It has been my joy throughout many years to gather lovely gifts for the children who would receive them.

Change has come of course and the boxes are now still gathered throughout the UK and then checked and packed in large central locations across the country.

I don't know what 2025 will hold but I hope I can still continue to donate Christmas boxes to the project.



Highworth Climate Talks

Join us on 18 March for the Highworth Climate Talk about e-waste (electronic waste). Our speaker is Jacob Badcock who is a PhD student at UCL. Here is how Jacob describes his research:

"My research focuses on the ethics of photography in Agbogbloshie, a scrapyard and informal e-waste processing hub located in Accra, Ghana. Since 2008, Agbogbloshie has attracted the attention of photographers, pollution scientists, and environmental justice advocates concerned with the growing global e-waste crisis. Alongside other research methods, photography has portrayed Agbogbloshie as a 'hell', often exaggerating the scale and nature of e-waste pollution in the area.

The central question of my research is: How can photography document environmental crisis zones without turning them into a spectacle or enabling the repressive aims of the state? To investigate this question I draw on various photographic archives related to Agbogbloshie and the greater Accra area. These include colonial photography, activist photography, amateur photography, photovoice, medical photography, and image data produced for scientific research."

Virtual Reality at Southfield Junior School

They have also enjoyed using the atlases and learning about different time zones.




Year 5 and 6 have been fully immersed in their fascinating Victorian topic, exploring key figures and events that shaped the era. In design and technology, the children applied their knowledge by designing and sewing waistcoats, bringing history to life through hands-on learning.

In history, they compared modern day schools with those from the Victorian era, before taking a step

back in time with a trip to Sevington Victorian School. There, they experienced a true day in the life of a Victorian child, with the boys and girls segregated in typical Victorian fashion. 

Constance's Oat Biscuits

During lockdown my family and I did a lot of baking. One of my favourite recipes was oat biscuits as they melt in the mouth. They are super sweet and delicious. I thought you might like to have a go at making them yourself. Enjoy!

75g of plain flour

1/2 tsp of bicarbonate soda (or use self-raising flour instead of plain flour and omit the bicarb)

75g of sugar

75g of porridge oats

75g of butter

1 tbsp of honey

- 1. Wash your hands with soap and put on an apron.
- 2. Turn on the oven to 160°C (140°C fan, gas mark 4).
- 3. Pour the flour, bicarbonate soda, sugar, and oats into a big bowl.
- 4. Measure the butter into a pan and add the honey. Then heat gently until melted.
- Add the melted ingredients to the bowl of dry ingredients and mix.
- 6. Shape the mixture into small balls and place onto a baking tray.
- Cook them in the oven for about ten minutes until golden brown.
- 8. Finally, leave to cool down before you eat!


John Hindmarsh





News from Will Stone MP


In November last year, we all learned that the charges against the driver who killed Harry Parker would be dropped. Although this horrific incident happened on Akers Way, it shocked the whole of Swindon North. As soon as I heard the news I knew something had to be done. Meeting with Harry's family I felt their pain and need for action. After discussions with the Crown Prosecution Service and the police I was told that any chance to get Harry justice was in vain; the law as it was meant the driver wouldn't face justice.

Therefore, I made it my mission to try and change the law so that driving without a licence which led to a death would be instantly classed as careless driving. Ability and right are, and should be, legally classified as distinct.

I am writing this before I bring the Harry Parker Bill to Parliament on the 4 February. This Bill aims to make our roads safer and hold to account those who drive unlicenced. This will not bring Harry justice, but it can
