You see, we live in a small house with a patch of grass at the front and side, and I had this romanticised vision of a field of daffodils sprouting up right in front of the kitchen window. I mean, daffodils are just so friendly, aren't they?

We developed a good rhythm: Mr. Smith made the hole with the bulb planter and I dropped a bulb in the hole, back-filling it with the plug of soil. The interesting part of this story is that, unbeknownst to me, not all the bulbs were planted. Only the other day I found a rogue bulb which had been lying all

A bit of warmth, a bit more light, and all the growing cells had been switched on to do what they've been made to do. Nonetheless, without nourishment. the dormant



daffodil didn't get very far. Most of its planted siblings are around 30cm tall whilst this forgotten one is standing on its tiptoes to get to 7cm.

My point is this: Whilst we contain the basic elements to grow in this life, we can't flourish without nourishment. We need the right conditions to be the best we can be. Bulbs need soil, water, heat and light, whereas people arguably need aspirations, community, love and a sense of value. Thriving, not just surviving.

As this spring sunshine warms the air, take a bit of time to read this issue of LINK and see if there's a place where you can set down your roots to flourish.

See Things in a New Light

"My ears have heard of you, but now my eyes have seen you."

These are the words of Job, a Bible character who featured in a recent school assembly. Job suffered greatly as a test of his loyalty to God.

Job's fate seems cruel. He's a good man who has everything but suddenly loses his family, his business, his home, his health and his reputation and even his commitment to his faith is questioned by his well-meaning but unwise friends.

When I talk to people about God, one of the most common responses goes something like: "I'd love to believe in God, but He can't be real because, if He was, bad things would not happen in this world/to my loved ones". There is something about suffering that makes us ask ultimate questions and even form ultimate conclusions. But perhaps there is another way of looking at this?



April brings with it Easter, a time where Christians remember and celebrate the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. In the death of Jesus, horrific as it was, we see that God was not immune from suffering, but gave up His Son. God was so determined to restore His relationship with His creatures that He came himself, in the person of Jesus, to put right what we had got wrong, so that we could have a restored relationship with Him.

It was after Job had suffered, and had a

conversation with God about the meaning and purpose of his life, that he was able to say that he had encountered God in a new way. Enduring suffering and processing it with God had somehow made his faith in God more real than it was before.

This Easter, I invite you to not just to hear the story of Jesus' death and resurrection, but to see it through new eyes.

From the Rector's Pen



As a person who struggles with words and remembering names, I am also fascinated by them.

The word 'Easter', for example, is an interesting one. Initially thought to derive from the name of the Anglo-Saxon goddess Eostre – goddess of spring and

fertility, whose symbol was a rabbit which laid eggs (that's where our Easter eggs come from) – that idea has largely been debunked and instead most scholars believe the word comes from a Latin word for 'dawn' (meaning 'resurrection' or 'new life'). Eostur-monab (Easter month) was the Anglo-Saxon name of the month which we now called April, so the festival of Easter may just be named after the month it usually fell in. I much prefer the French word 'Pesach' which is derived from the Hebrew word for Passover; a festival which Jews hold to celebrate the release of the ancient Israelites from Egyptian enslavement, as they remember the Holy Spirit passing over their homes before their escape from captivity.

It was also at the Jewish festival of Passover that Jesus was arrested, tortured, and slain on a cross, taking upon himself the sins of the whole world and setting us free by paying the price for our wrongdoings. Then on the third day he was raised by God from the tomb, demonstrating God's power over sin and death.

However you choose to celebrate Easter this year (20 April in case you need to mark your calendar), take a moment to reflect on both the good and bad things you might have done; and where you could ask for and receive forgiveness.

"Joyeuses Pâques," or, as the Greeks say, "Καλό Πάσχα."

They've squeezed in an Amazon Pick-up Point and you can send parcels with PayPoint, pay bills and top-up your mobile phone. They offer newspaper deliveries and National Lottery sales are coming soon. It's a lot but it's miraculously spacious and uncluttered. "What about home deliveries?" I asked. "Yes," Venkat replied quick as a flash, "we can arrange that with Just Eat."

News from Will Stone MP

Residents of Swindon Street in Highworth have noted to me their concerns over the new town council Neighbourhood Plan, specifically around the changes to parking in the area. I have seen the plans and, whilst I fully support Highworth Town Council's (HTC) aims of improving greenery and access to shade in the area making the High Street more attractive and touristprone, I also recognise the concerns



residents have raised about reductions in parking for residents, potential pollution, and general quality of life.

As this plan is now with the Borough Council for approval, I have written to the Borough Council to request the opportunity to work with them and HTC to develop an outcome and, where necessary, make amendments to the Neighbourhood Plan which supports the aims of HTC to: increase the beauty of the High Street; make the High Street more attractive to tourists to boost the local economy, as well as provide reasonable parking for residents who live on or near the High Street. My focus is ensuring that residents are listened to and their concerns addressed, and with 92% of residents in Highworth visiting the High Street at least once a week, it's important we get it right.

Beyond concerns over the changes to the High Street, I have written to Environmental Health about the influx of rats on the High Street and I am pleased the department is now proactively working alongside local shops and

residents to address the issue and reduce vermin in the area. One of the primary concerns has been effective management and storage of waste, particularly encouraging businesses and residents to only place rubbish on the streets on the day of bin collection or the night before.
