



#### A Year of Charitable Fundraising at Wrag Barn



Every year, the Captains of the Seniors, Men's and Ladies' sections choose a charity to support and the response from the members is always incredible. It's not just about the money raised but the willingness of so many to contribute their time and effort towards fundraising.

On Friday 14 March a number of representatives from the Seniors section assembled in the Spike Bar to support last year's Seniors Captain David Brownsell as he handed over a cheque for £8,220 to Marie Curie. Peter, a representative of the charity, explained how the money would help provide end-of-life care for anyone with a terminal illness. He made an important point: While many people plan for birth, very few plan for the end of their lives. Talking to loved ones about final wishes is something many put off but it makes a huge difference to the family providing or arranging care.

The Seniors section has now raised £25,022 since 2021. This ongoing effort shows how much the Wrag Barn community is willing to give.

The Men's section, under the captaincy of Shaun Judd, raised £3,443 for CALM (Cancer and Leukaemia Movement). This local charity works within the Swindon and Marlborough NHS Trust area to improve the quality of life for children in treatment and give support to their families. Thanks to Zurich's match funding, arranged by Curtis (a member of Shaun's family) the total doubled to £6,886. This will go directly to the support network which CALM provides as the charity endeavours to keep costs to a minimum and there are no paid employees.

The Ladies' section, though smaller in number, raised £3,594 over two years for Kidney Research UK. Former Ladies' Captain Suzanne Hunt said, "We mustn't forget the men who often came up to me and put a tenner in my hand for my charity. Very lovely random acts of generosity."

A huge thank you to everyone who donated, organised or helped in any way. Your support makes a real difference.

#### **Fun, Sweat and Tears**

On 4 June I'm setting off for Burundi to take part in 'Bike for Burundi', raising money for the work of Great Lakes Outreach (GLO). I'll be cycling with a group of intrepid cyclists from all over the world – seven exhilarating, gruelling days on the roads of Burundi, averaging 60 miles per day with 38,000 ft of elevation.

The ride has run for over ten years, raising tens of thousands of dollars. In addition, I'll visit some GLO projects and see the impact of the fundraising.

Burundi is a beautiful and wellresourced nation, filled with bold, passionate people. It's bordered by

The Democratic Republic of Congo, Tanzania, and Rwanda. Much of its western border is the world's second-largest freshwater lake, Lake Tanganyika.

The country has suffered terrible genocides rooted in tribal tensions, like Rwanda but far less publicised. Following the 2015 election, political unrest suffocated the economy which has no yet recovered. Over 400,000 fled the country and over 100,000 were



internally displaced. Some have returned but many are still refugees in bordering countries. Only this month an article in The Telegraph highlighted the plight of those now trying to escape from The Democratic Republic of Congo due to renewed fighting by M23 rebels there.

Great Lakes Outreach (GLO) works with visionary local leaders to transform Burundi through education, sport, business, healthcare and more, bringing hope to thousands of the most vulnerable.

They identify, equip and empower the best local leaders of passion, integrity, gifting and vision to transform the nation. GLO identifies exceptional Christian leaders in Burundi and helps

them to develop and increase self-sufficiency. The results are exciting and encouraging.


#### **Highworth Gardening Club**



#### **Learning and Growing at Southfield Junior School**

#### **World Book Day**

We had an amazing day celebrating World Book Day at Southfield Junior School. The children really got into the spirit of things by dressing up as their favourite character, word or author, and took part in an array of book related activities. It was wonderful to see so many creative costume ideas – even the teachers got involved!

Years 3 and 4 looked at the book 'I Talk Like a River', about the author's own

experiences of having a stutter. This picture book captures the experience of coming to terms with speech disfluency and explores themes of self-acceptance, family support, nature and embracing difference. Classes Cherry, Willow and Sycamore created art work of their own safe spaces using watercolours and mixing techniques.

We had wonderful creations of natural spaces. The children also wrote poetry as if they had a stammer, thinking carefully about the thoughts and feelings of others.

Years 5 and 6 looked at the book 'Listen: How Evelyn Glennie, a Deaf Girl, Changed Percussion'. This inspiring picture book tells the true story of world-famous deaf percussionist Dame Evelyn Glennie. It is a story of music, of obstacles, of strength and of hard work. Oak, Elm and Rowan classes also wrote poetry, stepping into the shoes of a person with a hearing impairment and how this might impact their day to day lives.

The children's work has now been displayed on the school's 'windows and mirrors' display for all to enjoy.

We would like to say a special thanks to the Highworth Library for allowing us to visit throughout World Book Day. The children had a wonderful time exploring the



library and for some this was their first time! The children took part in a treasure hunt and used their book tokens in exchange for a new book.

#### Visit to the STEAM Museum

This term, the children in Years 5 and 6 have been delving into the history of WWII. To enhance their learning, the children were fortunate to visit the STEAM Museum where they participated in two immersive workshops that brought history to life.

The first workshop provided the children with a gripping experience of what it would have been like during an air raid. They learned about the vital role of air raid wardens and heard the chilling sound of the air raid alarm. The highlight of this session was stepping into an authentic Anderson shelter giving the pupils a true sense of the fear and resilience experienced by families during the war.

In the second workshop, the children explored the significant contributions made by women during the

war. Through an interactive and engaging session, the pupils dressed up in period costumes and acted out scenes that illustrated the challenges and triumphs for families on the home front.

Sylvie, a Year 6 pupil, said, "I really enjoyed our trip to the STEAM Museum. We loved dressing up as evacuees and learned a lot about air raids and women's roles during the war. My favourite part was experiencing the air raid shelter."

The visit to STEAM provided the children with a hands-on, memorable experience that deepened their understanding of WWII and left them with lasting memories of this important period in history.

#### **Computer Club and Coding**

This term Years 5 and 6 have been given the opportunity to attend an after-school computer club. The children are encouraged to try new things or to expand on the software and hardware that has already been used in lessons. Some children have been creating PowerPoint presentations on work that they

are currently doing in topic lessons and some have been creating web pages about their hobbies.

For those who want to code, they can create animations and interactive stories in Scratch either on their own or by using the 'Code Club, Learn to Code' website. On that same website, children have been discovering the foundational concepts of creative

projects using Al applications and technologies. They have been using hands-on projects on different platforms and tools and will go on to look at voice and facial recognition.

#### **Kids Matter at Highworth Community Church**

Here at Highworth Community Church (HCC), we've been making some changes for the provision of our youngest members.

In the Bible, Jesus makes a passionate effort to bring to the attention of His disciples the importance of children in the Kingdom of God and so at HCC we want to honour every person who comes through the door, whether they are 4 or 94. We meet at Warneford School each Sunday, and one big move to achieve honouring everyone has been relocating our Sunday morning children's work to the Dance Studio – it's been a huge success. The larger space and flexibility of a dividing wall between two sides of the space has enabled us to create a really inclusive, creative and

welcoming place for the children to enjoy.

We use half of the space to host the activities and run a fun and engaging programme each week, and the other half is a multipurpose sensory space designed with children with additional needs in mind. The sensory space provides a calm area for children of all ages in which to decompress and explore if they are struggling to engage with the main activity. The space includes a calm-down tent, a sensory circuit, and different sensory activities each week.

Our weekly sessions include crafts and creativity, singing and dancing, interactive stories, and lots of fun games. We hold HCC Kids **every Sunday from 11am to 12:10pm** in the Dance Studio at Warneford School for children in primary school.

Families are welcome to join our church service from 10:30am and then the children go out to HCC Kids after 30 minutes. If you have any children under primary school age, you are welcome to stay with your children in our crèche area. We would love to see you there to join in the fun on a Sunday morning!





#### **Meet Stuart Gould - To Rock Bottom and Back**

You've probably seen Stuart Gould in the High Street. Brightly dressed, gregarious, and a tad overwhelming. We, of course, don't see ourselves. We conceal a lot from everyone, including from ourselves.

Stuart explains, "Although I've lived in Swindon now for 33 years, I still consider Highworth as my hometown. All my friendships, my football, my schooling and my work have happened in Highworth."

Despite his parents Colin and Sue separating in his teens, Stuart remains firmly attached to both and has made his own family with Sharron and their two lovely daughters.

In his early 40s, self-employed and the main breadwinner, his pressure cooker finally erupted into a panic attack that led him to hospital. The ECG showed all normal. Luckily, he met a doctor who explained what was going on: "Your brain has been working 100% on 'work', Stuart, and it's not spent

any time at all on looking after you."

It was a eureka moment for Stuart. He sought redemption in self-discovery and his favourite band of Leeds lads – The Wedding Present. "But I'd got to the point where there was no joy... everything was grey." The multi-coloured Stuart was a crumbling façade.

In the dead of night, he reached for whisky and pills but his botched attempt to end it all finally prompted a visit to his doctor. Then followed failed trials of various medicines and endless days in bed. Finally, they cracked it with the right medication; the intervention that empowered a slow self-discovery. "The tablets got me out of bed."

After years of recovery and drawing on all his experience in the print and comic book trades,

Stuart's has just published his story 'Mv

Nervous Breakdown'. True to his preferred style of reading, "it's light on words," but lavishly illustrated by Lee Thacker, who Stuart met through their shared obsession with The Wedding Present. "Within five minutes of reading the script, he'd got it." And so followed the perfect

Stuart's lifetime football mates, The Kylies, wrote in the foreword: "Stu's story illustrates that if someone as outgoing and colourful as him, with a loving family and many friends, can slip into a mental

health crisis then it can happen to anyone. Most of all, Stu's story is one of hope."

Kate Rowland, CEO of SWA, explained, "Domestic abuse can affect anyone of any age or background but people are often wary about asking the difficult questions when they first spot the signs. #### **Prostate Cancer Awareness**

Prostate cancer, the most common cancer among men worldwide, deserves our attention and action. This disease impacts millions and yet the stigma around discussing men's health issues often prevents early detection and treatment. While the disease mainly affects men over 50, younger men are not immune. Factors like family history, ethnicity and diet can also increase risk.

Given the lack of national programmes and consequent reluctance of GPs to raise the issue of testing we believe that many men, including those in Highworth, may not fully understand the dangers that prostate cancer represents and have therefore never been tested. It is a fact that prostate cancer is now England's most common cancer, and the number of cases are growing. Current statistics indicate that 1 in 7 men will develop prostate cancer in their lifetime and early detection is key to the success of treatment.

Awareness of this disease should not just be amongst men but also their partners, wives, family, and friends. Ironically, many women are acutely aware of the dangers of breast cancer and many are regularly tested, so why is prostate cancer testing not reflecting the same level of attention? All over the country now, local organisations are starting to promote widespread awareness and also arrange events for testing, analysis, diagnosis and follow-up advice.

The Highworth and District Lions, the Town Council, and the national charity CHAPS are reciprocating with an awareness campaign followed by a day of testing at the Highworth Community Centre in early July. This day will be staffed by medical professionals who will take a blood sample which will be sent away for analysis. This initial event will be discounted by the Highworth Lions so getting in early is recommended as numbers are limited. During May and June there will be more details circulated, including cost, the event date; and how to sign up.

Finally, please visit the Highworth and District Lions or Town Council stalls during the town's May events to register an interest. This data will help to decide if further testing days are required later in the year. Let's make Highworth a prostate cancer aware town.



#### Highworth Climate Talks

#### **Heat Pumps: Magic or Myth?**

One of the team at Highworth Climate Talks recently called the plumber. Sadly, the gas boiler was as good as dead. "I can get you a new gas boiler in a few weeks," the plumber offered "and it will be hydrogen-ready." But recent tests for using hydrogen in the heating of homes were quietly abandoned. Hydrogen will be reserved for large scale industrial uses, so a 'hydrogen-ready boiler' will never be fed any hydrogen.

Gas boilers are facing a crisis too. They cause carbon pollution and, in addition, gas bills are projected to rise 30% in five years and more than double by 2040 because fewer users will mean higher network charges.

So what about heat pumps? The fossil fuel companies want us to think heat pumps don't work, that they are a myth. But the humble heat pump has a sort of magic to it. It sucks in cold air and spits out hot water to heat our homes. It seems to defy all the physical laws we were taught at school. Nevertheless, it is being hailed as one of the keys to the coming 'great energy transition'.

Come and hear Ben Beanland from the Heat Pump Federation talk about heat pumps and the energy transition at 7:30pm on Tuesday 20 May at Highworth Methodist Church on Vicarage Lane.

#### **The Arts Society Upper Thames**

We would be delighted to welcome you as a visitor to our May Lecture, 'Stonehenge' with Julian Richards on Thursday 8 May, 2pm, at Lechlade Memorial Hall.

Stonehenge is the most celebrated and sophisticated prehistoric stone circle in the British Isles. This lecture explains why Stonehenge must be regarded as architectural in its layout and construction, embodying techniques that for centuries convinced antiquarians it could not have been built by 'primitive' ancient Britons but must be a product of 'sophisticated' Romans. We then explore how, over the last two centuries, this iconic structure has inspired painters, potters and poets. Blake, Turner, Constable and Moore are amongst those who have all been drawn to this magnificent ruin, resulting in a diverse catalogue of images and impressions.

Julian Richards studied archaeology at Reading University and has since worked as a professional archaeologist, in commercial archaeology, for English Heritage, for the BBC and as an independent. He was elected a fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of London in 1992 and has an honorary doctorate. His career in broadcasting involved researching and presenting 'Meet the Ancestors' and 'Blood of the Vikings' for BBC2 and 'Mapping the Town' for Radio 4. He has written a number of English Heritage publications on Stonehenge, including the previous and current guide books to the monument and landscape. Museum work includes curating Stonehenge-related exhibitions in the UK and abroad (Germany and Austria), and he has just curated the new permanent ceramics gallery for Salisbury Museum.



### Highworth Town Council Secures Funding for Tree and Hedge Replanting Project



Highworth Town Council is pleased to announce that we have successfully secured funding from the Great Western Community Forest to support a replanting initiative following recent essential tree works.

As part of our ongoing commitment to maintaining and enhancing the town's green spaces, we recently carried out extensive tree work along the hedgerow between the golf course driveway and the allotment site. This work involved the removal of nine hawthorn trees that were no longer safe.

With the funding secured, we will now move forward with a comprehensive replanting plan. This will include planting a new beech hedge along the length of the allotment site and six new trees to replace those that were removed. These efforts will help restore the natural landscape, support local wildlife, and contribute to the town's long-term environmental sustainability.

This project has been funded by the Defra Trees for Climate programme and the Great Western Community Forest. The new planting is part of over 200 hectares of woodland, trees, and hedges being planted within the Great Western Community Forest this year. When fully grown, each hectare of new tree planting will annually capture and store around 295 tonnes of carbon dioxide, helping to mitigate climate change.

We would like to thank the Great Western Community Forest, Swindon Borough Council, and the Defra Trees for Climate programme for their support in making this project possible.
