Save the Old Golf Course this June

"...you don't know what you've got till it's gone. They paved paradise and put up a parking lot." So said Joni Mitchell.

Last October, a survey found that around 500 people a day visited the Old Golf Course, with many arriving by car from nearby towns.

This spring, our Old Golf Course looks so beautiful and thousands of people every week continue to gain the invaluable benefits this natural treasure gives.

Highworth Town Council (with the Action Group and Wiltshire Wildlife Trust) have put forward a fully costed proposal for the Old Golf Course to become an income-generating community nature park, including the upper, easily-accessible section, to become designated as a 'Local Green Space'.

This would also feature:

- A nature-themed café
- Nature walkways and trails
- A wetland area
- Wildflower and tree planting
- Improved hedgerows
- A play park and picnic area
- Outdoor schooling activities
- A natural burial ground.

Swindon has opposed this plan, stating that the Old Golf Course was not a 'special' asset and keeping it would restrict further development. An independent examiner has been appointed to review the plan and well over 200 residents wrote in support of keeping the site green. As this article goes to press, we are awaiting his decision.

Swindon Borough Council (SBC) are meeting on Wednesday 4 June to vote on the three options:

- 1. For the whole of the site to become a nature park
- 2. For 400 houses and the remainder to be a nature park
- 3. For 700 houses and the remainder to be a nature park.

Highworth has approximately 3,500 houses, and in the building or planning stages there are currently between

With the increase in population, our local parks will become even more vital.

We will be organising attendance at SBC's meeting on 4 June to show them our strength of feeling, including a bus for those who cannot drive there.

We hope to see Highworth's residents out in force to show them how special this green space is to the community and what an asset it is to Swindon and North Wiltshire.

Once it's gone, it's gone forever.

From Transylvania to Highworth

I believe that most of us have fond memories of going to the market as children with our parents and grandparents to buy necessities and returning home with our favourite sweets or toys. Today, I get the same joy whether I'm there as a consumer or selling my own items, and I am pleased to be able to sell my products in such a vibrant place as the Highworth Market.

On the first day, I had the impression that all of the vendors knew one another and were like a big happy family. Along with other sellers offering bread, cheese, honey, souvenirs, and baklawa, I have a tiny booth where I sell wooden crafts in an attempt to maintain a century's-old

tradition that is common to many cultures: painting on wood.

My name is Emilia and I was born in Sighisoara, in the enchanting region of Transylvania –we have the most well-preserved medieval fortresses in Eastern Europe and it is the birthplace of Vlad Tepes, the real-life figure who inspired the legend of Count Dracula.

I enjoy painting traditional Transylvanian motifs on wooden boxes, spoons, crates, trays, bookmarks, chairs, and wardrobes. I combine traditional Romanian themes with those of the Saxon inhabitants who came to



Transylvania in 1241 and were very talented craftsmen.

I believe traditions can provide a sense of stability and comfort, offering a link to the past, and a sense of continuity in a changing world. It is such a great gift to be able to share the wisdom, values, and stories of previous generations. lan was born in Edmonton, London in March 1948 and attended the local primary and secondary schools. Whilst at secondary school, together with other friends, one of whom was his future wife Joan, he helped to build a 9-hole crazy golf course and a Take Your Pick stall for North Middlesex Hospital for their fetes.

lan married Joan in 1969 and they lived in Enfield. He worked for the Union Castle Line where he completed his transport exams, eventually moving to Swindon, as many Londoners did at the time, and he continued to work for transport companies both in Swindon and Faringdon.

A brief move to Devon saw the couple running a newsagents, but they returned to live in Highworth where they have been for 45 years and raised two children, Claire and Paul.

It is in Highworth where Ian began to be involved more and more in voluntary work, being on the PTA, along with Joan, at both Westrop Primary School and Warneford School. At the time, I was head teacher of Crowdys Hill, a special educational needs school, and my bursar was Joan. At some point Ian was appointed



as governor to the school, eventually becoming Chair. He was the ideal governor because at all times he put the children first. He was hands-on helping at fetes, attending meetings regularly, present at all school events, and encouraging the children. He was also a member of the Education Board established when Swindon Borough Council failed its Ofsted.

Later, lan joined me at the Highworth Community Centre, eventually becoming a trustee; he was the Friday receptionist. The clients loved him because he enjoyed a chat with them and also offered a helping hand... or made a cup of tea or another cup of tea! He became part of Highworth

Community Partnership Group and was pivotal in setting up Visit Highworth, eventually becoming Chair. He also became the administrator at Highworth United Charities.

lan was the volunteer that everyone values; he was always there to help, would not let you down, and had a permanently cheerful smile. He will be sorely missed by so many organisations. His service to Highworth has been priceless and always with a cup of tea.

involved. Are you a local business owner who can



Meet Simon Rose: Anti-Litter Bug

It all started during lockdown in 2020. Like many others, Simon and his wife Debbie took to walking the deserted roads. Remember then? It was eerie, wasn't it? Walking along, he noticed the litter, debris discarded from long-passed cars. And so began what's turned into a hobby: walking the roads and collecting litter.

It's a complete contrast to Simon's profession as Technical Manager of Metallurgy at a Stroud company. (Metallurgy is about the properties of metals and their production and purification.) The only common ground I suppose is the metal drink tins hurled out of car windows.

Simon prefers a circular route. "I'll walk down the Swindon Road, left at Supermarine, through Sevenhampton, up the hill, down the Fresden Road, then home along the Coleshill Road," he says. That's about seven miles, which he does in four hours. In his

rucksack he carries five waste sacks that he fills with litter along the way, leaving for later collection in his car. He has an arrangement with Highworth Town Council who take it all for recycling.

His other routes include all the entrance roads into Highworth, except the Cricklade Road to Blunsdon, which he says is too dangerous. He also patrols Roundhills Mead and has walked as far as Tadpole Surgery in Blunsdon. He explained that the borough seems to confine its litter activities to 30mph roads, mainly to protect worker safety.

He finds that litter comprises tins and glass drink containers, fast food boxes, fly-tipped waste, as well as various unmentionables. He deals mainly with the vast number of food and drink items.

Although he clearly gets satisfaction in the pursuit of his anti-litter hobby, there are aspects that trouble him. "It perplexes me that this culture is like it is." He's litter picked around the Warneford School site. "Why don't they get the kids to pick it up?" he wonders. "And do all the alcohol tins and bottles point towards a lot of drink driving?" We agreed that litter, like the many other anti-social behaviours, is regarded as 'low-level' – an inconsiderate action that we ignore at our peril.





Gardening and Football at Eastrop School

THE UP AND DOWN HISTORY

HIGHWORTH

Every wondered about the history of your local market? Paul Newton-Smith from the Highworth Historical Society is here to help.

Henry John Freke sold them for £300 (equivalent to £48,710 today) to Thomas Ackling, corn dealer, and Thomas Yeates, butcher, both of Highworth. Records show that in 1845 ownership had moved to the Phipps family.

September. Finally, an outbreak of foot and mouth disease in December that year spread over north-east Wiltshire and into west Berkshire. Livestock movement was prohibited in the area and the market failed to survive this last set-back.

Rules were quite strict during the time of the fairs. For instance, nobody else was allowed to trade and all the shops in the town were closed for business – this led to very bitter feelings amongst the townspeople. During the markets and fairs, ale was allowed to be sold from bush houses, identified by a bunch of greenery hung outside. Highworth had at least two bush houses, located in Sheep Street and at the east end of the High Street.



It all took place like clockwork, The singing was just great, Three choirs all did their very best, All stepped up to the plate.




