### **Highworth Community Shed Renovation**

During May and June this year, Highworth Community Shed was delighted to be asked to renovate a Model 61 (1930-1938) Lines Bros/Triang dolls house for Avril Davies.

Well used, as you would expect for its age, we took the house back to its original frame and rebuilt it using as much as possible of the original wood frame and cardboard roof. The process took time but the result was well worth it.

The whole construction was in thin ply with a moulded cardboard roof. The carcass was misshapen and needed stabilising. The old tin window frames needed reshaping, sanding and repainting, and the outside had been painted with a semi-gloss paint which needed removing. We rescued all of the windows, and whilst most will still open some are fused. And we were thrilled to reveal the original paint – a cream/buttermilk colour plus amazing flowers on the front middle section. The internal walls were repapered and parquet-style paper used upstairs and downstairs.

We added a tiled path and overpainted the blue section to the front of the house with green to represent grass. The garage needed doors, so these were made and added. The outer walls were painted in cream paint and the decorative painted flowers were reinstated. The roof was made from formed cardboard.



warped over the years, and subsequent attempts to repair it with glue and tape had failed. We took the time to soak the sections and dry them between weights to reshape them. The damaged edges were covered with paper tape and extra strong glue was used to put the three sections back together. Once in place, we covered the roof with faux grey tiles.

Avril was thrilled with the end result, as you can see in the photograph.





## **Supermarine Bowls Raises Funds for Prospect**

Early in July I had a very enjoyable time watching the cheque presentation of £1,100 from Supermarine Bowls Club to Prospect Hospice. This was money raised on their Memorial Day for their charity of choice.

I have been involved as a (non-playing) friend of Supermarine Bowls Club for many years now, and I know how generous the members are at raising money for charity. I understand that they have already donated over £30,000 over the years to Prospect alone, not forgetting the other charities they support.

Many of you will have had personal experience, as I have had, of the care that the Prospect Hospice offers, both within the hospice and the community. Their kindness and support is amazing. You may not know that it takes nearly £10 million a year to keep it going, and after Covid it became difficult. However, with a new CEO at the head and a great fundraising team, they are now working hard at reaching their targets and raising money to enable beds to remain open, specialist nurses and carers both in the inpatient unit and out in the community.


At the present time, the government provides about 18% towards the cost of running Prospect. The remaining is raised through the generosity of its supporters who are playing Prospect raffles or lottery, donating to its shops, taking part in fundraising events and donating.

Prospect not only provides end of life care; it is the main centre with specialist nurses, for MND and Lymphoedema in this area. It provides palliative care training for many local organisations, including hospitals and care homes. But most of all it values both the patient and their family, providing a safe and comfortable death with respect and love.

I can only finish by saying well done to Supermarine Bowls Club and sending my love and support to you all at Prospect. You do a great job!




### (Another) New Kid in Town

### **Bigger, Better Seasons at Wonky Veg Club**

Every season is better than the last.

Last autumn we had a fantastic late harvest. particularly with our very popular tomatoes and mashed potato squashes. Over the winter we planned our year ahead ordering in new seed to be sown and building raised beds. We also did what we could to protect our polytunnels against the back-to-back storms.

Then the warm dry weather in spring got us off to a great start so we could plant out garlic, salad leaves, broad beans, carrots. and beetroot nice and early.



We also hold multiple special events each year.





In March we had a fantastic turnout from existing and new volunteers in alorious sunshine to restore our main polytunnel with a new plastic cover after some winter damage. In June, Keyloop, a technology company from Reading, came along for a teambuilding activity day and sowed 2000 sweetcorn seeds in one day! Crowdys Hill sixth formers also now visit twice a week to learn new gardening and construction skills, teamwork, and task management.

The 1.2 acre site at Roves Farm, including three polytunnels, allows this volunteer-run community garden project to spend all year growing a variety of fruit and vegetables, using woodwork projects to build new equipment. Even now, amid harvesting what we have already sown this year, we are planting yet more crops for winter harvesting and starting construction projects for the autumn.

The group is open to everyone of all abilities, ages, and gardening experience, and we are always looking for new helping hands. We meet at the field on Thursday mornings and Sunday afternoons and always pause for a hard-earned coffee break!

### **Barra Close Play Area Update**

Redevelopment of the play area at Barra Close began on Monday 4 August, with the team from Highworth Town Council removing the old equipment and preparing the site for the contractors to begin installation of the new play facilities.

The final design, shaped by extensive community consultation, including input from local residents and visits to Highworth's primary schools, features an infant and junior play park, a zip wire, and a full-size Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA).

We understand that the timing of the works over the



summer holidays has been less than ideal, but this much-needed investment in our community's recreational space could not be postponed further. We thank residents, especially local families, for their patience and understanding during the works.

We anticipate the works on the Barra Close Play Area redevelopment will be completed in November and we look

### **Success for Prostate Cancer Testing Day**

Did you know that a heatwave can affect blood tests? That's what we discovered on Saturday 12 July at the prostate cancer testing day at the Highworth Community Centre.

The heated environment, coupled with dehydration, made it very difficult to draw sufficient or stable blood samples. This was yeary frustrating for all who attended as it

very frustrating for all who attended as it caused significant delays throughout the day.

However, most of the men who attended considered the testing so important that they waited patiently for their appointment. Those who had to leave because of other engagements were followed up by the healthcare provider to ensure they would not miss out on being tested.

Incredibly, 92 men were tested on the day. Everyone received their results within a few days which

underscored the critical importance of the day. The results were graded in terms of risk to health and with advice for follow up. While some of the results were graded as abnormal, they were approached with

sensitivity as a variety of factors come into play. What was clear, however, was that a few people needed urgent follow up with a GP and potentially more

tests. This accounted for nearly 11% which is a higher than the average abnormal rate and suggests we should intensify screening opportunities in the future – but in cooler weather!

What I personally observed is that these men

could have continued without testing and they would never have known they were at risk. People I have met who have experienced cancer firsthand have said to me they wished their own diagnoses had come earlier so their treatment would have been less aggressive.

At least here in Highworth your town council and the Lions took action to organise the event with the

priority of protecting men's wellbeing and future health. We thank also CHAPS and the healthcare provider Sirrka who managed the event on the day.

### **New Eco-Friendly Shop for Shrivenham**

### **Meet John Ranford**

"A cohesive community is essential to adapt to climate change."

If my childhood home were threatened by rising sea levels I'd be more than annoyed, and yet John Ranford seems surprisingly calm and level-headed about this existential threat to Funafuti. It's the main island in Tuvalu in the Pacific Ocean where he was raised by missionary parents. "It's where William and Kate chose to have their honeymoon," he explained. But there's a dark side to this fairytale place.

Returning to Britain aged seven, John was educated initially at a boarding school then a secondary modern school – worlds apart from Tuvalu and, indeed, from each other. Nevertheless, it was a childhood that equipped him with

the ability to analyse complex problems and develop workable solutions.

Before retirement, John did a lot of work with charities including the Bible Society, and he now focuses his energy on modifying his home to adapt to the apparently inevitable consequences of climate change. Arising from his extensive research he (together with his wife Hilary, Joy Corrigan and Helen Holly) started Highworth Climate Talks as a forum for residents to learn and adapt to the challenges of climate change. Over nearly two years there have been 18 guest speakers on climate-related topics such as cycling, wildlife, a sustainable food supply, fossil fuels,, 'green' homes, sewage pollution, zero waste in a 'circular' economy, and e-waste.

Our conversation inevitably led to the so-called Paris Agreement of 2015 where the goal was to hold "the increase in the global average temperature to well below 2°C above pre-industrial levels," and pursue efforts "to limit the temperature increase to 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels." (United Nations Climate Change



Executive). Regrettably, the world's report card on climate change actions says "Could do better; needs to focus." It's a complex formula, but many climate scientists think we're already at about 1.5°C and still rising. This is why John says we're going to have to think beyond just 'climate mitigation' (reducing its effects) to 'adaptation' (learning how to live with its effects). "We're the first generation to fully understand that we're impacting the climate, but the last generation that's going to be able to do anything about it." Increasing local resilience is now a key priority.

John wants to see us nurture both local supply chains and connectedness in our community. "The Town Council will become more important because, you know, it's local." Which is why we have Highworth Climate Talks and, of course, why our Highworth LINK Magazine will be more important than ever.

She is now fit and well and has managed to keep both of her eyes.


### **Highworth Community Cinema**

### **Lechlade Art Society Printing Workshop**

The petition was signed by 621, which was comfortably more than enough to require SBC to formally debate the issue at a full council meeting. This took place on the 24 July, when as the petition sponsor I spoke in support of the petition. There appeared to be a recognition that there is an issue here which needs to be resolved although there is work which needs to be undertaken before any real steps are taken. For example, as the route ends in the Oxfordshire County Council area they need to be consulted.

On the 29 July, Phil Beaumont and I met with Will Stone MP and he also understood our concerns and undertook to assist in helping us to achieve the outcome we are looking for. May I also thank our Mayor, Julie Murphy, and our Borough Councillors for their support.

When we have further news of the steps to be undertaken by SBC we will provide an update.

In June I took part in a martial arts panel grading where I was going for my deputy black belt. It was on the hottest day of the year but luckily we didn't have




