Listening – It's at the Heart of Samaritans

Can you join us to be there for someone who is struggling?

Listening is at the heart of what Samaritans do. Our volunteers offer a safe, confidential space for people to talk about whatever they're going through – without judgement or giving advice. Listening means more than just hearing the words. It involves active, empathetic engagement, allowing callers to feel truly heard and understood.

Samaritans' training and mentoring enables listening without interrupting, guiding or trying to 'fix' the situation. Our volunteers use techniques such as open-

ended questions, reflective listening and gentle prompting to encourage callers to open up and feel less alone. Silence is also an important tool; it gives people time to think and share at their own pace.

At Samaritans, the goal isn't to offer solutions but to empower people to explore their own thoughts and feelings. Often, the simple act of being listened to with compassion and respect can make a significant difference in helping put things in perspective, to help somebody feel more positive about their future and less alone. In essence, listening at Samaritans is about presence, patience and emotional availability – offering human connection in moments of despair or crisis.

Community Challenge for Society Without Abuse

A Swindon charity is marking the culmination of its 50th anniversary by challenging supporters to do '50 for 50'.

Society Without Abuse (SWA), then known as Swindon Women's Aid, opened the first refuge in Swindon on 25 August 1975. At the time, the refuge in Park North was not just the only place for women to seek help from domestic abuse, but it was one of the first in the country. Since then, SWA has continued to lead the way in supporting victims and survivors, as well as implementing programmes to stop the behaviours at the root cause of domestic abuse.

The '50 for 50' fundraising drive enables supporters to choose their own challenge to raise much needed funds to continue developing and expanding the vital services that the charity offers.

"It's a great way for people to get involved and do something to help victims of domestic abuse



in a lasting way," explained SWA Operations Manager Natasha Moyles. "The challenge will be live for 50 days from the anniversary of the first refuge opening and so people have until **Wednesday 15 October** to help us make a difference to the future of women, men and children across Swindon who are, or may one day be victims of domestic abuse.

"With one in four people predicted to be a victim of

"With one in four people predicted to be a victim of domestic abuse at some point in their life, our work through prevention, education, and early intervention could improve the lives of thousands of people in our community. By pledging to raise £50, do something 50 times, or committing to a larger challenge together we can work towards a society without abuse.

"So, whether it's baking and selling 50 cakes, hosting a dinner or wine tasting, or even running the Swindon Half, there's so much opportunity to take part. Even the smallest activity will help us make a big difference."

Please Don't Freeze This Winter

The Highworth and District branch of Christians Against Poverty (CAP), based at The Bridge Centre and run by the churches of Highworth, is offering free debt help to local people struggling with energy prices or facing other money problems.

CAP's latest report revealed that 43% of those the charity helps UK-wide had energy arrears before they sought debt help. Over half (51%) have gone without heating their home and 27% have done so on a weekly basis.

Kathryn Ford who runs the Highworth CAP Debt Centre, says: "We visit families and individuals in their homes to provide debt help, and it's heartbreaking to see that so many aren't able to afford the basic essentials we all need to live.

"We've met people who regularly avoid putting the heating on because they simply can't afford it, even on freezing cold days in winter. We see many skipping meals on a weekly or even daily basis because they don't have the money to fill their cupboards, let alone cook a hot meal. That's why we want to raise urgent awareness of the free debt help we offer via The Bridge

Centre through our Christians Against Poverty Debt Centre.

"Getting free support now can make a huge difference and it means that we'll be able to help people keep their homes warm,



have enough to eat and keep the lights on.

"Our team is here to help with debt problems through our CAP Debt Help service, and, because we're local, we can also support practically too. This includes linking people up with local food banks, arranging emergency shops and fuel top-ups, and providing emotional support, encouragement and a friendly face. We don't want anyone worrying about how they'll manage to stay warm this winter."

The National Trust Butterfly Effect

Did you notice the high numbers of butterflies this year? Our nature project has revealed that Small Tortoiseshell, Silver-washed Fritillary and Clouded Yellow have been recorded for the first time.

Butterflies do not tend to fly in the rain which made last year's wet summer less hospitable. However, dry summers affect plants and in turn the butterflies as food sources will be depleted. The weather we had

this summer has a knock-on effect for next year, as plants vulnerable to drought are needed for laying eggs.

The nature project's focus on birds has seen a breeding pair of lapwings, as well as curlew with their young. Other species of note include the greenshank, cuckoo, and lesser spotted woodpecker. Monitoring means we can understand what we have on the estate. We are monitoring mammals through water vole and

otter surveys, as well as audio monitor installation as part of the National Barbastelle and Bechstein's Survey. Barbastelle and Bechstein are rare species of bats that thrive in ancient woodlands. Our volunteer, Martin Trewhella, captured this amazing photo of an otter on the River Cole.



The final village open day in Coleshill is **Saturday 12 October**. Come along between 2pm and 5pm and see our exhibition on the legacy of creatives that are connected to the Coleshill estate.



Lechlade History Society



From distributing school supplies to rebuilding homes after natural disasters, their efforts span both immediate relief and long-term development. The opening of

this library is just one example of their ongoing commitment to improve lives in the Philippines.

The charity's core belief is that a better future begins with education. By providing access to books and learning materials, Heart for Philippines inspires a love of reading and lifelong learning. This library marks just one of many initiatives set to unfold this year, with small reading corners already sprouting across the Philippines.

Julia had chosen the hymns for her thanksgiving service including the hymn ending "In life in death, O Lord, abide with me." We give thanks for Julia and continue to pray for Alan and the family as they mourn.

It was June 1985 when a few mums living in Stanton Fitzwarren got together to pray and consider how they could best serve our small village community. The inspiration for this was a local mission 'Alive 85' organised by our then Rector as a follow-on from Billy Graham's 1984 Mission England.

We decided to reach out to mums with small children who, at that time, were often marooned in the village as their husbands took the family car to work in Swindon or further afield. And so from there the Stanton Coffee Morning (spreading Christ's message) was born.

Meeting once a month in different homes, we started with coffee and a chat and provided a space for the children to play and colour next month's invites. The children were often cared for by some of the older people while their mothers had a break. A speaker would then share something of their own story and how their faith influenced their life and work.

Over the 40 years, 202 speakers have shared their stories: mothers, fathers, teachers, police officers, nurses, doctors, homeless people, farmers, squadron leaders, prison chaplains, curates, vicars, bishops. All

have inspired us, blessed us and challenged us. We have laughed till tears moistened our eyes and shed tears at the moving stories.

Over the years things have changed. We have all grown older, some have moved, some have died, and the children are now middle-aged. Most of us are retired. New people have joined. Travel is easier and people come from a wider area. Although it is 'Stanton Coffee Morning' not everyone lives in the village or parish. Some of our speakers have enjoyed their welcome and now come regularly to catch up and listen to others.

We meet as a family, giving thanks to God without whom we would have no purpose to meet except to drink coffee... which we can do anywhere. Covid forced us to stop meeting in people's homes, so we now meet at Stanton House Hotel with better access, parking and comfort. Everyone is welcome and everyone has a story to tell – are you prepared to share yours?


Mystery Find at St. Leonard's Church







News from Will Stone MP

At the recent Swindon Borough Full Council meeting on the 24 July, I listened as residents of Highworth presented a petition regarding the use of Shrivenham Road by heavy goods vehicles (HGVs), a matter which is causing concern among residents. These vehicles are coming from a number of companies operating out of the South Marston Industrial Estate.

Upon meeting with residents personally, they expressed their concerns to me, not just about the potential damage to Highworth's infrastructure or village atmosphere, but also the potential direct danger posed by HGVs to pedestrians and children attending Warneford and Southfield Schools. Reviewing the evidence compiled by residents, I agree that the use of Shrivenham Road by these companies is a potential risk, and so, following this meeting, I wrote to all those companies that operate using Shrivenham Road and requested they seek alternative routes.



I was pleased to receive initial feedback from some of the companies I contacted, such as Evri who have stated they will be changing routes to avoid Shrivenham Road and instructing their drivers and any contractors operating with them to do the same. Other companies have provided suggestions that may prevent future drivers opting to use Highworth as a short cut for preferred routes.

I am pleased with these initial steps and will be engaging further with the Council and companies across the town to ensure that HGVs do not operate on roads that may be unsafe for their use or which could cause endangerment to pedestrians.




